A PROCLAMTION honoring Rhonda P. Chafiin for reaching the milestone of 30 years of outstanding service to Sullivan County and surrounding communities through her work at Hunger First of Northeast Tennessee

WHEREAS, Rhonda P. Chafin has for 30 years shown exemplary leadership in the effort to solve hunger in our region and for contributing to ending hunger on the local, regional, and national levels; and

WHEREAS, Chafin has served as the Executive Director of Second Harvest Food Bank of Northeast Tennessee since 1993, ever committed to the mission of the Food Bank "To feed the hungry in Northeast Tennessee by securing and distributing food and engaging our community in the fight to end hunger through regional partnerships, programs, and education."

WHEREAS, Over her thirty-year tenure, food distribution has increased from 1.6 million pounds in 1993 to over 13.3 million pounds in FY2022 closing the Hunger Gap in Northeast Tennessee, and SHFBNT distributed an annual high of 16.6 million pounds in FY2021 during COVID; and

WHEREAS, Chafin has developed the SHFBNT budget from \$300,000 to \$5 million, leading three successful capital campaigns for the Food Bank's relocation and expansion to meet the hunger needs of the region: 1) 1998 Capital campaign for relocation and growth from an approx. 1,000 square foot Food Bank to 16,000 sq. ft. in Gray, TN 2005 2) 11,000 sq. ft. expansion of the Gray facility 3) Relocation to a 112,000 sq. ft. facility in Kingsport, Tennessee. (The current facility) in 2013; and

WHEREAS, Chafin's Leadership of the Food Bank staff and Board of Directors has helped fulfill the organization's mission; and

WHEREAS, Second Harvest Food Bank of Northeast Tennessee is the primary food source for over 120 of the region's food pantries, soup kitchens, and other hunger outreach organizations; and, in addition, Food Bank programs distribute food into the community with programs such as Food for Kids, Fresh Produce Distributions, Mobile Food Pantries, Senior Grocery Programs, Summer Food Service Programs, and Veterans Serving Veterans (VSV) program; and

WHEREAS, Second Harvest Food Bank is a STRONG Accountable Care Community (ACC) partner connecting people to social services; and

WHEREAS, Chafin has provided local, regional, and national leadership for hunger relief, including service on/as: the Feeding America Central Region Association of Food Banks

chair from 2014 to 2019 and also served as treasurer from 2008 to 2012 and Vice Chair from 2012 to 2014; National Council for the Feeding America Food Bank Network and subcommittee for the contract task force, 2014 – 2019; the Feeding America Food Sourcing Advisory Committee for 2023; as a Hunger Action Month (HAM) Ambassador and has served on several committees and sub-committees; and

WHEREAS, In 2012, under Chafin's leadership, SHFBNT received the Feeding America National Food Bank Hunger's Hope Award for Food Bank Advocacy Program of the Year and SHFBNT was one of Feeding America's top four food banks of the year in 2020.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, as Mayor of Sullivan County and on behalf of the Sullivan County Commission, I Richard S. Venable declare March 17, 2023 to be Rhoda P. Chafin Day in Sullivan County and urge all citizens to celebrate Chafin's achievements as we thank her for 30 years of service and look forward to her continued leadership in service to helping end hunger in our county and region.

A RESOLUTION TO TERMINATE SULLIVAN COUNTY'S LEASE AGRREMENT WITH THE TENNESSEE VALLEY AUTHORITY FOR THE PARCLE OF TVA-OWNED LAND KNOWN AS OBSERVATION KNOB PARK.

WHEREAS, Sullivan County Tennessee has leased TVA land on South Holston Lake, known as and operated by the county as Observation Knob Park, for nearly 50 years; and

WHEREAS, that lease is set to expire in July of 2025; and

WHEREAS, in recent months Sullivan County commissioners have been made aware of significant infrastructure problems in the park, which is estimated to cost the County up to \$500,000 for repairs and electrical upgrades, in order to mitigate safety risks to camper / camper guests and to provide electrical service suitable for today's typical 50 AMP motor homes and travel trailers (recreational vehicles); and

WHEREAS, multiple maintenance issues within the park create potentially significant liability (including negligence, if left unfinished); and

WHEREAS, changes implemented for the upcoming operating season of Observation Knob Park included an order to all park tenants to vacate the property by March 15, resulting in the first time in many years that the park has been clear of residents; and

WHEREAS, a lottery to assign 88 seasonal sites at the park for the 2023 season is to be held on or about April 1; and

WHEREAS, signing up for that lottery is to begin March 20 and by TVA guidelines must be advertised in advance of that date, which is only four days after the Sullivan County Commission's regular monthly meeting on March 16, 2023; and

WHEREAS, the Sullivan County Commission's Administrative Committee voted March 7, 2023 to recommend removing Observation Knob Park from the county's fiscal year 2023-2024 budget; and

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED the Sullivan County Commission requests to terminate the county's lease with TVA for the land on South Holston Lake, known as Observation Knob Park effective April 1, 2023, and to place the remaining fiscal year's funding into the General Operating Fund, with the exception of refunding campers who paid winter storage fees for three months in 2023 (January, February, and March) and to pay for expenses to physically close the park per TVA requirements.

FURTHER BE IT RESOLED that any EXISTING contracts between businesses and Park management (which are set to occur between April 1, 2023 and July 1, 2023) should reviewed with TVA for utilization of the boat ramp and parking.

FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED that TVA Government Relations and Recreation have been contacted and the decision is currently pending to determine if there will be any financial penalty owed to TVA for early termination of the lease, with account numbers to be assigned by the County Finance Director.

This resolution terminates Sullivan County's lease Agreement with the Tennessee Valley Authority for Observation Knob Park.

After this resolution was introduced to the Commission at the Work Session last week, it was brought to our attention that a contract existed between Sullivan County and the Intermont Utility District, effective 1997 to 2037, which impacts Observation Knob Park. This contract was created to fund improvements to the Intermont Utility District by providing new water lines to residents in the Painters Creek area, including a proposed new subdivision called Lake View Estates. Developer Par Ventures and Sullivan County agreed in 1998 to underwrite the loan for Intermont by agreeing to purchase a minimum amount of water a month (150,000 gallons), thereby guaranteeing Intermont's ability to meet its debt requirements.

The price of the County's share initially was \$1,725 per month for debt retirement for Intermont. This charge went to Observation Knob Park every month, **d**espite the fact that the Park was closed five months of the year and required very little if any water during these five months. In addition, the contract stipulated that in the months where water usage exceeded the 150,000 gallon minimum, Sullivan County would be expected to pay ADDITIONAL charges for every thousand gallons used over the required minimum. This was a pretty sweet deal for Intermont, especially given that the minimum water guarantee was to extend for 40 years....or....even BEYOND 40 years if the debt was not paid off by 2037. It is absurd that no one from Sullivan County who entered into this Agreement 26 years ago did not recognize that a 40-year obligation for Observation Knob Park (to 2037) was actually 12 years beyond Sullivan County's lease Agreement with TVA, which as we know, is scheduled to terminate in 2025.

I am not a lawyer, but there are several issues pertaining to this Agreement and the management of Observation Knob Park, which are highly suspect and need to be exposed and challenged for the benefit of Sullivan County taxpayers.

First, according to the terms of the Agreement, Observation Knob Park was included in the Project to obtain financing for a portion of the costs of constructing water lines in this area. The Agreement established an extension of the contract beyond 40 years if the project was not paid for. However, according to the President of Intermont, this project has already been paid for. Additionally, Sullivan County paid \$80,000 up front in 1998 to extend a 6-inch water line to the entrance of Observation Knob Park. Per Section 2.3 of the Agreement, Sullivan County was to be reimbursed for this investment if Intermont was successful in obtaining a grant for the project. According to the 1998 document, Intermont Water District received a \$200,000 grant. So, one of the questions we need answered is: Was Sullivan County reimbursed for any portion of this \$80,000 investment, as promised? If so, where is the documentation showing exactly how and when this reimbursement occurred?

Given the INTENT of this Agreement, which was to facilitate funding for this water improvement project, why is Sullivan County still on the hook to pay a minimum water usage fee which has increased from \$1725 per month to just under \$4,000 per month. This is a 135 % increase.

Also, regarding these proposed, increased rates, there is a clause in the contract that states (and I quote): "The District shall hold a public hearing on the proposed Monthly User Charges and each Customer shall be afforded the opportunity of inquiry and suggestion." Question: Was Sullivan County notified of these public hearings each and every time that a rate hike was adopted by Intermont. Specifically, there was a whopping 25% increase in the water rate last year. I was informed that every customer who was notified had responded to this rate increase notice, EXCEPT Sullivan County. WHY was this ignored? Ultimately, it is the Sullivan County taxpayers who bear the cost of these increased charges. Who is the Gatekeeper here? Sadly, it is apparent that no one, including the new professional management at Observation Knob Park, has sounded any alarm regarding these increasingly expensive water prices.

In reviewing the Audit History for water usage at Observation Knob Park for the past 19 years (I was only able to get the records back to 2004), Sullivan County has paid well over \$600,000 for water to Observation Knob Park.

In fact, under the current Park's professional management, Sullivan County paid a whopping \$36,208 for only 4 months of water into Observation Knob Park from the period of mid-May of 2022 to late August, 2022. When I questioned how this substantial increase occurred, I was told that the meter person informed the Park management that the meter was spinning and there was likely a water break somewhere in the campsite water lines.

Here are the facts regarding annual water charges for Observation Knob Park:

In the FIVE years from 2004 to 2009, annual rates increased from \$16,300 to \$24,300. This represented a 49% increase.

Over the next NINE years, from 2010 to 2019, annual rates increased from \$24,300 to \$37,200. This represented a 53% increase.

Then, in most recent THREE years, from 2020 – 2022, annual rates increased from \$37,200 to \$64,700. This represents a 74% increase in only three years.

Additionally, in regard to the contract with Intermont, Sullivan County has paid for 6,755,000 gallons of water ABOVE what they ACTUALLY used, which based on the current minimum rate of \$29.77 for 1,000 gallons, places the value that Sullivan County has overpaid at more than \$200,000.

No one would argue that Intermont supplying water to 600 homes in the Painters Creek area is a positive outcome and has benefitted Sullivan County's tax base with additional homes and has improved the lives of many Sullivan County residents. However, there should be some way for attorneys to disconnect the County's obligations for this project and the continued need to support the citizens in this District from the burdensome and increasingly unbalanced financial obligations connected to Observation Knob Park via a contract that has clearly outlived and outperformed the original intent of the Agreement.

The details associated with this Agreement should be turned over to the appropriate attorneys representing both Sullivan County and Intermont Utility District, in order to negotiate a fair payment which will protect the water services for citizens in the Painters Creek area, but relinquish the requirement to pay a minimum water usage rate for Observation Knob Park. In addition, assuming Sullivan County terminates the TVA lease before 2025 and another entity contracts with TVA to lease Observation Knob Park, then attorneys for Sullivan County and Intermont Utility District should establish a credit amount to Sullivan County relative to the negotiated price agreed to be paid to Intermont by the new lessee.

There have been numerous issues identified in this Agreement which should be challenged and many questions identified which hopefully will provide significant leverage for Sullivan County to update this Agreement with Intermont. So, the question remains:

. .

Does Sullivan County want to stay in the campground business, given the multiple maintenance and liability risks associated with doing so.

Regarding the question as to whether the \$500,000 estimate needed to repair and upgrade the multiple water and electrical problems is accurate, I can tell you that I checked with a professional electrician, who estimated the cost to convert all of the campsites from 30 AMP to 50 AMP could run anywhere from \$250,000 to \$400,00 depending on the size of the campground.

Of course, this figure doesn't even touch the cost of repairs / renovations needed at the bath houses, nor the cost of re-graveling the entire campsite.

But, clearly, the most important issue we face by re-opening this campsite is SAFETY. We've talked a lot about money here, but when it comes to a life, there really isn't any money figure that we can attach to that, whether an injury or a death. There are so many potential liabilities in this park. Why in the world do we want to subject our County to these multiple liability risks with the expectation of only breaking even financially...or at best, making a small profit which we now know would need to be rolled into an ongoing maintenance budget, including an \$18,000 cost needed to be spent immediately to correct the FAILED electrical inspection for only a portion of the campsite.

And what about the potential liability from trees falling on the campsites? No one has ever mentioned this; however, I recently received a note regarding damage to a camper's property from a fallen tree limb in the park.

As I have stated before, Sullivan County has dodged many bullets at Observation Knob Park due to kicking the can down the road relative to significant maintenance issues and ignoring / not managing a contractual Agreement, which has significantly disadvantaged the viability of the campground making a profit.

Had a private entity leased / managed Observation Knob Park in the same manner that Sullivan County has done so for the past decade, they would be certainly have gone bankrupt.....and no one would be trying to JUSTIFY sinking more money into this relentless money pit. I hope that my fellow Commissioners will be courageous and terminate Sullivan County's lease with TVA (noting that we have received confirmation from TVA that there will be no penalty associated with an early termination date) and thereby stop future funding.

It is our choice at this moment in time to either remain in the campground business and consequently assume the ongoing safety risks and potential liabilitiesor terminate the lease with TVA and turn the contractual issues over to the appropriate attorneys to help us negotiate a reasonable exit strategy.

RESOLUTION TO AMEND THE SULLIVAN COUNTY ZONING RESOLUTION TO IMPOSE ONE-YEAR MORATORIUM ON REZONING OF REAL PROPERTIES ON OR WITHIN 1/2 MILE FROM THE CENTER OF THE SOUTH FORK OF THE HOLSTON RIVER, FROM BOONE DAM TO THE SOUTH HOLSTON DAM TO COVER THE ENTIRE SOUTH FORK OF THE HOLSTON WATERSHED, IN CONJUNCTION WITH STUDY, RECOMMENDATIONS AND ACTION BY THE SULLIVAN COUNTY PLANNING & CODES DEPARTMENT, THE SULLIVAN COUNTY REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION, AND THIS BODY.

WHEREAS, the middle and south fork of the Holston River, have a national reputation for trout fishing; and

WHEREAS, fishing traffic on these rivers has increased; and

WHEREAS, real property owners on and near the south fork of the Holston River, are petitioning Sullivan County to rezone their properties to AR, ARV, and RRC districts for use as rental property, for construction of rental cabins, for camping and over-night stay, and for other uses related to said fishing; and

WHEREAS, it appears that there is not proper zoning regulation nor adequate public services in said area to support such use and development; and

LICENSE AGREEMENT

THIS LICENSE AGREEMENT ("License") is made and entered into as of the ______ day of ______, 2023 by and between K-VA-T Food Stores, Inc., a Virginia corporation, hereinafter "Licensor," and Sullivan County, Tennessee, a political subdivision of Sullivan County Tennessee Government, hereinafter "Licensee";

RECITALS

WHEREAS, Licensor desires to license space on the sidewalk fronting its Food City supermarket further described herein; and

WHEREAS, Licensee desires to license from Licensor space on the sidewalk fronting Licensor's Food City supermarket to provide and maintain a klosk for the purposes further described herein; and

NOW, THEREFORE, Licensor and Licensee, for and in consideration of the mutual covenants and premises contained herein, the concession and operating privileges granted herein, the premises occupied or utilized, the adequacy of said consideration being hereby acknowledged by both Licensor and Licensee, do agree and have agreed as follows:

1. - BASIC LICENSE TERMS

In addition to terms that are defined elsewhere in this License, whenever used in this License, unless a different meaning clearly appears from the context, the following terms have the following meanings:

1.1 <u>Kiosk.</u> The term "Kiosk" means an unstaffed, self-contained, and pre-fabricated kiosk used to facilitate vehicle tag renewals. The Kiosk is depicted in <u>Exhibit "A"</u>, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.

1.2 <u>Licensor.</u> The term "Licensor" means K-VA-T Food Stores, Inc.

1.3 Licensee. The term "Licensee" means Sullivan County, Tennessee.

1.4 <u>Licensed Premises</u>. The term "Licensed Premises" means that certain floor space located within Licensor's Food City supermarkets, as listed in <u>Exhibit "B"</u> hereof, for placement of the Kiosks, to be specifically located in on the sidewalk fronting Licensor's Food City supermarket in an area mutually agreeable to Licensor and Licensee.

1.5 <u>License Term</u>. The term "License Term" shall be construed to be a monthto-month tenancy, commencing on the Operational Date as hereinafter defined and ending on the thirtieth (30th) day after written notice from either Licensor or Licensee of its intention to terminate this License.

1.6 **Base Rent**. The monthly rent shall be \$0.00.

1.7 Addresses. See signature page.

1.8 <u>**Permitted Use**</u>. The term "Permitted Use" means the operation of the Kiosk and any related equipment for Licensee's customers, members and/or other parties as well as other related uses.

1.9 <u>Common Areas</u>. The term "Common Areas" means all open and accessible areas situated on or at the Shopping Center (defined herein), which are intended for use by all Licensees of the Licensor, as well as all customers, clientele and invitees of Licensor, including without limitation, all parking areas and all ways located thereon for ingress and egress to and from the public ways abutting upon the Shopping Center.

1.10 **Operational Date**. The term "Operational Date" means

1.11 **Shopping Center**. The term "Shopping Center" means the tract or parcel of land, including all buildings, structures, and improvements located thereon, which is owned, licensed or controlled by the Licensor. The Licensed Premises are located at the Shopping Center.

1.12 <u>Property</u>. The term "Property" means that certain property listed in <u>Exhibit "B"</u> on which a Food City Supermarket is located.

2. - GRANTING CLAUSE AND RENT PROVISIONS

2.1 <u>Grant of Premises</u>. Licensor hereby licenses to Licensee and Licensee hereby takes and hires from Licensor the Licensed Premises, during the License Term, subject to the provisions of this License. Licensor also hereby grants to Licensee and Licensee hereby hires and takes from Licensor for the License Term, the non-exclusive right to use the Property and the Common Areas, as well as the parking areas, streets, roads, driveways and walkways located thereon, for parking, for any other lawful purpose, and for ingress and egress to and from the Licensed Premises.

2.2 <u>Base Rent</u>. The monthly rent shall be \$0.00

2.3 <u>Taxes.</u> Licensee shall, as additional rent, reimburse the Licensor for the portion of such taxes assessed against the Licensee's improvements within thirty (30) days after request by Licensor and upon the presentation of photocopies of written receipts from the taxing authorities evidencing that the taxes have been paid. At the commencement and end (however occurring) of this License Term, taxes required to be paid by Licensee hereunder shall be apportioned, and Licensor shall pay that portion thereof applicable to the period before the Operational Date and after the end of the License Term hereof, respectively. Licensee shall pay all taxes and assessments lawfully levied or assessed against the Kiosk and Licensee's equipment, trade fixtures and other personal property placed upon the Licensed Premises by Licensee.

3. - OCCUPANCY AND USE

3.1 <u>Use</u>. The Licensed Premises shall be used and occupied only for the Permitted Use. Licensee has inspected the Licensed Premises and accepts it in its present condition. Licensee, at its expense, shall comply with all applicable legal requirements pertaining to Licensee's use of the Licensed Premises and with all reasonable rules and regulations of the Shopping Center adopted or amended from time to time by Licensor.

3.2 <u>Parking and Access</u>. Licensee shall have, for no additional payment, the non-exclusive right to use for itself, its customers, and any other users of the Licensed Premises, the parking facilities provided by Licensor. Licensor will not permit any permanent obstruction to be erected in the Shopping Center so as to block or impede access to the Licensed Premises.

4. - UTILITIES

Licensee shall, at its expense, have the right to install, or cause to be installed, all necessary utility services to the Licensed Premises as Licensee's needs require. Licensor grants Licensee temporary construction easements as required by Licensee to install, maintain and repair such utilities and to install, maintain and repair the Kiosk. Licensee shall, prior to delinquency, pay all utilities used or consumed by or supplied to Licensee in connection with the use of the Licensed Premises. Licensee agrees to restore portions of the Property, which may be affected by the installation of utilities, to the conditions they were in immediately prior to the installation. It is understood and agreed that Licensor shall have the right to review and approve the plans referenced in this Section.

5. - ALTERATIONS, IMPROVEMENTS and REMOVAL

5.1 <u>Kiosk</u>. Licensee will, at its expense; install the Kiosk on the Licensed Premises. The parties agree that any removable improvement, including, without limitation the Kiosk, installed upon the Licensed Premises by Licensee is neither a part of the realty nor a fixture. Any such removable improvement is the personal property of Licensee. At the termination or expiration of this License, Licensee shall remove any improvements and restore the Licensed Premises to substantially the same condition it was in prior to the installation of such improvements.

5.2 <u>Other Alterations</u>. Not including the improvements already authorized herein, Licensee may make or allow to be made any other alterations, physical additions or improvements in or to the Licensed Premises (including signs) so long as the written consent of Licensor, which shall not be unreasonably withheld, has first been obtained.

5.3 <u>**Removal**</u>. Licensee shall have the right at any time to enter the Licensed Premises and remove the Kiosk and any other personal property of Licensee. Licensee shall repair all material damage caused by such removal pursuant to the conditions outlined in Section 5.1 hereof.

6. - CASUALTY AND INSURANCE

6.1 <u>Waiver of Subrogation</u>. Notwithstanding anything contained herein to the contrary, Licensor and Licensee hereby waive and release each other of and from any and all rights of recovery, claims, actions or causes of action, against each other, their agents, officers and employees, for any loss and/or damage that may occur to the Licensed Premises, improvements to the Property, or personal property located within the Property, by reason of fire or the elements, regardless of cause or origin, including the negligence of Licensor or Licensee and their agents, officers and employees.

Hold Harmless. Licensor shall not be liable to Sullivan County and its employees while performing duties of their employment, for any injury to persons or damage to property on or about the Property or the Common Areas. Only to the extent liability is otherwise imposed upon Sullivan County by Tennessee law independent of this contractual agreement, and without waiving any immunity, rights

defenses, damages caps and/or protection available to Sullivan County under Tennessee law, Licensee shall hold Licensor harmless for and against any and all claims, injury, loss, damage or other liability arising solely out of Licensee's occupancy of the Licensed Premises.

6.2

Liability Insurance. Licensee at all times during the License Term 6.3 shall, at its own expense, keep in full force and effect comprehensive general liability insurance in accordance with Licensee's standard practices. Licensee shall, at the request of Licensor, provide evidence that Licensor is an additional insured on such insurance policy.

7. - PERMITS

Licensee shall, at Licensee's sole expense, apply for all necessary building and other permits and authorization required by applicable authorities for the installation and operation of the Kiosk.

8. - ASSIGNMENT OR SUBLET

Licensee Assignment. Licensee shall not assign, sublet, transfer 8.1 or hypothecate, in whole or in part, this License, by operation of law or otherwise, without the prior written consent of Licensor, which shall be at Licensor's sole Notwithstanding the foregoing, Licensor agrees that Licensee may, discretion. without Licensor's consent, assign or otherwise transfer the Licensed Premises to an affiliate or to a subsidiary or to an entity created by merger with, reorganization of, or recapitalization by Licensee, or to an entity which acquires all or a substantial portion of Licensee's assets within the market area containing the Licensed Licensor Assignment. Licensor shall have the right to sell, Premises. 8.2 transfer or assign, in whole or in part, its rights and obligations under this License. Any such sale, transfer or assignment shall operate to release Licensor from any and all liabilities under this License arising after the date of such sale, assignment or transfer, only if the transferee assumes such obligations.

9. - LIENS

Licensor waives any statutory or other lien on Licensee's improvements, fixtures and/or personal property located upon the Licensed Premises, including, without limitation, the Kiosk.

10. – LICENSE SUBORDINATE TO MASTER LEASE

10.1 <u>License Subordination</u>. Licensor's right, title, and interest in the Licensed Premises are derived solely from that certain lease agreement associated with the store identified in **Exhibit "B"** hereof and all related amendments and assignments thereof (the "Master Lease"). Notwithstanding any other provision herein, this License and the rights of Licensee hereunder are, and at all times shall be, subject and subordinate to the Master Lease(s) and any rights of the parties to the Master Lease(s). Licensee shall at no time use or permit the use of the Licensed Premises so as to cause a breach, default or violation of the Master Leases. In the event of any conflict between the provisions of the Master Lease shall control.

10.2 <u>Lease Termination</u>. Notwithstanding any of provision herein, this License shall automatically terminate upon (i) termination or expiration of the Master Lease or (ii) a determination that this License, or any of its provisions, materially violate the provisions of the Master Lease. Any such termination shall be without any liability whatsoever to Licensor.

11. - RELOCATION

Licensor may, at any time after providing fifteen (15) days written notice to Licensee, require the removal and/or relocation of the Kiosk. Licensee agrees that it shall promptly accomplish such removal/relocation.

12. - MISCELLANEOUS

12.1 <u>Waiver</u>. Failure of Licensor or Licensee to declare an event of default immediately upon its occurrence, or delay in taking any action in connection with an event of default, shall not constitute a waiver of the default, but such party shall have the right to declare the default at any time and take such action as is lawful or authorized under this License.

12.2 <u>Act of God</u>. Licensor or Licensee shall not be required to perform any covenant or obligation in this License, or be liable in damages to the other, so long as the performance or non-performance of the covenant or obligation is delayed, caused or prevented by an act of God, act of war, act of terrorism, force majeure or by the other party.

12.3 **<u>Attorneys' Fees</u>**. If there is any litigation arising out of this License, the prevailing party shall recover its reasonable attorneys' fees and costs in such litigation from the non-prevailing party.

12.4 **Successors.** This License shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of Licensor and Licensee and their respective heirs, personal representatives, successors and assigns.

12.5 <u>Notices.</u> Any notice under this License shall be deemed to be delivered (whether or not actually received) when deposited with a reliable overnight



SECTION 1. Tennessee Code Annotated, Section 41-4-115, is amended by deleting subsection (a) and substituting the following:



NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of these premises, the Department and the Agency hereby enter into this Agreement regarding the maintenance, existence, and use of the Project as described in SECTION 1 below.

SECTION 1: The Project to be performed is described as follows:

"Signals at the following Intersections: I-26 at SR-1 (LM 1.970); SR-36 at SR-1 (10.540) and SR-355 at SR-36 (LM 2.590)"

SECTION 2: Tenn. Code Ann. § 54-1-126 provides that the Department shall enter into a written contract that provides that the Agency is solely responsible for all maintenance of the completed work of the Project. Therefore, the provisions set forth in Tenn. Code Ann. § 54-1-126 shall apply to this Agreement. The Agency shall

be solely responsible for and pay all costs associated with maintenance of the Project. The Agency acknowledges that where any local road under the jurisdiction of the Agency ("Local Road") intersects with a state highway or other public road, the Agency's maintenance responsibility for the Local Road, including but not limited to traffic control devices, continues across the right-of-way of the intersecting state highway or public road to the point where the Local Road abuts the roadway of the state highway or public road.

The Agency's maintenance responsibility described herein includes, but is not limited to, signals and other electrically operated and/or solar powered devices which may be installed as part of the Project. The Agency shall be solely responsible for and pay all costs associated with maintenance and operation of all electrically operated devices which may be installed as part of the Project, together with the related equipment, wiring and other necessary appurtenances, and the Agency shall furnish electrical current to all such devices. Additionally, the Agency shall be solely responsible for and pay all costs associated with the maintenance and operation of solar powered devices which may be installed as part of the Project, including but not limited to replacement of solar panels, batteries, lights and lenses.

<u>SECTION 3</u>: The Agency shall assume all liability for third-party claims and damages arising from the maintenance, existence, and use of the Project to the extent provided by Tennessee Law and subject to the provisions, terms and liability limits of the Governmental Tort Liability Act, T.C.A. Section 29-20-101, et seq, and all applicable laws.

<u>SECTION 4</u>: The Agency agrees to comply with all applicable federal and Tennessee laws and regulations in the performance of its duties under this Agreement. The parties hereby agree that failure of the Agency to comply with this provision shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement and subject the Agency to the repayment of all funds expended, or expenses incurred, under this Agreement.

UT-TSU EXTENSION SULLIVAN COUNTY

Agriculture

Farm Safety Day- 95 people attended the Farm Safety day. Participants attended 4 talks on Tractor Safety, ATV Safety, Cattle Handling and Chain Saw Safety. The day started with everyone enjoying Biscuits and Juice and Coffee. Jeff Aiken from the Tennessee Department of Agriculture was the guest speaker. 30 participants donated blood at the March Blood Mobile.

Master Beef Producer – 17 Beef producers completed the Master Beef Producer Certification, receiving a certificate, MBP hat and MBP sign.

Tri- State Beef Conference- 180 beef producers attended the Tri-State Beef Conference which was held at the Ron Ramsey Agricultural Center.

Fruit Tree Grafting Workshop-36 people attended the Grafting Workshop, 800 trees were grafted at an 82% success rate.

Master Farm Manager- 4 Sullivan County Residents completed the Master Farm Manager course which focused on solid business principles and efficiently utilizing resources on the farm.


Master Small Ruminant- this course provides opportunities for producers to increase knowledge and skills needed to apply management practices necessary for profitability and sustainability of the sheep and goat industry. 5 Sullivan County residents completed this course.

Right Tree, Right Place- the proper placement and care of trees in the landscape and updates on insects and pest. This program offers commercial pesticide applicator points towards their recertification. 35 people attended this program and 175 commercial points were earned.

Master Gardener Program- trains and engages with volunteers to provide the public with research-based information on lawn and garden topics. EMGs are volunteers who have a love of plants and horticulture coupled with Extension training to equip them to teach and assist Tennessee residents. 38 new graduates are now members of Northeast Tennessee Master Gardener Association bringing the membership total to 158. The Master Gardeners logged 10,085 volunteer hours and donated 2,308 pounds of produce grown at MG projects around the community.

Soil Samples- 116 Soil Samples and 7 Forage Samples were processed through the University of Tennessee Soil, Plant and Pest Center in Nashville.

UT Extension provides a gateway to the University of Tennessee as the outreach unit of the Institute of Agriculture. With an office in every Tennessee county, UT Extension delivers education programs and research-based information to citizens throughout the state. In cooperation with Tennessee State University, UT Extension works for farmers, families, youth and communities to improve lives by addressing problems and issues at the local, state and national levels.

Tennessee Housing Development Agency Homebuyer' Education program is available for first-time homebuyers. Some educational topics include the process of applying for a mortgage to purchase a home, how to keep a budget, basic home maintenance, just to name a few. The course became available late April of this year, and 17 participants successfully completed the course in 2022.

Matter of Balance was offered 5 times at various locations in Sullivan County. A total of 57 participants completed this fall prevention course, participants programs resulting in estimated medical cost savings of \$53,466. Program participants report they are better equipped at preventing/reducing falls by increasing physical activity through flexibility, endurance, and strength exercises and making changes to home spaces to reduce fall risks. 2 class offerings are on the calendar for early 2023.

Food Preservation and Safety- 20 individuals learned to can food safely, used locally produced foods, and reduced risk for foodborne illness which resulted in potential savings in medical costs, productivity losses, and illness-related mortality totaling \$20,000. All classes featured locally produced fruits and or vegetables sourced from local growers.

Walk Across Tennessee took place August 29th through October 23rd. 173 participants/42 teams (ages ranging from 5-87) cumulatively walked 28,239 miles over the 8-week period. This group exercise program resulted in an estimated medical cost savings of \$176,715. Each week, educational resources such as exercise/wellness tips, recipes, and encouragement that accompanied individual and team leaderboards were provided. Local businesses including 2 Wal-Marts, Jersey Mike's, Smoothie King, and Great Body Wellness Company sponsored prizes for weekly drawings and top team and individual with the most reported mileage at the end of the program. This program will be offered again Fall 2023!

The Tennessee Nutrition and Consumer Education Program (TNCEP), provides nutrition and consumer education for individuals and families who are SNAP-eligible. In 2022, we completed 23 FREE classes/workshops for participants in all stages of life to develop the skills needed to choose and prepare healthy foods within a limited budget and choose a physically active lifestyle while moving toward self-sufficiency. In 2022, we had 4,134 face-to-face contacts and 25,154 social media contacts. On average, 11.2% of TN households were food insecure and 4.5% were very low food insecure between 2019-2021. The national average for the same period was 10.4% and 4.0%. In the fiscal year 2020, 818,933 people received SNAP benefits in Tennessee, and 20,223 people in Sullivan County received SNAP benefits. The average monthly benefit was \$120 per person.

Success Story- Harvey and I learned how simple changes in our diet significantly increases our health as we age: Both of us highly recommend this program to our friends.



What is SNAP's Economic Impact?

An average of \$98 million in SNAP benefits were issued each month in TN in FY 2020. SNAP benefits are spent on food, so they support farmers, processors, distributors, and retailers. Approximately 6,446 food retailers accept SNAP benefits in TN.

During economic downturns, every \$1 in new SNAP benefits issued can increase gross domestic product by \$1.54.

Three categories were offered for the school year contest: People, Animals/Birds, and Landscapes. Take a peek at the top entries from each category were displayed at Farm Expo on Feb. 4-5.

Farm Expo- Farm Expo was held on Feb. 4-5, 2023 at the Bristol Motor Speedway South Building. Sullivan County 4-H had displayed exhibits, including an animal petting area. Also on display were the winning entries from this year's 4-H Art Poster Contest and Photo Search.

Chick Chain – 27 members of the chick chain project received baby chicks on March 8th. Youth are now caring for their birds with a goal of returning five pullets(young female that have not yet begun to lay) for the multi-county poultry show and sale in August at the Appalachian Fair Grounds.

Private Applicator Recertification- A private applicator is an applicator who applies restricted-use pesticides by ground application for the purpose of producing an agricultural commodity on private property owned or rented by the applicator or the applicator's employer. Most private applicators are farmers, greenhouse and/or nursery operators.

Commercial Applicators Recertification- Individual who applies products for a fee and works under the supervision of a licensed peat control operator.

4-H Clover Bowl- It's a new year and the 4-H Clover Bowl will be here before we know it. Clover Bowl is a quiz-bowl style competition with questions on 4-H, Agriculture, Tennessee, Life Skills, Government and Science. Teams are ideally comprised of four students from the same grade, although teams of three can participate. Separate divisions for grades 4-8 are offered.
