QUARTERLY REPORT OF . PAT H. SPIVEY, SUPERINTENDENT

I Pat H. Spivey, Superintendent submitted his report I for the period ending March 31, 1972, which report was received and adopted by a voice vote of the

court and is in the following words and figures - to-wit:

HONORABLE JUDGE AND MEMBERS OF THE SULLIVAN COUNTY COURT IN SESSION APRIL 17, 1972 BLOUNTVILLE, TENNESSEE, 37617

Gentlemen:

Since the State Legislature has not taken final action on all programs that will affect our local budget, I have not yet submitted budget recommendations to the Sullivan County Board of Education for the 1972-73 School Budget.

I am submitting proposed amendments to this year's budget (1971-72), along with a breakdown showing sources of revenue. These amendments to the General Purpose School Fund and the reasons for the amendments are shown in Appendix A attached. As you know, it has been customary for several years to approve amendments to the current school budget prior to the close of the fiscal year as long as surplus funds from the previous school budget prior to the close of the fiscal year as long as surplus funds from the previous school year are available in the School Fund. The total of these proposed amendments is \$212,500.00. However, of this amount, only \$112,250.00 is charged to local funds. These amendments have been approved by the Sullivan County Board of Education and by the County Court Education Committee.

In addition to our General Purpose School Fund, Federal Public Law 89-10 funds are deposited in the Trustee's Office and Federal regulations require that these funds be budgeted separately. When the 1971-72 school budget was approved, it included \$439,646.00 in Public Law 89-10 funds. Since that time, we have received entitlements to an additional \$67,660.00 which requires budget approval in the form of an amendment before expenditure can be made. A revised budget covering all P. L. 89-10 funds including the additional \$67,660.00 is attached (Appendix B). P. L. 89-10 funds can be spent only in accordance with Federal guidelines that establish the types of approvable programs. However, the County Court must approve these funds before the money can be spent. With these funds we are

for approximately 1,000 elementary students, providing liabrary books for all children, furnishing special remedial instructional materials for educationally handicapped children, and providing funds for indigent dental cases through the Health Department.

I would like to remind the Court, as I have in previous reports, that we may not be able to continue paying many regular classroom teachers from Federal Title I funds. At the end of the 1970-71 school year, we had forty-eight regular teachers on the Title I payroll. This program was not approved in August, 1971, because it was not compensatory in nature.

The original Elementary and Secondary Education Act (P. L. 89-10) passed by the Congress in 1965 permitted and even encouraged school systems to employ regular classroom teachers to reduce pupil -teacherratios. The original Act has never been amended to the contrary. However, recent guidelines issue by the office of Health, Education, and Welfare to the various state departments of education and relayed by them in turn to local boards of education have changed the meaning of the Act to eliminate regular Classroom teachers employed to reduce pupil-teacher ratios.

Last September we were instructed by our Tennessee State Department of Education to drop fifteen regular classroom teachers from the Title I project. These teachers were t tenure teachers and had to be absorbed in our regular program. Their salaries are reflected in our amendments that will be presented to the April term of Court. This leaves us presently with thirty-three teachers on the Title I program which, according to recent interpretations, is still not approvable.

At a recent meeting in Nashville with Title I officials, we were instructed to remove the remaining thirty-three regular classroom teachers from the project. This would involve \$227,000.00 in local money. After many hours of discussion, we were told unofficially that we would be given an extra year to phase out the program if we would remove an additional thirteen teachers for the 197-73 school year. This amounts to approximately \$106,000.00. However, it should be kept in mind that when the final project is presented this summer, it is entirely possible that the remaining twenty teachers would have to be dropped or replaced with local money. Although I do not think this will happen, I feel that it is my responsibility to point out this possibility to the Court. The entire supervious staff is working on this program in an effort to convert it to an approvable project.

I should point out that this problem is not unique to Sullivan County but is being faced by most of the school systems in Tennessee.

Our schools will close on Tuesday, May 30. We have beenfortunate this year in having lost only one day due to snow. This allowed us to have a week for Easter vacation and also to close schools almost a week earlier than in the past several years.

We again plan to operate a summer elementary program with Federal funds under P. L. 89-10. The elementary summer school centers will be a Blountville, Bluff City, Cedar Grove, Lynn Garden, Sullivan and Valley Pike. The high school summer program will be at Central High School and will be financed through student tuition.

The following is a brief report of the Extension Agent (Home Economics) for the quarter ending March 31, 1972.

A course in clothing construction was completed for interested residents at Edgemont Towers in Bristol.

A great deal of time was spent in planning and preparing the Extension Home Economics plan of work for July 1, 1972 through June 30, 1973.

A nutrition survey was taken among home demonstration club members to help establish their food planning, buying and preparation habits, and to help determine the eating practices of their families. Results were compiled and this information was used for determining some areas of emphasis for the food health and nutrition program in the next five year period.

For five weeks I attended the University of Tennessee to complete another nine hours of course work toward a master of science degree.

Training was given to home demonstration club home management leaders to help prepare them for teaching the subject matter in their local clubs.

Meetings of the county nutrition committee were held to make plans for preparing foods and nutrition information for the lower income people of the county.

A new home demonstration club was organized in the Greenacres area of Kingsport.

I attended two days of in-service-training on communications methods and two days on the Art of Macrame, and one day of 4-H club camp planning.

Plans were also begun for several activities and events that will take place in April. These activities were in addition to the preparation of radio programs, news columns, attending home demonstration club meetings, and other routine office duties.

This is a brief report from the two Assistant Extension Agents, doing 4-H Club work, for the quarter ending March 31, 1972.

Pat and Jon attended a one day workshop in Elizabethton.

Jon was involved in a 4-H Camp Planning workshop in Morristown.

Pat attended a one day Estate Planning Shortcourse in Johnson City.

Jon took 9 days of annual leave during the quarter.

Approximately 60 4-H members entered the County Public Speaking contest. The four local winners attended the district competition in Knoxville. Sullivan County had two of the four District winners and one was chosen as alternate..they all received blue awards. Five delegates were chosen for 4-H Congress in Nashville and sponsors were OBTAINED for each delegate.

Sullivan County 4-H Honor Club helped in obtaining 125,000 strawberry plants for the county.

Jon worked on plans with the Holston Ruitan Club and the first County Steer Show was to be held April 8th.

Sullivan County had 32 of the 34 entries in the County Show. Jon visited most of the 4-H'ers during the quarter and helped some of the younger 4-H'ers with their calves.

Fourteen 4-H club members signed up for the Puultry Chick-Chain. 450 baby chicks were distributed across the country.

Approximately 4- 4-H members attended a quarter HOrse Clinic in Knoxville.

The newly formed 4-H Livestock Club, Dairy Club, and three Horse and Pony Clubs met during January, February and March. Jon attended most of these meetings and helped his new 4-H leaders with their respective clubs.

Jon attended the Y. F. &H. meeting in January and the Farm Bureau meeting in February.

Pat and Jon made plans for two electric workshops during the quarter. One held in Bristol had approximately 25 4-H members attending.

Jon and several members of the 4-H Livestock Club held a workshop for Bristol Steer and Heifer Show exhibitors. Approximately 15 4-H members and parents attended.

Jon and Pat spent most of their time meeting the 57 4-H clubs and approximately 1900 4-H members in addition to the weekly news columns and radio programs.

I J. W. McClain, Extension Leader for Sullivan County OF COUNTY AGENT, J. W. MCCLAIN I presented his report for the period ending March 30;

1972, which report was adopted by a voice vote of

the Court and is in the following words and figures, to-wit:

TO: JUDGE LON V. BOYD AND MEMBERS OF THE SULLIVAN COUNTY QUARTERLY COURT.

This is a brief report of the Sullivan County Agricultural Extension Agent for the quarter ending March 31, 1972. We have mailed 896 soil samples to the Soil Testing Laboratory this quarter. Last year Sullivan County ranked fourth in the number of soil samples tested with 1089 from 575 individuals.

We had Joe Burns, U. T. Agronomist, here on January 27 for two corn production meetings. Then on March 2 Dave Weaver, U. T. Weed Control Specialist, was here for two Chemical Weed Control meetings with a good portion of the discussion on weed control in corn. There will be plenty of blight resistant seed corn available this year. The UsDA Statistical Reporting Service shows the 1971 average corn yield for Sullivan County was 73 bushels per acre. This was the second highest yield in the State and was 18 bushels higher than the State average of 55 bushels State and was 18 bushels higher than the State average of 55 bushels.

Gilbert Rhodes, U. T. Tobacco Specialist, was here on February 3 for two tobacco production meetings and a discussion of the puundage control program. A number of tobacco quotos will be leased this year. Some growers will be producing some of the Maryland type tobacco in 1972 as this kind of tobacco is not under a control program.

We had 42 Sullivan County people to attend An Estate Planning Shortcourse at Johnson City on February 24. This was the first time such meetings have been held across the State sponsored by the Agricultural Extension Service.

On March 21, the U. T. Agricultural Biology Department released some Alfalfa Weevil predator wasps on a farm near the Airport. It will take some time to see how effective they will be. We hope to have some more released, if they are available.

Our D. H. I. A., Annual meeting was held January 12, The associateon average for this past test year on 1219 cows was 11,400 pounds milk and 455 pounds butterfat, up 400 milk and 21 pounds butterfat from the previous year.

We have worked with the Appalachian Holstein in planning their spring sale for April 22 at Appalachian District Fairgrounds. 8 Sullivan County breeders have consigned animals to this sale. We have met with the Tri-State Guernsey Association at their Annual meeting and meeting to plan their 1972 activities. The Sullivan A. B. A. Annual meeting was on February 26.

I have assisted 3 farmers in freeze branding their cattle. We have 13 beef herds enrolled in the Beef Cattle Improvement Program. Three of these have bulls on 140 day feed tests and they are weighed every 28 days and rates of gain calculated. We have met with the Angus and Hereford Feeder Calf Sale directors.

We did beef cattle production and pasture surveys on 30 farms as a basis for planning our plan of work in these areas.

We assisted the 4-H Honor Club in taking orders for and distributing some 125,000 strawberry plants the last week in March.

We have met and worked with the Sullivan County Fair Directors and Sullivan County Farm Bureau Directors.

As usual, most of my time has been spent with farm visits, office calls and telephone calls. These range from questions concerning lawns and shrubbery to entire farm planning. A large number of bullentins on various subjects have been distributed.

Bob Cain, Holstein fieldman spent some time in County assisting in registration of Holstein cattle.

Specialists in the Agronomy department from U. T. assisted in holding County wide meetings on Corn Production, Tobacco and Weed Control.

Programs were supplied to garden clubs at Town and Country and Blue Ridge and home demonstration club at Weaver.

Assistance was given in delivering 450 baby chicks to 10 4-H members in the Kingsport area. The district 4-H Club Camp planning session was attended in Morristown.

County wide events and activities assisted with were; annual election of Soil Conservation Supervisors, annual Production Credit membership meeting, Soil Conservation Service Soil Judging Awards Banquet, and Fair workshop.

Training meeting attended or participated in was 2 day Communication School, Estate Planning Shortcourse and Seed Corn Promotion meeting.

Many problems have been brought up on lawn, shrub, landscaping and gardens.

Approximately 125 thousand strawberry plants were ordered and delivered to growers in the County by 4-H Honor Club members.

The following items represent the major efforts of the Sullivan County Civil Defense Office for the first quarter of calendar year, 1972.

Final distribution was made of the joint Community Shelter Plan.

. . . . . .

A 30 kw generator and a 575 gallon water storage tank were procured from Federal Surplus Property for the Emergency Operations Center in the Civic Auditorium in Kingsport,. One of the 7.5 kw generators in existence in the Emergency Operations Center was given to the Sheriff's Department. Additional painting and carpenter work was done in the Emergency Operations Center.

A request was made through the Federal Excess Property Program for a helicopter to be used by local law enforcement and other emergency services.

Sixteen (16) active members of the Continental Radio Association in Bristol were trained as Civil Defense Radiological Monitors.

A proposal was made to utilize an existing Federal Communications Commission license for Kingsport in a new communications net work for all of Sullivan County with a potential for a shortwave network that could include all Upper East Tennessee.. This net work would be used by all chief executives and designated key personnel.

A flood warning was disseminated to Scott County, Virginia under existing mutual assistance agreements.

An address was given the Breakfast Civitan Club in Kingsport.

Work was begun on magnetic maps and map symbols to be used in the Emergency Operations Center in Kingsport.

Invitations were mailed to local officials to attend Governor Dunn's Natural Disaster Preparedness Seminar in Johnson City.

Plans were formulated for an Emergency Operations Simulation Training to be held in Kingsport on June 12th.

REPORT OF SULLIVNA COUNTY INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AGENCY TO The Sullivan County Quarterly Court April 17 , 1972

Since the last regular meeting of the Quarterly Court in January, 121 personal Contacts have been made on major industries in Western Pennsylvania, Northern Ohio, primarily in the Cleveland and Akron Area, Cinicinnati, Ohio and Detroit area.

As a result of these contacts and inquiries from our advertising program, we list 16 bona fide substantial prospects. These are prospects who indicated that they actually do have a project and that East Tennessee is an area of possible consideration.

Since January 20, 25 inquiries have been received as a result of our advertising in various news media. Of these, 5 can be considered prospects. The others are still unclassified as to the sincerity of the inquiry. Brochures have been mailed with appropriate letters and follow-up will be made.

The industries under operation in the Industrial Park, Amerace-Esna and Tennessee CEMCO, are currently employing approximately 120 people. Amerace-Esna reports they

they will commence operations shortly after May 1st. They have been training women in a rented facility in Johnson City since the middle of January. It is anticipated by the end of this year there will be approximately 800 to 1000 people employed in the Industrial Park.

For a considerable time we have beennegotiating with the legal department and top management of Amerace-Esna for an agreement on the payment of a "service charge" to be paid to the County Trustee in lieu of taxes. We have been informed by Amerace's attorney that this agreement has been signed by Amerace officials and is currently in the mail to us. Under normal conditions, Amerace-Ensana would pay approximately \$330 to Sullivan County for the taxable year 1971 and the estimated tax for 1972 would be in the order of \$28,000.

For the year 1972, The Great American Corporation, owner and Lessor of the building to Imperial Reading, will probably pay approximately \$450, more or less, depending on the tax rate. For the 1973 year, the taxes on this operation, both from Imperial Reading, covering personal property, equipment and inventory, and Great American Corporation, on the land and building, will amount to some \$32,000 to \$33,000 a year. Tennessee CEMCO taxes should amount to approximately \$900 to \$1000 per year.
