EMPLOYMENT

During the quarter, continued emphasis has been placed on employment for AFDC recipients. Currently, we are in the process of determining if it is appropriate to refer all people receiving service through this agency to the Department of Employment Security Office for consideration in training and/or employment. Two hundred and thirty-four cases were evaluated this quarter, with thirty-eighttof the cases found to be appropriate for referral to Employment Security.

It is further understood and agreed that in the event the actual allowable costs of the project fall below the amount of \$38,960 on which this grant is based, the percentage of allowable costs to be paid from funds appropriated pursuant to Section 214, of the Appalachian Regional Development Act shall be reduced to the amount which, when combined with sponsor funds of \$11,688 will equal but not exceed 50 percent of the actual allowable costs of this project.

OF THE DEPARTMENT OF HIGHWAYS OF THE STATE OF TENNESSEE

TO THE COUNTY OF SULLIVAN, TENNESSEE:

The DEPARTMENT OF HIGHWAYS of the State of Tennessee, hereinafter called "DEPARTMENT", proposes to construct a project designated as NO: SP-82008-2203-04 ROW IN THE COUNTY OF SULLIVAN, provided the COUNTY will cooperate with the DEPARTMENT as set forth hereinafter so that the general highway program be carried out in accordance with the intent of the General Assembly of the State.

Accordingly, if the COUNTY will agree:

- 1. That in the event any suits in cross-eminent domain are instituted by reason of the DEPARTMENT, or its Contractor, going upon the right-of-way- and easements, and constructing said projects in accordance with the plans and as necessary to make the completed project functional, it will notify in writing, the DEFARTMENT'S Attorney , whose address is 812 Highway Building, Nashville, Tennessee 37219, of the institution of each suit, the declaration and all other pleadings, within ten(10) days of the filing of each of the same, under penalty of defending such suits and paying any judgments which result therefrom at its own expense; and
- 2. To provide traffic large in accordance with the widths shown on the plans for the project, close any streets as may be indicated on said plans and prohibit parking on the entire right-of-way unless, and to the extent that parking may be specificially authorized thereby; and
- 3. To transfer or cause to be transferred to the DEPARTMENT, WITHOUT cost, all land owned by it or by any of its instrumentalitiess as may be needed for right-of-way or easement purposes, provided such land is being used for street, alley or other public way purposes.
- 4. To cooperate with the DEPARTMENT to effect the removal, relocation or adjustment, without cost to the DEPARTMENT, of the facilities of any utility, public and private, which are located within the right-of-way of any streets, alley, or other public way, as may be necessary to construct the project.
- 5. That if any frontage roads are constructed by the DEPARTMENT as a result of the construction of this project, it will maintain such roads in the same menner as its streets are maintained, without cost to the DEPARTMENT; and
- 6. That after said project is completed and accepted, such parts of the present highway as are not removed, but are replaced by said project, will be accepted by it for future maintenance; and
- 7. Not to pass any Resolutions which would be in conflict with any of the above prescribed provisions; then

The Department, following the acceptance of this Proposal, will acquire the right-of -way and easements necessary to commitment the project in accordance with the plans and any amendments thereto, thereafter accomplish the construction of the project, and defend any cross-eminent domain suits of which it has received the notices provided for herein.

The plans for the project hereinbefore identified by number are incorporated by reference thereto and shall be considered a part hereof, including any revisions or amendments thereto, provided a copy of each is furnished the COUNTY.

The acceptance of this Proposal shall be evidenced by the enactment of a proper Resolution which shall incorporate the same verbatim, on or before the 1st day of January , 1969.

BE IT RESOLVED THAT Highway 11 W is a highway which connects the city of Knoxville, Tennessee with the city of Bristol, Tennessee and serves Knox, Grainger, Hawkins and Sullivan counties and is at present a narrow two lane highway, and,

WHEREAS, this is one of the most, if not the most, traveled highways leading from Knoxville and is the only major highway from Knoxville which is not a four-lane highway, and
