QUARTERLY REPORT OF SUPT OF SCHOOLS & J. CRAFT AKARD,

J. Czaft Akard, Superintendent of Sullivan County Schools presented his report for the quarter ending March 31, 1971, which report was received and adopted by a voice vote of the Court and is in the following words and figures to-wit:

HONORABLE JUDGE AND MEMBERS OF THE SULLIVAN COUNTY COURT IN SESSI N APRIL 19,1971, BLOUNTSTILLE, TENN. 37617 At the present time I have not submitted recommendations to the Sullivan County Board of Education for the 1971-72 School Budget due to the various educational programs under study by the State Legislature that will affect our local budget.

I would like to discuss the proposed amendments to this years budget (1970-71). It has been a normal proced ure over the years to approve amendments to the current shoool budget prior to the close of the fiscal year as long as surplus funds from the previous year are available in the School fund. Many factors arise during a given school year that warrant these amendments, The proposed 1970-71 amendments to the General purpose Scool Fund and the reasons for the proposed amendments are attached (Apendix A).

Although the total amendments involve expenditures of \$352,000.00, only \$113,000.00 are charged to local funds. These amendments have been approved by the Sullivan County Board of Education and have been

discussed with the Court Education Committee who will take action prior to the April term of Court.

In addition to our General purpose School Fund, Federal Public Law 89-10 Funds are deposited in the County Trustee's office and must be budgeted separately. When you approved regular budgets for the 1970-71 school year, you approved a Public Law 89-10 Budget in the amount of \$4,39,646.00. Since that time we have received an additional \$68,529.00 which will require an amendment to the present funds approved hander Public Law 89-10. Amendments are attached (Appendix B). The total budget under Public Law 89-10 including amendments is also attached (Appendix CO Although County Court has no control over how these Federal funds will be spent under Public Law 89-10 Title I and Title II, the County Court must technically approve the funds before we can spend the money. These are Federal guidelines that determine the type of programs for which they money may be used. For your information Public Law 89-10 Title I and Title II funds in Sullivan County pay the salaries of forty-six regular classroom teachers, finance a summer instructional rogram for approximately 1,000 students, provided library books for all children as well as special instructional materials, provide funds to the County Health Department for indigent dental cases, and provide funds on a cooperative basis with two other school systems to finance a summer program for a limited number of special education students.

As in past years, I would like to point out that in comparison with other school systems we feel we have been conservative in the expenditure of funds for current operating expenses, which inclue all expensess incurred by our school system in a given year with the exception of school construction.

According to the State Annual Statistical Report put out by the State Department of Education for the 1969-70 school year (last school year), we spent \$462,00 per child for current school expenditures, whereas the state average was \$511.86. Bristol's expenditure was \$672.80 and Kingspor's \$605.72. If we had spent as much per child as E ristol and Kingsport, our budget would have been incre ased as follows:

\$672.80 (Bristol)- 511.86- \$160.94 per child in average daily attendance x 17,060 (County Children)

= \$2,745,636.40.

\$605.72 (Kingsport) 511.86 =\$93,86 per child in average daily attendance x 17,060 (County children) =\$1,602,251.60.

Since we will be submitting to you in the near future our peoposed 1971-72 school Budget, I would like to remind you of the formula for the distribution of the property school tax revenue. Bristol and Kingsport whose residents pay county taxes share in the distribution of the county school tax rate on the basis of the school ration between the county and the cities. The ratio for the past school year was:

Last school year Bristol received \$548.061.15 and Kingsport \$984,082.42 from the County Schoo taz rate. This does not include any funds the cities might receive from school bond issues. Distribution of these funds is based on the same formula as the distribution of the current school tax rate. Please note the attached School (Appendix D) indicating the school tax rate including the cities' share from 1960 until the present.

Also attached is a comparison of the School tax rate with other county department budgets for the 1968-69, 1969-70, and 1970-71 fiscal years (Appendix E).

A comparison of the current school expenditures 1969070 per pupil in Sullivan County with a selected number of our neighboring school systems is attached (appendix F). The figures are not devised by me but are taken from the Annual Statistical Report of the State Department of Education for the School year ending June 30, 1970 submitted to Governor Ellington by J.H. Warf, Commissioner of Education. A copy of this book is on file in my offsice. I would hasten to say that this does not mean that the County

education than we regardless of the source of remenue. I might also point out that according to a research bulletin put out by the Tennessee Education Association, Sullivan County in 1965 ranked first in per capita annual income. We are still eigher first or second.

"In essence we are saying we should not be askamed to point out to the citizens of Sullivan County that we fell we are doing a pretty good job in the operation of our school system when our expenditures are compared with that of our neighboring school isystems. Are we not justified in asking for more money for our schools?

Sullivan County Schools will close Friday, June 4, Even with the days loast on account of snow, we will close the same week as neighboring school systems. Schools will be closed Friday April 9, and Monday April 12, for Easter Holidays.

In order to prevent the loss of school time next fall, we have just completed registration for next lyear of all students now in school and school schedules have been submitted to our office.

This procedure has been followed for many years.

Three of our high schools are involved this school year in an evaluation by a committee representing the Southern Association of Secondary Schools, the hilbest accrediting abjency in the South. Central held their evaluation last December. Sullivan High is scheduled for the week of April 5 and East High for the week beginning April 19. Lynn View and Ketron were evaluated last year.

Sufficient federal funds under Public Law 89-10 will be available to pay operating costs for our summer elementary program. Summer school for high school students will be financed with tuition provided by students. Elementary summer school centers will be at Sullivan, Lynn Garden, Cedar Grove, Elementary land Valley Pike. Summer school for hight school students will be held at Central High School. Both high school and elementary summer schools will start Monday, June 14.

This is a brief report from the County Extension Agent for the quarter ending March 31, 1971. The Southern Corn Leaf Blight has and still is of great concern to corn growers. Planting resistant varieties is the only control and this seed is in short supply. We have used meetings, T. V., radio, newspapers, Extension bulletins visits, and office and telephone calls to explain the blight and the type seed to plant, We have also worked

closely with local seed dealers on this problem. A special publication, "Alternatives to Corn Silage" has been distributed to silage producers.

We did a survey of corn production practices on a number of farms and used this in preparing our corn plan of work. We also updated our dairy plan of work.

I have worked with the ASCS office in getting out information on the 1971 Feed Grain and Wheat programs and the new Rural Environmental Assistance Program. The tobacco program has been changed by Congress from acreage allotments to pounds allotments and we will assist in getting this explained to growers.

Soil testing has been stressed this quarter. We have mailed 641 sample to the soil testing laboratory since January 1.

We had our DHIA Annual meeting January 28, an Artifical Breeders Association directors meeting January 20 and Annual meeting March 13, and the Tri-State Guernsey Annual meeting February 20. An area dairy meeting was held in Johnson City on February 24 by our U. T. dairy specialists. I have worked closely with the Appalachian Holstein Breeders Association in planning and selecting animals for their first sale on April 10. Five Sullivan County breeders consigned 10 animals.

We have met with directors of the Mountain Breeders and Angus Feeder Calf Sale directors to discuss last years sales, and plan for 1917. Dr. Haley M. Jamison, U. T. Animal Husbandman, was here for two beef cattle meetings in February. Information on "Grass Tetant" was distributed to beef cow owners in early January. We have assisted with area registered beef cattle sales.

I do weekly radio program on a Bristol and a Kingsport station and a T. V. program every two weeks on WCYB-TV. As usual, most of my time is spent with individual telephone and office calls and farm visits. These range from a specific question to entire farm planning.

I assisted the 4-H Honor Club in taking orders for and delivering some 135,000 strawberry plants. A large number of questions on varieties, fertilization, setting, weed control etc. were answered. Respectfully submitted,

Many calls are coming to our office for assistance in problems relating to shrhbs, lawns, trees and fruits and vegetables.

Program on landscaping was supplied to leaders of the following Garden Clubs: Town and Country, Bell Meadows and Rosewood Clubs. Home Demonstration Clubs attended and program supplied were: Twin City and Central Heights. Leader training meetings of Directors of Angus Feeder Calf Directors were attended and annual meeting of Mountain Breeders Sale members along with several consignors from Sullivan County.

A three day In-Service training on Horticulture was attended in Knoxville.

Also one day In-Service training on forage production, weed control and varieties was attended.

Sullivan County DHIA annual meeting was held with V. D. Parsons, Dairy Specialist from U. T. presenting the annual summary of all herds participating. Agriculture committee meetings at both Bristol and Kingsport Chamber of Commerce. The annual 4-H Finished Steer Show and h-H Pullet Show and Sale were discussed.

Baby shicks were distributed to forty 4-H boys and girls. Atotal of 1,825 chicks were placed this year.

The 4-H Clubs were met during February and part of March while Mr. Jon Baker, 4-H Agent in charge was in school. Program for the month was on gardening.

Orders were taken again this year for strawberry plants. The 4-H Senior Clubs did most of the orders. A total of 135,000 plants were secured and delivered to both home gardeners and commercial growers.

Record books were collected, summarized and forwarded to Knoxville for all Unit Test Demonstration farms. Also requisitions were submitted for approval for demonstration fertilizer for 1971 crop year.

The Guernsey Association held their ammual meeting and one Director's meeting was attended at which time the annual field and Junior Sale was planned.

A one day fair workshop was attended along with two leaders from Sullivan County Fair Committee. Other meetings attended were: Annual Production Credit Association, Sullivan County Artificial Breeders Association and Farm Bureau Directors.

Mr. Jim Pointer, Horticulture Specialist, U. T. Exension Service spent 2 days in county visiting Greenhouse operators. This is a new service from the University and Mr. Fointer is visiting all plant and flower growers to offer assistance in any problems that may be present.

Considerable time was spent in answering calls on varieties of crops, corn leaf blight, shrubs, lawns, flowers, trees and small fruits.

Approximately fifteen 4-H members and leaders were accompanied to a livestock evaluation conference at University of Tennessee at Knoxville.

CUARTERLY REPORT Richard N. Moore, Director Civil Defense Office presented his report for the quarter ending March 31, 1971, which report was received and adopted by a voice vote of the Court and is in the following words and figures, torwit:

TO THE HONORALBE LON V. BOYD, COUNTY JUDGE, AND MEMBERS OF THE SULLIVAN COUNTY QUARTERLY COURT,

April 12, 1971

The following items represent the major efforts of the Sullivan County Civil Defense Office for the first quarter of calendar year, 1971.

The Kingsport Civil Air Patrol Squadron received training from the State Radiological Deferce Officer enabling them to qualify as Aerial Monitors. This training would be used to chech radiation levels in East Terressee through the use of aircraft in the event of a nuclear emergency. The Kingsport Civil Air Patrol group is the first such unit to be trained in this field in East Tennessee.

A simulated Emergency Test Exercise was conducted in Kinraport utilizing members of the American Radio Relay League, the American Red Cross, the City of Kinzsport, Civil Air Patrol, Holston Valley Community Hospital, Meade Corporation, Kinzaport City Schools and more than one hundred (100) volunteers. The exercise was conducted to determine the response in the event of a local disaster was held in conjunction with the annual nation-wide communication test held by Amateur Radio Operators.

Bristol Virginia-Temnessee conducted their first joint Civil Defense preparances exercise in their new Emergency Operations Center that serves as the Bristol Virginia Safety Building.

The Emergency Operations Simulation Training was attended by more than sixty (60) persons led by Virginia Mayor H.L. Littleton and Tennessee Mayor Jere King. Also attending were representatives of the federal government, States of Virginia and Tennessee, Washington County, Virginia, Sullivan County, Tennessee plus several Southwest Virginia towns and counties.

The exercise, conducted by the University of Tennessee Civil Defense Extension Division, was termed a success by the federal and state observers and was the first of its kind that embraced a common operations area for two cities, two states and two federal civil defense regions.

The Region Three Civil Defense Council meeting was attended in which reports were given concerning the new emphasis civil defense is placing on national disasters.

Plans were made to connect the Tri-City Weather Bureau with the Bristol Virginia Emergency Operations Center for direct warning to Scotthwest Virginia in the event of severe weather conditions.

An inventory, replacement, and recalibration of all radiological monitoring devices was begun with the assistance of the State Indio Logical Defense Maintenance Shop.

S shortwave antenna was installed at the Bristol Emergency Operations Center to facilitate local communicators in the event of an emergency.

The Annual Oak Ridge National Laboratory Civil Defense Research Project was attended at the Union Carbide facility at Y12. Included in the reports by various scientists were methods of hasty fallout shelter construction, the effects of electromagnetic pulse on radio transmitters and receivers under fallout conditions, utility systems analysis and the urban use of waste heat from a nuclare reactor.

- 2. The Board will also review, analyze, and report to the appropriate County Count Committee all proposed and new programs related to the education curriculum in the County School system.

 This report will include (1) the source of the suggested course, (2) the need and objective for the proposed course, (3) the means to measure the effectiveness of the course, (4) the estimated cost of the course which will include the monies funded from sources outside the County, (5) the cost of the county if the "outsude" funding is discontinued. The secretary of the Board will be responsible for filing the report with the Court at its first meeting of each calender year or as the Board directs.
- 3. The Board will elect a chairman and a vice-Chairman from its members. The terms of chairman and vice-chairman will be for a two year period. A person elected to either office can serve only two (2) consecutive terms and cannot succeed himself or hold the other office for a two year term.

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4. The Secretary of the Board will be the Superintendent of Sullivan County Schools.

E. Vacancies

When a vacancy occurs on the Board by death, resignation, change of residence from the school district he represents, no attendance at five (5) consecutive meetings of the Board or otherwise, such vacancy shall be filled in the following manner.

If two (2) years of less remains on the term to be filled, then the County Court shall elect a temporary member for the Board who resider in the required shoool district and meets other This board member, temporarily elected by the County Court, must stand for election by voters in his district at the next county, state, or federal general or special election.

special election shall be weld as soon as possible in the applicable district if more than 2 years remains on the term of the created warangy.

F. Compensation of Board Members

The compensation of the Board members shall be \$175.00 per annum and the Chairman of the Board shall receive \$200.00 per annu. No other compensation shall be paid to the Board members except as directed by the County Court.

G. Meetings

The Board shall meet at the call of the Chairmanand at least once per month during the school year and twice in the summer. If the school year evolves into a twelve month or four quarter schedule, then the Board will meet monthly year round. Monthly meetings will be scheduled and the schedule will be published in the leading papers of Sullivan County at the beginning of the school year and posted on the bulletin board of all schools. Also each child will be given a schedule for his or her parents edification,

The Board meetings shall comply with other appropriate state statutes.

This ACREEMENT made and entered into by and between the STATE OF TENNESSEE through its Department of Highways, hereinafter called "DEPARTMENT" and SULLIVAN COUNTY, hereinafter called "COUNTY".

WITMESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Department has tentatively allocated certain funds for the construction of the following described Industrial Access Road in the COUNTY of SULLIVAN, Tennessee, known and designated as Project No. 82945-8406-04 provided said COUNTY will cooperate with said Department by acquiring the right-of-way for the same:

The State to resurface the present road through the Tri-Cities Industrial Park, from State Route 34 to County Road. Length of project is 1.7 miles.

WHEREAS, said COUNTY has furnished the State with proof that the its application for an Industrial Access Road was approved by resolution, No._____, dated the 13th day of July, 1970.

NOW, THEREFORE, it is agreed by and between the parties hereto as follows:

- 1. The COUNTY agrees that it will acquire the rights-of-way and easements shown on the blue prints which accompany this agreement in accordance with the provisions of Public Acts of 1959, Chapter 264, said rights-of-way to be free of obstructions, buildings and improvements, and said rights-of-way to be acquired without cost, now or hereafter, to said epartment or the State of Tennessee; and
- 2. The COUNTY agrees in the event of the institution of any actions at law in accordance with the authority contained in Section 23-1423, Tennessee Code Annotated, the same shall be defended by COUNTY, and any judgments resulting therefrom shall be considered as a consequence of the failure of the COUNTY to acquire the rights-of-way in full and accordingly shall be paid by the COUNTY.
- 3. The COUNTY agrees to save said Department and the State of Tennessee harmless from any and all claims or suits which may be brought by reason of the Department's going upon said rights-of-way and the land covered by said easements and taking the same for the purpose of constructing said project, and by reason of the Department's changing the grade and widening the existing highway; and

4. The COUNTY agrees to remove or adjust, or have the owners of the same remove or adjust all telephone, telegraph, light and power poles or towers, and all water, gas and sewer mains or pipes or any other facilities of any nature or description which may be necessary for the construction of said section of project, and will make or require abutting property owners to dake such sewer, water and gas connections as may be necessary or desirable in advance of the laying of any pavement upon said project, and to secure permits for, and to assume the cost of any installation or re-installation of any railroad grade crossing and any signalization required, all without cost, now or hereafter, to the State of Tennessee or said Depaatment.

FURTHER, the Department will, as soon as practicable after this agreement is executed and the necessary rights-of-way are acquired, either take bids for the construction of said project, and construct the same, or construct said project with State corces.

Said project is an Industrial Access Road and not on the State System of Highways and it is expressly agreed that after the construction is completed and all work performed under the

section of road and wil at all times keep it in a state of repair satisfactory to the State.

In case of failure of the COUNTY to maintain the same in accordance with reasonable standards established by the Department of Highways, the latter may take over the maintenance of said road and change the cost thereof to any of the COUNTY funds in its hands or thereafter coming into its hands.

The State Highway Department will not share in the cost of constructing any part of an Industrial Highway within an Industrial Site or Park or privately owned tract of land unless (1) such part is a link in a highway serving area beyond such Industrial Park or privately owned tract of land and (2) in which case the right-of-way or easements shall be conveyed to the State Highway Department as in the case of other highways.

The location and routing of said project, the names of the property owners at the time of the making of the survey, the location and extent of the right-of-way to be taken from each property owner, the improvements to be affected by the construction of said project, the building to be removed, the grade of the proposed highway and the grade of the present highway, and the above referred to telephone, telegraph, light and power poles or towers are shown in detail on the blue prints which accompany this agreement.
