Monorable Judge Lon V. Boyd and Members of Sullivan County Court In Session Monday, April 18, 1977 Blountville, Tennessee 37617

Ladies and Gentlemen:

At the present time the Sullivan County Board of Education has not adopted the 1977-78 school budget. Work sessions have been planned with the Board for this purpose. We will be receiving guidelines shortly from the State Department of Education in regard to education bills passed by the 1977 General Assembly. These guidelines are necessary in the preparation of the budget.

Proposed amendments to this year's budget (1976-77) are being submitted. The amendments include: (1) renovation and recovery from fire damages at Brookside School, (2) fixed charges, (3) Social Security, (4) capital outlay funds for re-roofing of several schools. The total amendments amount to \$306,174, which includes local and state revenue as well as revenue from insurance sources.

The building program is proceeding satisfactorily with site development well under way at Holston. Site development has been bid for Sullivan South and Rock Springs-Colonial Heights Elementary School with Brown Brothers, Inc., as the low bidder. Contracts are being completed and work should start shortly on this project. Bids will be opened April 21 for site development at the Sullivan North High School.

The renovation project at Bluff City Middle School is progressing at a good pace. The center portion of the building which includes seven classrooms is now occupied by students. The auditorium renovation is beginning now that students who were housed there have moved into the center section of the building. It is hoped that the total project will be completed by the next school term.

The new addition at the Bluff City Elementary School will be completed and ready for inspection by April 15. This project should be completed by next school year.

Preregistration is now in progress for the 1977-78 school year. Many of the vocational-technical courses are in great demand. At this time it looks as if Sullivan East will have a complete program in the second year of operation.

The construction at Sullivan Central is picking up following a near halt during the months of January and February. Plans are progressing to have the building operational this fall.

A training session for school bus drivers was held on March 17 and 18. All new drivers were required to attend. There was a total of twenty-five drivers hired since last year who attended this session. This is a mandatory training school held by the State Department of Education. All bus drivers attending passed the exam and were given certification.

Participation in the school food service program has increased over the past year. One significant increase is in the high school service; the menu now offers all greater variety with greater appeal to the high school students. An average of 12,560 students eat a balanced meal daily and another 3,200 secondary school students eat a variety of foods. Of those participating in the total program, 28% receive their meals either free or at a reduced price; this represents a 3% increase over the previous year. Federal funding of the lunch program is now at the rate of .1325 per student meal; this is approximately 13.5% of the cost of the meal which now averages \$1.05.

Detailed plans toward the centralization of purchasing have taken place this year; the full plan should be in operation by the next school year. A fully nutritious, standardized meal for all schools is the main objective of centralized purchasing; a secondary objective is the savings available through quantity purchasing. The commodity program has provided a variety of foods that has helped to maintain a nutritious meal at a reasonable cost to the child. Among the commodities received are frozen ground beef, chicken and turkey, canned fruits and vegetables and several peanut products. Having these nourishing commodities available enables the available funds to be spent on other required foods and the labor required to produce the meals.

The Sullivan County Board of Education has approved a nondiscrimination policy to comply with Federal regulations concerning sex discrimination by local education

agencies which states the following: "It is the policy of the Sullivan County School System not to discriminate on the basis of sex in its educational programs, activities or employment policies as required by Tible IX of the 1972 Education Amendments." For Pay A. Moore, a supervisor in the central office, is the coordinator of Title IX for the Sullivan County School System.

A prievance procedure has also been developed to handle any prievances. The necessary forms and the steps to follow in filing a grievance have been placed in each school and office of the school system. A self-avaluation study of the entire school system is being conducted to determine if any practices or policies fail to comply with Title IX regulations. The study will be completed during the month of April. Ten weeks have been devoted to the study. The Sullivan County Board of Education is definitely acting in good faith to comply with Title IX regulations.

Much effort has been made this year by our attendance personnel toward programs to improve school attendance. School actendance cannot be overcophasized because a day of education lost can never be recalled.

The implementation of the following procedures has helped to improve school attendance in Sullivan County this year.

- Someone appointed to be responsible for attendance in the school. This
 person should know why each child is absent and should notify the parents
 regarding their child's attendance record.
- 2. After the parents have been contacted by the school, and no positive response is received, a referral spect should be filled out and given to the supervisor of attendance on the sixth day of unexcused absence.
- Each student who is absent should have a conference with the person responsible for attendance before returning to class.
- 4. Each teacher should turn in to the person responsible for attendance an accumulative absentee report each day.
- 5. Teacher required to call the roll each day.
- Each school should establish some procedure for improving and promoting school attendance.
- 7. If the student has a social or emotional problem, the teacher may want to refer him to the social worker or guidance counselor.

We are working toward decreasing school suspensions by implementing alternatives such as school programs to meet the needs of the student with an attendance problem. These alternatives would include giving a student a psychological examination special education classes, teacher awareness of the student's problems and home situation, and referral to the social workers for home and family evaluation and assistance.

Realizing that school suspension does not, in all cases, help the student or advance his education, we are encouraging each school to work out a program to prevent students from being sent home. When the juvenile court becomes involved with truants and suspensions, we are encouraging the full cooperation of the school personnel to implement such programs and procedures the court feels necessary to rehabilitate the student. Efforts will continue to be made to involve the school, the parents, and the public in helping to promote better school attendance.

Textbook adoption committees, made up of local teachers, have been in the process of solecting mathematics textbooks to be used for the period beginning July I, 1977 and expiring June 30, 1982. This will be an excellent opportunity to improve our mathematics corriculum.

Summer school for students in grade 1 through 8 has again been planned for this year. Classes will be held at Valley Pike, Mary Nughes, Blountville Jr. High, Brookside, Lynn Gorden and Sullivan Elementary, with an anticipated enrollment of 1,200 students. There is no charge to parents for elementary summer school; the program is totally funded by a Federal Project under ESEA, Title I.

AGRICULTURAL WORK AREA

The forage produced during the summer of 1976 for feeding beef and dairy animals was less than adequate for many Sullivan County farmers to feed throughout the winter. In early January, the Sullivan County Extension Agents, Sullivan County Soil Conservation District, Lee Greer a local chemical representative conducted an educational meeting on pasture renovation at Central High School. Over 150 producers attended the meeting and were encouraged to improve the quality and quantity of forages being grown.

In February a two hour workshop type meeting was held at the Extension Auditorium in Blountville with over 100 local fruit producers to show them how to properly prune and manage their trees for maximum production. Dr. David Lockwood, Assistant Professor in Pomology, from the University of Tennessee assisted with the training.

Other group training meetings conducted this quarter included two for home gardeners one for swine producers and one for strawberry growers. $\$

To follow up on the pasture renovation educational meeting held in January, 4, three acre pasture renovation demonstration was completed in March on Mrs. Lawrence Earharts form at the junction of Univer Road and Highway #37. The selected area was fertilized according to soil test results before the recommended two pounds of Regal White Clover and the 4 pounds of Kenstar Red Clover was seeded.

The demonstration consisted of two replica plots of four different seeding methods:

1. Conventional disking to destroy about half of the grass.

 Spraying with Paraquat using a 20 foot born type sprayer to kill back about half of the grass.

 Seeding with a Zip Seeder and spraying with Paraquat to reduce grass competition with the clover.

4. Seeding with a Power-Till Seeder and spraying with Paraquet to kill back about half of the grass.

Three check plots were fertilized, but left unseeded for evaluation purposes for as long as the plots are useable.

In the past three months, two beef cattle producers and two dairymen have been assisted in freeze branding their herd replacement heifers for permanent identification. This method kills the pigment producing ability of the heir folicals, and is relatively painless and is less expensive than most other methods of identification.

Agricultural Extension Agents have spent a considerable amount of time during the past quarter planning and holding posticide certification meetings to certify private applicators to buy and use restricted use posticides or to supervise their use. Eight meetings have been held and some 700 individuals have met requirements for certification.

This program is necessary to comply with the pesticide act passed by Congress in 1972.

The Agricultural Extension Service is responsible for the teaching and the State Department of Agriculture Division of Plant Industries is responsible for the certification of private applicators on or before October 21, 1977.

Twenty-three Beef Cattle from Steadman Angus Farm and fifty-four steers from Sullivan County 4-H Clubs were implanted with growth stimulating implants, to add extra weight and extra income to the beef cattle producers. Results from Steadman angus farm showed that a 23% in average daily gain resulted over the controls (every 5th animal) 4-H calves are to be weighed in April. This data was entered in a state wide study showing 15.5% increase overall.

The demonstration showed producers a positive approach to increase income from feeder calf production through a simple maintenance operation.

Sullivan County Feeder Pig Producers continue to take advantage of organized feeder pig sales in Tennessee Marketing Feeder Pigs at Sevierville and Cookville with pigs averaging \$35.00/head.

HOME ECONOMICS WORK AREA

Bad weather in January and Rebruary limited meetings considerable.

We are stressing household inventories, and records of locations of important family papers as well as marking of household equipment so it can be identified. Many home demonstration club members are working toward completion of these goals.

The metric system is being introduced to various groups throughout the county.

Making yeast breads has been a project in this quarter and related programs have been given and will be offered for some time to come.

Quick inexpensive nutritious foods that young people can make have been prepared with groups at the Bristol Girl's Club.

We have been working with committees for the upcoming convention of the Tennessee Mode Economics Association.

Home Demonstration Club leaders have had training in sawing with plaids, in nutrition labeling of packaged foods. Members have had opportunities to attend a fashion show as well as an exhibit of spring table decorating ideas.

Several days of in-service-training by specialists from the University were given to agents.

Home demonstration club members attended the Southern Living Home Show in Charlotte, N. C.

We are conducting surveys in Food and Nutrition and Interior Design in preparation for long range plans of work.

News columns, radio programs, club meetings, etc., continue to be a part of the work programs.

4-H'MMD OTHER YOUTH WORK AREA.

During the past quarter, regular 4-H Club meetings were conducted and special project groups including horse, livestock and honor club held monthly meetings. The 4-H horse club members participated in a Horse School at Abingdon, Virginia on February 19.

During this time over thirty 4-H Club members have been assisted in feed and preparing 17 heifers and 55 steers for the Sullivan County Show to be held at the Steedarm Angus Farm on April 2. These 4-H ers will be entertained with an exhibitors party spensored by the Sullivan County Young Farmer and Homenakers group after the show.

The District Heifar and steer show and sale will be held in Abingdon on April 12 - 13 where the youngsters will exhibit their animals.

The Sullivan County 4-H'ers participated, for the first time in many years in the Market Hog Program and Martin Crussell of Bluff City exhibited the Grand Champion Market Hog.

Forty-five 4-H clubs were represented at County 4-H Share-The-Fun held on March 21st and 24th at Holston School. Winners were Jimmy Sisk of Indian Springs, Brian Hillman, Tri-Cities Christian, David Tester of East High and Junior and Junior High large groups from West View and Avoca.

Local 4-H brend baking contests were held in March and nearly seventy local winners were elected to compete in the county brend baking contest to be held at Gentral High School on April 16.

Three hundred and seventy-eight 4-H'ers participated in local 4-H public speaking contest and three hundred and seventy-nine 4-H'ers entered the local 4-H Image Poster contest. One hundred and four local winners competed in a county-wide competition. The Potent and Clark Oil Companies sponsored awards.

Five Sullivan County 4-H'ors were selected to participate in State 4-H Club Congress held April 3 - 6 in Mashville. Mrs. Katy Earhart and David Doan attended as Volunteer Leaders.

Twenty-five outstanding 4-H Club mambers participated on a tour of Washington D. C. during March 28- April 1. Various civic and service organizations provided sponsor-ship for this educational tour.

Eleven Junior High and Senior 4-H'ers participated in the District 4-H Public Speaking, leadership and citizenship contests held in Knoxyille on March 3.

Plans for the Dairy Recipe Contest, 4-H Bicycle Rodeo, Dairy Poster Contest, Record Book workshops and county 4-H demonstration day were initiated.
