

Ladies and Gentlemen:

At the present time the Sullivan County Board of Education has not adopted the 1978-79 school budget. The budget is in the development stage and will be presented to the Board April 18. We will be receiving guidelines shortly from the State Department of Education in regard to education bills passed by the 1978 General Assembly. These guidelines are necessary in the preparation of the budget. Shortly after the Board adopts the budget, the budget will be presented to the appropriate committees of the County Court.

We have received bids for all of the projects in our building program with the exception of Central Heights Elementary School. Construction has begun at the Holston Middle and Elementary School. Construction will begin at the elementary school in the Rock Springs, Colonial Heights area shortly.

All of our eighth graders will be tested in April to determine their readiness for the type of test they must pass in high school. In order to receive a diploma upon graduation starting in 1981, and each year thereafter, a state test will be administered to all high school juniors to determine their eligibility for a high school diploma. Students failing the test will be given two additional opportunities during their senior year to pass the required test. In addition to the high school test, local school systems are required to administer at least two preliminary tests for diagnostic purposes, one at the eighth grade level and one at the fourth, fifth or sixth grade level.

Summer school for students in grades 1 through 8 has again been planned for this year. Classes will be held at Valley Pike, Bluff City Elementary, Blountville Elementary, Lynn Garden, Brookside and Sullivan Elementary with an anticipated enrollment of 1000 students. There is no charge to parents for elementary summer school; the program is totally funded by a project under ESEA, Title I.

Federal Project under ESEA, Title IVB, has recently been approved and the funds are to be utilized to purchase additional non-print materials and audio visual equipment for the libraries in all the schools.

The Board of Education has approved textbook adoptions for the contract period July, 1978 thru June 30, 1983. The recommendations came from committees of the local teachers in the areas of Business Education, Driver Education, Art, Music, Industrial Arts, Reading, Distributive Education and Trades/Industrial Education. These eight committees involved 53 of our classroom teachers. The committees reviewed over 2,000 texts in their respective areas before making recommendations for adoption of 161 basal and supplementary textbooks. These adoptions will enable Sullivan County to stay abreast of current trends and changes in the curriculum areas and to continue offering an excellent educational program at all levels for its students.

Food services for the children at Blountville Elementary and Blountville Junior High will be undergoing changes as the building program is completed. One preparation center will serve the two student bodies in one dining area. The dining area will serve as a multi-purpose facility for the schools, primarily for physical education, assemblies and grade level team teaching experiences. By constructing one preparation center, initial capital savings have already been realized; in addition, there will be a tremendous savings in maintenance and operation over the years of one facility versus two facilities.


A new program offering of the school day that is in the planning stage is the opportunity for a breakfast at school. Federal and state agencies are preparing guidelines for the implementation of the program and Sullivan County is becoming oriented to the proposal. New nutrition education materials are being reviewed and gathered to provide assistance to teachers who wish to integrate nutrition education into the class curriculum.

With the first year of the central purchasing program for school foods and supplies for the school cafeterias near completion the benefits of the program are being realized. Costs for children's meals have increased by only one per cent over last year's cost. A uniform menu with uniform quality of foods has been used and participation has increased by one per cent over last year to an average of 12,911 reimbursable meals a day. The greatest problem in the program was caused by the weather; delays in delivery of foods resulted in some variations on the menu plan.

The Sullivan County Schools Bookkeeping Department has recently put into operation another phase of computerized accounting. This phase being accounts payable, completing the Fund Accounting Cycle.

The accounts payable programs included a warrants register on all funds which is a detail of the warrant itself. The warrant has a stub with a listing of account numbers on which the purchase orders are drawn. It also lists the Purchase Order number, gross amount, discount amount and net amount with a list of all invoices and their amount which makes up the Purchase Order amount. The computer makes all accounting entries to each Funds set of books. At the end of each month a reconcile report is printed listing canceled and outstanding warrants on each fund. With the addition of this new application, we now have one of the most sophisticated payroll, budgeting, accounts payable of any school system.

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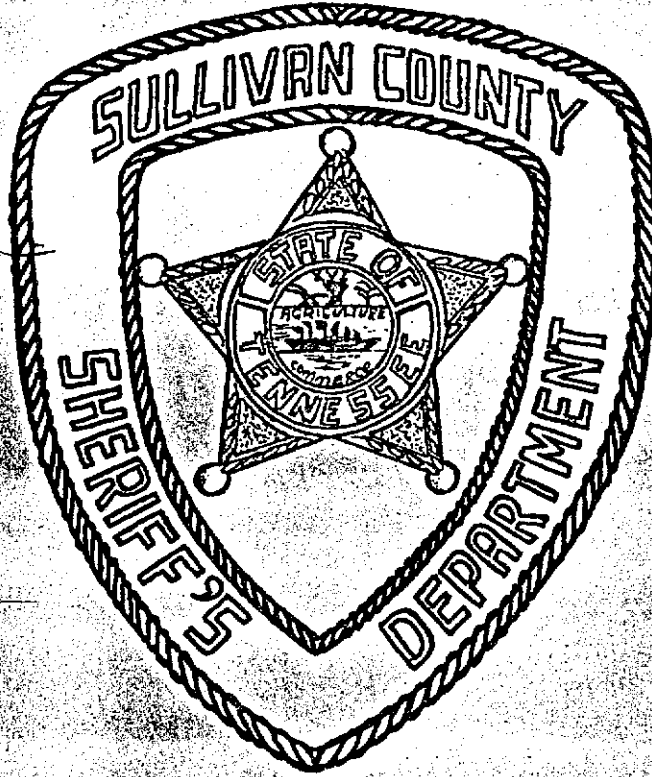

THE UNIVERSITY OF TENNESSEE AND THE U. S. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE COOPERATING

AGRICULTURAL WORK AREA

In January, the "Black Bird" problem was pursued with hopes of getting the roost treated. Tennessee Commissioner of Agriculture, Edward S. Porter visited Sullivan County to assist the United States Department of Interior Fish and Wildlife Service in evaluating the roost and to determine what was needed to do the job. Approval was granted to treat the roost on February 9 by the Interior Department, but weather conditions changed and the Department of Agriculture was not able to apply the chemical as planned. If the birds return next fall efforts will be renewed to get the roost treated.

In February the Sullivan County Dairy Herd Improvement Association held its annual meeting in Blountville. The membership discussed better use of records for more efficient ways of producing milk. The group elected Gordon Mills as president, Dr. B. A. Jones, Vice President, and Mrs. James C. Thomas as secretary. Dairymen participating in the DHIA program had an average cow herd size of 675 in 1976-77, producing 14,420 pounds of milk and 543 pounds of butterfat. The top herd during this time belonged to Herbert Mills, of Bluff City. The herd consists of 107 cows that produced 13,290 pounds of milk and 701 pounds of butterfat per cow.

In March, the Tennessee Extension Energy Pilot Program was announced with three counties, Davidson, Henry, and Sullivan being selected for the study. Tennessee was one of 10 States designated to participation in the national study being conducted by the Department of Energy.

The Sullivan County Extension Service employed three program assistants; Mike Brown, Robert Greenwell, and Judy Miller to work in completing this study with rural residents and small farms over the next twelve months.

During this quarter a four week instruction session was conducted by the Sullivan County Extension Service and specialists from the University of Tennessee to assist home owners in landscaping home gardening, fruit orchards, tree pruning and lawn maintenance. Forty-two individuals attended the class.

Also during this quarter two vegetable garden classes were conducted. One each in Bristol and Kingsport with 60 attending. A one night session was held with 56 local farmers on what farm property is worth to lease or rent, with Dr. Herbert Walsh, Farm Management specialist with the University of Tennessee serving as the instructor.

In March, Resource Management farmers closed out their record books for the 1977 year. Information pertaining to crop yields, milk and beef production cost per unit produced, and management factors were compiled to be computed for use by Sullivan County "Demonstrators."

In addition to the above mentioned educational activities and Agricultural Extension Agents have continued to assist different individuals with agricultural related problems as requested.

HOME ECONOMICS WORK AREA

A home economics survey was made to determine clothing construction and buying practices of homemakers in Sullivan County. The survey results will be used to help determine long range clothing program plans both locally and by university clothing specialists.

I attended classes on the making and fitting of women's slacks.

One New Home Demonstration Club was organized in the Beulah Community.

Forty-seven homemakers took an overnight trip to the Southern Living show in Charlotte, N. C. where information was received on home furnishings, plants both inside and outside the home, foods and crafts. Also industrial exhibits showed us what is available on the market in many areas of family living.

Training was given to home management, health and nutrition and clothing leaders as per the following subject matter; fire safety and home owners insurance; changes in the four food groups and details on good nutrition for the family; proven techniques on sewing with the new soft knits, using interfacing, with emphasis on the iron-on-type and other construction pointers. Forty-two leaders received training and will present these programs to their local clubs.

Workshops held for bottoming chairs and footstools. Many chairs of all sorts and sizes were brought out of barns and attics to be made usable again with a new splint seat. Fifty-two chairs and stools were completed.

Thirty-seven homemakers received instructions of making draperies and twenty completed a sample drapery. Several of the women attending have since made draperies for their own use, realizing a considerable savings over ready made or custom made ones.

In addition there were meetings, news articles, radio programs, etc., of considerable number.

4-H AND OTHER YOUTH WORK AREA.

Regular 4-H Club meetings during the past quarter were held whenever the weather allowed. Special interest project groups including horse, livestock, home economics projects, and honor club held monthly meetings.

A special program for 4-H volunteer leaders was held with approximately thirty-five leaders attending. Seven 4-H leaders were recognized for their years of service.

Eight junior high and senior 4-H'ers participated in the district 4-H Public Speaking, leadership, citizenship, and poster art contests held in Knoxville on March 9. Sullivan County had one winning poster by Drew Jones, Jackson Elementary, and two public speaking winners: Scottie Miller, East High and Todd Overbay, Tri-City Christian School. These district winners will go on to compete at the State competition.

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The Chick Chain has 10 members with 350 chickens being raised to return 5 pullets for each of the 25 chicks received. These 5 pullets will be sold to return to the chain the money that was used to purchase the chicks at the start.

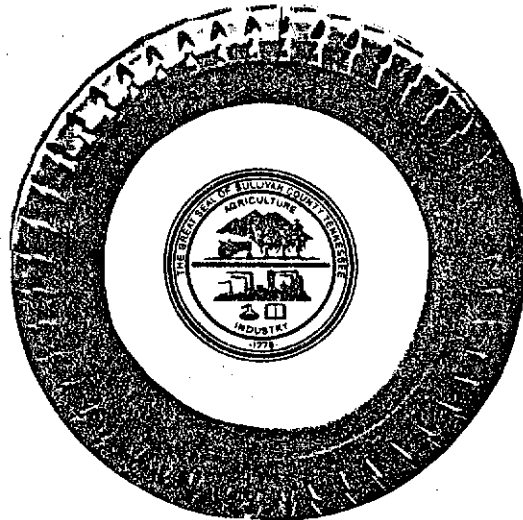

We have temporarily discontinued hauling tires because of excessive costs due to repairing the brading equipment. We would no longer haul the brading irons because they become so hot they simply burn up.

During the past year, we have spent \$325.46 in repairs on the brading irons. I feel this is a waste of the tax payer's money. However, we are looking into the possibility of repair in a different way. Instead of returning the brading irons to the factory for repair, as we have been doing, we are seeking local companies who might be able to repair the irons using hardware and better steel than we used when the irons were made.

Repaired, maintenance equipment will be provided to all areas on each quarter.


