Agricultural Work Area

The past quarter has been rather busy with several educational activities being conducted for the benefit of individuals requesting or needing information on a variety of agricultural subjects.

In January, the Sullivan County Livestock Association working with the State Livestock Association and the Sullivan County Extension Service organized a Feeder Calf Sale to be held at the Kingsport Livestock Market on October 3, 1979. This sale was organized to provide area producers an opportunity to market their feeder calves in uniform lots for top prices.

Tennessee Feeder Calf Sales averaged 3 to 5 cents more per pound in graded sales where the cattle are grouped according to weight and sex.

The Japanese Beetle suppression program started moving in February and March with a little break in the weather. The Milky Spore material is being applied to school property and other public owned land that is being mowed and maintained since these areas are most likely to be infested with the Japanese Beetle grubs.

On February 8, two tobacco meetings were held at the Extension Auditorium in Blountville. One was conducted at 2:00 p.m. and the other at 7:00 p.m. to allow as many producers to attend as possible. Gilbert Rhodes, the University of Tennessee Tobacco Specialist, presented the latest recommended production practices to the two groups and discussed variety characteristics as well as answered individual questions covering a particular problem.

In February, a growth stimulant research demonstration using Ralgro was started on the G. H. Galloway Farm. Forty-three head of Angus and Angus Hereford Crossed cattle were implanted and placed on a 100 day test. Controls were left in the herd and not implanted to evaluate response to the growth stimulants. Previous research has shown a response of 15 to 20 pounds per head increase over controls.

In March, a workshop was conducted on propagation of fruit trees by grafting at the Extension Auditorium. Over fifty participants under the direction of David Lockwood, University of Tennessee Fruit Tree Specialist, learned to graft fruit trees and have crops and general maintenance of orchards.

During the past quarter 4 corn yield and two tobacco chemical weed control demonstrations have been set up with local farmers.

In addition to the above mentioned areas that have been given special attention, the Agricultural agents have used considerable amount of time working with individual home owners with lawn problems and responding to request for information by telephone.

Home Economics Work Area

Considerable time was spent doing a home management survey to determine the practices followed by county homemakers in their project areas relative to consumer buying practices and the business angle of running a household.

Based on this information a 5 year projected program, plan is made and submitted to the University of Tennessee. A one year program plan is also prepared in all other program areas: family life, clothing, health and nutrition, interior design and crafts.

An in-depth progress report was made trying to determine what had been accomplished in home management since the last survey in 1973 and in other program areas during a lesser period of time.

Forty-five home demonstration club members and other homemakers enjoyed an overnight trip to the Southern Living Spring Show in Charlotte, North Carolina where exhibits of landscaping, horticulture, interior design, foods, crafts, etc. were in profusion.

In cooperation with the home service advisor (Kingsport Power Company) we held two sessions on preparing food for and uses of the microwave oven. Approximately 200 homemakers attended. We were fortunate to be able to have a home economist from one of the large appliance manufacturers here for these sessions.

I gave a TV program on microwave cooking.

Three groups of home demonstration club leaders received training, in clothing, crafts and interior design. Clothing training was on techniques in clothing construction including cuffs, pockets, zippers, hems. Interior design leaders visited Interior Concepts to get information on wall and floor coverings and window treatment. Craft leaders had a days training in several needle crafts. These leaders in turn give the training received at their local club meetings.

Time was also used to plan a 4 state travel itinerary for the purpose of studying the Extension programs in other states.

Programs on family living with emphasis on problem of the middle and later years were presented for the American Association of University Women and a Senior Citizens group.

Many people in the area have antique chairs needing cane seats. To help those interested in learning this craft we held a three day workshop where 23 chairs were bottomed with cane. The estimated savings was \$725.00 which does not include the savings on refinishing the wood before caning.

Radio programs and newspaper columns are prepared each week and programs were presented from time to time at home demonstration clubs.

4-H and Other Youth Work Area

Winter weather and school cancellations curtailed many of the 4-H activities during January and February. A county Citizenship Shortcourse was planned but had to be cancelled because of the weather. It is hoped this can be conducted in the fall.

When possible small groups and individual school workshops have been held to help 4-H members start their 4-H record books. During this quarter 20 such workshops were held.

"Youth in Leadership" was the topic for a seminar conducted during January and February by the Kingsport Toastmasters in cooperation with the Sullivan County 4-H. Twenty 4-H'ers participated in this educational activity which helped them to improve speaking skills, develop effective leadership abilities and practice rule of parliamentary procedure.

Six YF&H members (Young Farmers and Homemakers) and one extension agent traveled to Milan, Tennessee for State YF&H Leadership Conference February 8-11.

Twelve 4-H members participating in the 4-H Chick Chain received their chicks during February.

Area-wide presentation for the 4-H Image Poster Contest was held in the Bristol and Fort Henry Malls during February. This contest provided recognition to 109 winners from local 4-H clubs. All participants received a certificate and ribbon award.

Breadbaking workshops were held throughout February and March to promote bread-baking in local clubs and encourage participation at the County Breadbaking Contest. Approximately sixty-six 4-H'ers participated in these workshops.

Sullivan County 4-H agents and 4-H members gave Community Pride slide programs to four local Ruritan Clubs during this quarter.

Approximately six hundred youths attended a 4-H Rollerskating party in Kingsport March 1st. Proceeds from this activity will be used to help finance the Washington D. C. trip for outstanding 4-H'ers.

The 4-H All-Star Council and extension advisors met March 2-3 for a district planning conference. The All-Star Big Chief, Kitty Hawk, and Mary Ruth Kelly, advisor, from Sullivan County attended.

Sixteen 4-H'ers and their dogs are involved in an eight-week Dog Obedience Training class which began March 14.

4-H Spring Judging Contest were held in Knoxville March 8. Nine Sullivan County 4-H'ers participated in leadership, citizenship, public speaking and history bowl contests. Sullivan County won first place in the District 4-H Community Pride Participation.

Members of the 4-H Honor Club are involved in making a 4-H Quilt. Twelve 4-H'ers made quilt squares and participated in the first two sessions on quilt making.

County Breadbaking Contest was held March 24 at Central High with 58 4-H'ers participating.

The Sullivan Co. 4-H Swine Program has placed 13 feeder pigs on two 4-H members farms.



FRANCHISE

THIS FRANCHISE AND AGREEMENT made and entered into on this the ____ day of _____, 1979, by and between SULLIVAN COUNTY, TENNESSEE, a political sub-division of the State of Tennessee, hereinafter designated as the County, and SAMMONS COMMUNICATIONS, INC., a Delaware Corporation, its successors and assigns, having its principal address and place of business at 403 South Akard Street, Dallas, Texas, hereinafter designated as the Company;

WITNESSETH:

The County insofar as it may legally do so under any authority expressed, implied, now given, or hereinafter given, does franchise and license the Company to construct a community antenna television system in Sullivan County, Tennessee. The franchise and license to run for a term of fifteen (15) years with the right to renew upon written notice for an additional ten (10) year period.

Provided, however, the aforesaid franchise and license is granted subject to the following conditions, considerations, terms and mutual agreements, to-wit:

SECTION 1. DEFINITIONS: For the purposes of this contract unless otherwise expressly used, the following terms shall have the meanings herein respectively indicated:

(a) The term "COUNTY" shall mean the County of Sullivan.

(b) The term "COURT" shall mean the Quarterly Court of Sullivan County, Tennessee.

(c) The term "ROAD" shall mean any road, alley, public way and public place as now laid out, whether open or unopened, dedicated to public use and all extensions or additions there as may now or hereafter be made.

(d) The term "GROSS RECEIPTS" shall mean all revenues of the Company derived from the cable system in the areas franchised hereunder.

(e) The term "COMPANY" shall mean the franchised person, Sammons Communications, Inc., with principal place of business at 403 South Akard Street, Dallas, Texas, which is the Company under this contract.

(f) "PERSON" is any person, firm, partnership, association, corporation, company or organization of any kind.

SECTION 2. GRANT OF FRANCHISE: It is hereby granted to the Company from the acceptance and execution of this contract, as hereinafter prescribed, all right and authority to construct, erect, operate and maintain buildings, cables, wiring, machinery and transmission apparatus within the County limits, and which said buildings, cables, wiring, machinery and transmission apparatus may or shall become necessary in the reception and distribution of television and radio signals and other electronic impulses for the use of the citizens of the hereinabove described communities and areas on, over or along or under (by way of underground conduit) the roads of the County and also to repair, replace and extend the same and to do all other matter of things necessary to or incidental to such business, subject always to the terms and provisions of this contract.

SECTION 3. COMPLIANCE WITH REGULATIONS AND LAWS: The Company shall be permitted to extend its poles, wires, transmission lines, distribution lines and service lines and to give service to the County and its inhabitants in accordance with the terms of this contract any and all other rules and regulations as the same may be amended from time to time of the Federal Communications Commission, the State of Tennessee, United States of America, or the Court. All such installations shall comply with the safety and construction standards of the National Electric Code.

SECTION 4. POLE ATTACHMENTS: There is further granted to the Company the right, privilege and authority to lease, rent or in other manner obtain the use of towers, poles, lines, cables and other equipment and facilities from any and all holders of public licenses and franchises within the geographical boundaries of the County. The Company shall have the right to erect and

maintain its own poles as may be necessary for the proper construction and maintenance of the television distribution system with the approval of locating poles by the Court or any of its designated officials or committees.

SECTION 5. FRANCHISE TERM: The rights granted to the Company hereinunder shall be non-exclusive and shall be for a period of fifteen (15) years from the date of the execution and acceptance of this contract unless sooner terminated by mutual agreement or as herein provided. The rights granted hereinunder to the Company shall be automatically renewed upon the same terms and conditions for an additional period of ten (10) years providing the Company shall notify the County not later than ninety (90) days prior to the end of the initial fifteen (15) year franchise period herein provided for of its intention to renew said contract and franchise.

SECTION 6. SYSTEM CONSTRUCTION: The Company's transmission and distribution system, poles, wires and appurtenances shall be located, erected and maintained so as not to endanger or interfere with the lives of persons or to interfere with new improvements the County may deem proper to make, or to unnecessarily hinder or obstruct the free use of roads, or other public property and removal of poles to avoid such interference will be at the Company's expense.

(a) All installations of equipment shall be of permanent nature, durable and installed in accordance with good engineering practices, and of sufficient height to comply with all existing State and Federal laws so as not to interfere in any manner with the right of the public or individual property owners and shall not interfere with travel and use of public places by the public and during the construction, repair or removal thereof shall not obstruct or impede traffic.

(b) No poles are to be erected upon roads or public grounds and no excavation of any type shall be done or cause to be done unless permission is first obtained in writing from the County or one of its designated officials.

(c) In the event that a change is made in the grade of any road, alley or public grounds by authority of the County which shall necessitate the removal of any poles, wires, transmission and distribution lines to conform to the change of grade, the Company shall make the necessary changes in its lines at its own expense, upon due notice from the Court or one of its designated officials.

(d) In the maintenance and operation of its CATV system in the roads, alleys and other public places, and in the course of any new construction or addition to its facilities, the Company shall proceed so as to cause the least possible inconvenience to the general public; any opening or obstruction in the roads or other public places made by Company in the course of its operations shall be guarded and protected at all times by the placement of adequate barriers, fences or boardings, the bounds of which, during periods of dusk and darkness, shall be clearly designated by red warning lights.

(e) All work in any way necessitated by the business of the Company which may involve the opening, breaking up or tearing up of a portion of a road, sidewalk or other part of any County-owned or County-controlled property shall, at the option of the County, be done by the County at the expense of the Company.

(f) Company shall save the County harmless against all loss or damage to any person or property caused by the construction, laying, maintenance or operation of any of its lines or other undertakings under the authority of this contract.

(g) Construction shall begin by Company not later than one (1) year from the date of franchise adoption.

SECTION 7. PROHIBITED TRANSACTION: The Company shall not engage in the business of selling television sets nor shall the Company engage in the servicing of said sets.

SECTION 8. REMOVAL OF PROPERTY: The Company shall at its own expense, protect, support, temporarily disconnect, relocate

on any road or public place any property of the Company when required by the County by reason of the traffic conditions, public safety, freeway construction, change or establishment of road grade, installation of any utilities such as sewers, water pipes, power lines, or drains and any other types of structures or improvements by Governmental agencies when acting in a Governmental or proprietary capacity, or other structures of public improvement; provided, however, that the Company shall in all cases have the right and privileges subject to the obligations of this contract to abandon any property of the Company in place, and wherever located.

SECTION 9. INDEMNIFICATION OF COUNTY: The rights granted to the Company by virtue of this contract are upon the express condition that the Company hereby agrees to fully indemnify, protect and save the County harmless from and against all occurrences, arising directly or indirectly from the Company's operations pursuant to the rights herein granted, which shall or may result in bodily injury, disease, death, property damage, property loss or financial loss suffered by and any and all persons who may be in, on or about the premises when and where the Company's operations are being performed. The assumed liability of the Company shall not exceed its limits of liability insurance as required in subparagraph (a) and (b) hereinbelow. The Company shall furnish the County a Certificate of Insurance evidencing the following types of insurance coverage:

(a) Workmen's Compensation Insurance in conformity with the statutory requirements of the State of Tennessee.

(b) Comprehensive General Liability Insurance with bodily injury limits of not less than \$100,000.00 per person and \$300,000.00 each occurrence, with property damage limits of not less than \$50,000.00 shall be for each accident and \$200,000.00 for aggregate operations. Such insurance shall be placed with a good and reliable company and said Certificates of Insurance shall be furnished by the Company to the County concurrently with the acceptance

of this contract. Such Certificate shall contain a clause providing that no insurance policies in force in accordance with the above requirements will be diminished or cancelled without ten (10) days prior written notice to the County.

SECTION 10. GROSS RECEIPTS PAYMENT: During the term of the rights granted hereunder and so long as the Company operates said system, Company shall pay to the County, at the time hereinafter specified, a sum equal to three (3%) per cent of its annual Gross Receipts from the CATV system. Such payments by the Company to County shall be in lieu of any occupation tax, license tax or similar levy, and shall be paid on an annual basis. Company shall maintain an accurate record of such gross receipts earnings and it shall make payment to the County within ninety (90) days after the expiration of any calendar year during the term of the rights granted hereunder, together with a Certificate of Officer of the Company showing the Gross Receipts as defined herein.

SECTION 11. SUPERVISION AND INSPECTION: The County shall have the right to supervise all construction or installation work performed subject to the provisions of this contract and to make such inspection as it shall find necessary to insure compliance with governing ordinances.

SECTION 12. ABANDONMENT: In the event that the use of any part of the system is discontinued for any reason by the Company for a continuous period of twenty-four (24) months, or in the event such system or property has been installed in any road or public place without complying with requirements of this contract, or the rights granted hereunder have been terminated, cancelled or have expired, Company shall promptly remove from the roads and public places all such property and poles of such system, other than any which the County may permit to be abandoned in place. In the event of such removal, Company shall promptly restore the road or other area from which such property has been removed to a condition satisfactory to the County. Any property of Company to be abandoned in place, shall be abandoned in such manner as the County may prescribe. Upon a permanent abandonment of the property

of Company in place, Company shall submit to the County an instrument to be approved by the County, transferring to the County ownership of such property.

SECTION 13. TERMINATION: The rights granted hereunder to Company may be terminated prior to the date of expiration hereof by the County in the event the County shall have found, after notice to Company or its successor in interest, and after public hearing, that the grantee hereof has failed to comply with any material provision of this contract or has, by way of act of omission, materially violated any term or condition of this contract. Provided, however, that the County shall first give notice to Company or its successor in interest, of any alleged breach of this contract and demand that such breach be remedied. Company or its successor in interest shall, thereafter, have a period of sixty (60) days to remedy said breach to the satisfaction of the County. Provided, further, upon the failure or refusal of the Company to remedy the same within the said sixty (60) day period, the County, after notice and public hearing, shall have the right to declare the rights granted hereunder to be null and void and/or to pursue such other legal or equitable remedy as it shall see fit. In all cases involving termination or material modification of the rights granted hereunder, Company shall be afforded all due process of law.

SECTION 14. REIMBURSEMENT OF EXPENSES: Company shall pay to the County a sum of money sufficient to reimburse it for all expenses incurred by it in connection with the publication and passage of this contract and the rights granted to Company hereunder. Such payment shall be made by Company to County within thirty (30) days after County shall furnish Company with a written statement of such expense.

SECTION 15. SAVING CLAUSE: If any sentence, clause or sectional part of this contract is for any reason found to be unconstitutional, illegal or invalid, such unconstitutionality, illegality or invalidity shall not affect or impair any of the remaining provisions, sentences, clauses or sections or parts of

this contract. It being the declared intent of the both parties that this contract when adopted and having any illegal or invalid provision therein is not to be included herein.


