Gentlemen:

Sullivan County Schools closed Saturday, June 1. Average daily attendance for the school year was 17,180, a decrease of 475 over last year. This decrease was a result of the annexation of the Avoca area by the city of Bristol.

Sullivan County Schools will reconvene with students attending school Monday, August 26. Teachers and other personnel will be in workshops the week prior to August 26.

Summer schools for elementary students were held again this summer for students in grades 1-8. A total of 1,091 students were enrolled in six locations; Blountville, Bluff City, Brookside, Lynn Garden, Valley Pike and Sullivan Elementary. Transportation was provided for students from other school areas surrounding each summer school center. Each center was staffed with a principal, twelve teachers, a caretaker and an aide.

The elementary summer school program is funded with federal funds under ESEA, Title 1.

Central High School again operated a summer school for students in grades 9-12 with an enrollment of 305. New subjects in English and American History were offered as well as repeat subjects. The offering of a particular repeat subject was justified by the number that registered.

I am well pleased with the summer school programs and feel that they render a service to the youth of Sullivan County.

Sullivan County will have a total of 45 kindergarten classes this fall. Churches have been secured to fully implement the kindergarten program for the five year old children. Food service and bus transportation will be worked out to meet the needs. Following is a list of schools and the respective churches where kindergarten classes will be held:

In addition, new kindergarten classes will be opened in the following schools: Arcadia, 1 class; Bluff City, 2 classes; Cold Springs, 1 class; East Cherokee, 1 class; Orebank, 1 class.

The Sullivan County School's Maintenance Department is in the process or has completed painted the following schools this summer: Orebank Elementary, Central High, Holston Valley Junior High, Kingsley Elementary and Bluff City Junior High. Partially painted were Brookside, Arcadia, Cedar Grove and Sullivan Elementary.

We have painted all playground equipment, serviced and cleaned all boilers, ice makers, refrigeration units, air-conditioning units, television sets, inter-com systems, audio-visual equipment, filters and cleaning units and installed drainage in many locations. Foundations, electrical service and water lines for modular units have been installed. We have four tractors and have mowing crews working daily. We are doing various small grading jobs on school grounds. We are continuing to stockpile coal.

Custodians will start to work in the schools on August 12 to clean buildings and ready them for the re-opening of school.

We are adding twelve modular units that will enable us to relieve overcrowded conditions in our classrooms. We feel that these units are the most economical means of meeting an immediate need for classroom space.

A planned program of activities for school-age through adult level age groups was conducted during the summer of 1974 by the Board of Education for the residents of Sullivan County. The physical education and athletic facilities of Central, East, Ketron, Lynn View and Sullivan were made available for the program. A supervisory and instructional staff of three people who are employees of the Sullivan County School Board was at each high school.

The high school recreation program was coordinated with existing softball and baseball programs previously established through sponsorship by Ruritan and Optimist Clubs. Instruction and participation in tennis, volleyball, basketball, tetherball, whiffleball, badminton, kickball, croquet, horse shoes, track and field, and dodgeball were the active sports offered. Classes in physical conditioning on weight machine apparatus was offered to junior, senior high and adult age levels.

A camp for retarded children was offered in Sullivan County this summer for the first time. The Sullivan County Association for Retarded Citizens and personnel from the school system worked closely together in planning the program. Ultimately, it was made possible through the lease of county land from the Sullivan County Quarterly Court. The camp has served approximately sixty-six Sullivan County children with a staff of three.

The Kingsport, Bristol and Sullivan County School Systems plan to jointly offer in-service training for special education teachers next year. Dates have been set for teachers from the three systems to meet together to participate in planning the in-service programs. A committee of three people, one representing each school system, was chosen to implement and to pursue other areas in special education in which the three systems could work together.



AGRICULTURAL WORK AREA

The cool wet weather conditions this spring has caused considerable loss of both field and garden crops by plant diseases and insects. A large portion of time for adult extension work has been used visiting farmers and gardeners in the field and by telephone concerning these problems.

In April and May, five chemical weed control demonstrations were set up on different farms to determine the use of Eradicane and Sutan for control of seedling Johnson Grass in corn. Three of the five demonstrations are showing less Johnson Grass in the treated areas compared to the non-treated areas.

The number of soil samples taken by farmers showed an increase the last quarter with the establishment of the 1973 Rural Environmental Assistance Program and the new farm program for 1974 by the Agriculture Stabilization Conservation Association.

In April the Sullivan County Extension Agents and feeder calf directors attended the Mountain Breeders (Hereford) and Angus Feeder Calf Board of Directors meeting to make plans for the Johnson City Feeder Calf Sales this fall. In an effort to improve the health of the calves being shipped to feed lots and to increase the income to the producers the group decided it would be necessary for the calves to be vaccinated two weeks before the sale with the three-in-one vaccine and ear tagged on the farm. In addition, to work being done with feeder calf producers nine pure bred beef producers were mailed forms to enroll in the Tennessee Beef Cattle Improvement Program. Three of these producers have received assistance in weighing, grading and recording information on their herds to be computer processed by the University of Tennessee Extension Animal Science Department. This information should indicate the progress of different animals in the herd for each individual farm.

Sullivan County Extension Agents attended the Bi-Annual Extension Workers Conference held at the University of Tennessee June 9 - 13. This year's conference included the Resident Teaching Staff, The Experiment Station Personnel, and all Extension Agents for the state wide system.

Much of the Extension Staff time in June was used moving the office from Bristol to the J. L. Horton Building in Blountville. The new location offers an Extension Education Programs to better serve the people of Sullivan County.

HOME ECONOMICS WORK AREA

The last sessions of the landscaping schools were completed in both Bristol and Kingsport. According to the evaluation by those attending the four session course was very helpful and many asked to have other similar schools.

As a result of this housing school we have worked on house plans with three families who are building new homes.

Rug workshops were held teaching both rya and latch-hook methods.

Home Demonstration club members attended an all day seminar where they received varied information on homemaking practices.

Training was received on home furnishings for the low income groups; also aspects of family life.

The adult home economics agent took an eight session class in sewing with knits.

The annual Home Demonstration Club Spring Meeting was held. The speaker was Betty Tenpenny, Director of Consumer Affairs for Tennessee.

A workshop was held on making paper tole pictures.

Programs have been presented to several adult groups on "Food Buying Tips".

A great deal of emphasis has been put on numerous programs for adults and 4-H'ers on canning and freezing of foods. Part of this was done in cooperation with the home economists of the Kingsport Power Company and Bristol Tennessee Electric System.

Radio and TV programs were presented; a weekly news column prepared.

Programs were presented to Home Demonstration Clubs on food additives, clothing selection, food buying, and making terrariums.

A program was given to Senior Citizens on "Handling Food Safely."

The Home Demonstration Club Council met for the semi-annual planning session.

4-H AND OTHER YOUTH WORK AREA

One hundred and seven 4-H'ers throughout the county participated in the County Demonstration Day on April 27. Extension Agents working with 4-H held a record book and demonstration workshop to assist county 4-H project winners. Sullivan County had 15 junior county winners to participate in the district contest with four of these being named district winners. Twenty one junior high 4-H'ers competed at the district level and six of these were district winners along with four district alternate winners. Three senior 4-H'ers were district winners and three were also named alternate winners.

In promotion of June as Dairy Month, eight 4-H'ers were assisted in presenting a foods demonstration program at the Oakwood Market in Kingsport on June 26. Thirty four, 4-H'ers participated in the County Dairy Tasting Party on June 8, and twenty one 4-H'ers entered the County Dairy Poster Contest.

The assistant extension agents worked in planning, organizing and implementing a 4-H exchange program in which twenty eight 4-H'ers from Pinellas County, Florida were guests in the homes of Sullivan County 4-H'ers during June 17 - 23. Activities for the exchange program included a tour of Bristol Caverns, Land of Oz in Beech Mountain, Bays Mountain and various picnic outings.

Nine 4-H'ers purchased 15 lambs for the State Lamb Show and Sale at the Tennessee Junior Livestock Exposition.

Thirty three Sullivan County 4-H'ers and fifty eight steers and heifers were hosted by the Holston Ruritan Club to a third annual county steer show and first annual heifer show.

Thirty three Sullivan County 4-H'ers showed 58 steers and heifers at the annual Bristol Steer Show and Sale. Sullivan County won in the following events. Champion Steer, Reserve Champion Steer, Champion Shorthorn Steer, Champion Angus Steer, Champion Charolais Steer, Reserve Champion Angus, Charolais Hereford Steer, Jynior Showmanship, Hereford and Shorthorn County Group of Three, Reserve Champion Shorthorn Heifer, and Grand and Reserve Champion Hereford Heifer. 4-H'ers sold better than \$20,000 worth of 4-H beef with the top calf bringing \$1.46 a pound. The calf weighed 1,050 pounds.

Five 4-H'ers were initiated into the District Five All Stars, two 4-H'ers attended State Wildlife Conference, and three attended District Five Leadership Conference.

Twenty seven boys and sixty girls registered to attend 4-H Camp this summer.

WHEREAS by Sections 49-701 to 49-720, inclusive, of Tennessee Code Annotated, counties are authorized through their respective Quarterly County Courts to issue and sell bonds of said counties for school purposes; and

WHEREAS it appears that the educational requirements of Sullivan County require the erecting, repairing, furnishing and equipping of school buildings in and for said county; and

WHEREAS this Quarterly County Court has heretofore on August __, 1974, adopted a resolution pursuant to the provisions of Sections 49-701 to 49-720, inclusive, of Tennessee Code Annotated authorizing the issuance of \$925,000 School Bonds, Series 1974, of said county for the purpose of erecting, repairing, furnishing, and equipping school buildings in and for Sullivan County; and

WHEREAS it is necessary to obtain funds immediately in the amount of \$925,000 for the purposes expressed in said resolution; and

WHEREAS existing market conditions are deemed unsatisfactory for the issuance of bonds at this time; and

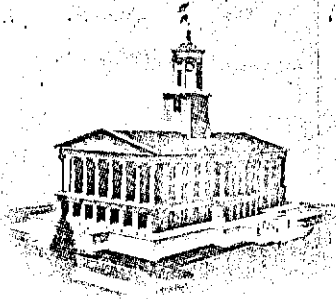

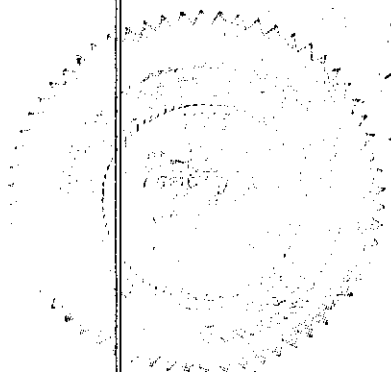

AN ACT to amend Chapter 609 of the Private Acts of 1935, as amended by Chapter 27 of the Private Acts of 1935 (1st Extraordinary Session) and Chapter 524 of the Private Acts of 1937, and Chapter 231 of the Private Acts of 1959, and Chapter 360 of the Private Acts of 1961, relative to the duties and compensation of the County Attorney for Sullivan County; to repeal Chapter 259 of the Private Acts of 1943, relative to the duties and compensation of the County Attorney.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
THE STATE OF TENNESSEE:

SECTION 1. Chapter 609 of the Private Acts of 1935, as amended by Chapter 27 of the Private Acts of 1935 (1st Extraordinary Session), is hereby amended by deleting Section 2 in its entirety and substituting instead the following:

"County Attorney shall be the attorney and solicitor for the County in all legal matters, in which the County requires the services of an attorney or solicitor, including all suits in which the County has an interest now pending in any of the Courts, either by the County, or against the County, and all suits hereafter brought either by the County or against it. He shall represent the County in all condemnation cases, all civil suits brought against the County, except when insurance companies have coverage, in all suits involving county officials in their official duties, review all contracts to be entered into by the County, review all resolutions prior to vote to determine legality, file and prosecute all tax delinquency matters, attend all meetings of the County Court, both regular and called sessions, attend all committee meetings when requested by the Chairman to do so, attend the meetings of the school board when requested to do so by the Chairman, prosecute all cases involving the personal use of County funds by any County official including use of assets of the County for personal use, advise the County Judge and members of the County Court upon request on legal matters concerning County government, advise all county officeholders upon request concerning legal matters, and do all other things required by statute and the act creating the office of county attorney. The County Attorney shall be allowed to maintain his private law practice provided it does not interfere with or come into conflict with his official duties as County Attorney."


