

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I hope that your holiday season was a joyous one and that 1975 will be a year of health, happiness, and prosperity for each of you.

Twenty-nine new kindergarten classes were started this school year which brings the total number in the county to fifty. Due to the shortage of classrooms, it was necessary to rent spaces for nineteen classes in local churches. All of our kindergarten classes are state approved.

Thirteen relocatable classrooms were added in eight elementary schools to provide additional space to meet state regulations requiring elementary classes not to exceed thirty students. The regulations for next year will limit early elementary grades to twenty-five students per class. This will require some additional teachers for the 1975-76 school year.

Partial renovations in several schools have been completed and additional work is presently underway.

Special education services that are now being provided for Sullivan County children include the following:

One hundred and twenty children who have been identified as having learning disabilities are served by 8 resource teachers. There are 14 teachers providing services for 210 children who are mildly to severely retarded. There is one itinerant teacher who works with children who are hearing impaired and one teacher working with the blind and visually handicapped. This is the first and only program of its kind in East Tennessee, and was begun in order to give parents the opportunity to keep their children at home.

Five speech and hearing therapists provide services to all elementary schools, working with children who have speech and hearing problems.

Three full-time learning diagnosticians provide psychological services for children with suspected learning problems, emotional problems, "school-phobia," etc.

A full-time homebound teacher provides home instruction for children who are medically not able to attend school. In addition to the one homebound teacher, several classroom teachers are paid to provide homebound instruction

Under the newly implemented P.L. 839, tuition is now provided for

~~children who must attend special schools such as Dawn of Hope, Palmer Center,~~
and private schools for the multiple handicapped.

The Title I program has continued to provide supportive services for the identified Title I children in twenty-four Sullivan County Schools qualifying for Title I funds. We have fifty-three teacher aides providing individualized instruction under the supervision of the classroom teacher for students needing extra help in reading and math. A central Resource Center is provided to loan materials for individualized instruction. During the first three months of this school year, 1,451 kits and games and books were loaned to teachers and teacher aides from this center. These materials are delivered weekly to the schools by the Title I van. Consumable workbooks are also available in reading and math for children who cannot work successfully in the materials ordinarily provided at their grade level.

The services of a reading consultant and a social worker are available to assist with special needs of qualifying children. Title I also provides limited dental and medical care for children from indigent families not eligible for Medicaid.

Approximately 2,500 school children are receiving aid through the Title I program.

The Tennessee Reading Program, funded with 3.8 million dollars by the second session of the 88th General Assembly, is being implemented in the Sullivan County Schools. Five reading resource teachers and five resource teacher aides have been employed with the Sullivan County share of the money. These teachers and aides are now participating in in-service training sponsored by the State Department of Education.

Beginning this month and continuing through this school year, these reading resource teachers will provide in-service training and assistance to classroom teachers in grades 1-3. They will assist in diagnosing special problems, prescribing activities for improving specific skills, and demonstrating techniques and materials that can be used.

The five reading resource teachers will be assigned to schools in five geographical areas of the County and each will serve approximately forty classroom teachers. A mini-resource center is being planned in a school in


each geographical area for each reading resource teacher and aide. These centers will serve as a home base for the resource teams. The forty classroom

teachers served by the team may obtain additional training and materials at these centers.

An extensive energy conservation program has been instituted in the Sullivan County School System. Although every measure has been taken, we find ourselves confronted with rapidly increasing fuel costs. These increasing costs are also evident in all other areas of our department.

As you are aware, the Board of Education is requesting the construction of two new comprehensive high schools, one elementary school, and one elementary-middle school. These schools are of utmost importance in our school program. They are seriously needed in order to overcome crowded conditions, placing kindergarten students in our schools, and meeting the state requirements of teacher-pupil ratio, vocational-technical education, and career education. We solicit your cooperation and support of this building program. Also, many of you have inquired about the needs of our elementary schools. We are now evaluating this project in cooperation with the State Department of Education. The above building program plays an important role in the renovation of the elementary and middle schools. Also, the renovation program of these schools is mandated by the state fire code regulations. We will be working toward setting these renovation needs in priority and/or phases.

AGRICULTURAL WORK AREA

During this quarter Extension Agents have continued with routine work assisting farmers and other residents that request agricultural information and assistance.

In October, 16 beef producers consigned some 300 feeder calves to the Mountain Breeders Sale in Johnson City. The top pen of steers sold for \$30 per cwt with heifers going for \$28 per cwt. The number of feeder calves sold from Sullivan County farms in the organized sales were down considerably from previous years due to the lower prices being paid for lighter weight calves.

Field corn variety test plots are grown in several counties across Tennessee as well as the Agricultural Experiment Stations to obtain essential information on the performance of different varieties of corn to be recommended by the University of Tennessee Agricultural Extension Service. A test was conducted on the James Kyte Farm near Bluff City and the following results were obtained:

In November, the 56 day report for four bulls entered in the University of Tennessee Bull Evaluation Station by two Sullivan County Beef Producers showed the two Hereford bulls (one Senior and one Junior) having a daily gain of 3.95 and 3.73 respectively. Two Angus bulls in the Junior group had average daily gains of 3.91 pounds - 3.48 pounds each.

On December 2, the annual meeting for Dairy Herd Improvement Association was held in Bristol. This organization working in cooperation with the Agricultural Extension Service is making every effort to help dairy farmers increase milk production and dairying efficiency through a systematic testing and record keeping program. Eighteen Grade A producers were enrolled in DHIA Program in 1974.

In 1974, eleven hundred seventy three soil samples were analyzed by the University of Tennessee Soil Testing Laboratory for Sullivan Countians. This ranks the county eighth in the total number of soil samples taken for the state.

HOME ECONOMICS WORK AREA

The Home Demonstration Clubs held their annual holiday show and bazaar. Many demonstrations went on throughout the day to teach interested visitors how to make many decorative and gift items. The public is very receptive to this event, where they can get ideas and learn skills, and it is always free of charge.

Fifty four home constructed garments were modeled at the Dress Revue sponsored by the Kingsport Chamber of Commerce. During the revue a program was presented on the care and handling of knit fabrics.

The Kingsport Chamber of Commerce entertained the Home Demonstration Club leaders with a banquet. At the annual fall meeting of the clubs a program on the use of native natural materials for holiday decorating was presented.

The emphasis of the holiday foods program, held in cooperation with the Kingsport Power Company was the preparation of meals that conserve electric energy by using small appliances. Method demonstrations, recipes, and suggestions were all a part of the two hour program.

Thirty three club members attended the Holiday Home Show with an overnight tour to Charlotte, North Carolina.

Training has been given for the agent by University Extension Specialists in crafts, clothing, health, nutrition, home management and horticulture.

We held a clothing workshop for women in the fitting and construction of pants.

To enable leaders to present programs at their local clubs, two training meetings were held. For health and nutrition leaders the subjects were safe handling of food and energy saving preparation. In the area of family life, information was given in preparing for the mature years, also for the younger homemaker, living with the young child.

Two TV programs created interest and many requests were received for information on rolling fire logs using newspaper and the preserving of fruit by drying or sulphuring.

A program on meat buying and preparation was given to a high school home economics class.

Plans were worked out for equipping the extension auditorium with kitchen cupboards and appliances to further our opportunities for instruction in the use of food and nutrition.

Through the generosity of Home Demonstration Club members the auditorium windows have been draped. Other plans are on the "drawing board" for making our auditorium more useful and attractive.

The usual routine of club meetings, radio programs, news columns, office duties, etc., has gone on.

4-H AND OTHER YOUTH WORK AREA

During the past quarter Assistant Extension Agents responsible for the 4-H Youth program have organized 60 clubs in the county and 76 clubs in the Bristol and Kingsport city schools. Over 200 local 4-H Club officers attended a county-wide officer's training meeting on October 26 and 170 4-H officers and leaders attended the District Officer's Training Day in Knoxville on November 2.

During October 14th through the 18th four Sullivan County 4-H Leaders and Martha Childress attended the Southern Region 4-H Leaders Forum in Eatonton, Georgia, which was sponsored by the J. C. Penny Company. The 4-H Extension Staff has conducted the seven week Leadership-In-Depth training course for adult volunteer leaders during the quarter with thirty leaders enrolled in the course, twelve of whom graduated.

Extension Agents assisted the 4-H Honor Club in preparing and serving the Annual Farm Bureau dinner on October 26.

Time was spent during October in assisting 4-H Club members with planning and conducting programs for P. T. A.'s and new members at the Holston and Mary Hughes Schools.

Extension Home Economists received training from the University Extension Specialist in Family Management and Economics; nutrition, clothing, and crafts during the quarter.

Two T. V. programs were broadcast to further acquaint the public, particularly the urban audience with the 4-H program in Sullivan County. One program involved Assistant Extension Agent Joyce Gaines and the other involved two 4-H members.

Sullivan County 4-H'ers exhibited three head of Guernsey cattle at the National Junior Dairy and National Open Dairy Show in Columbus, Ohio. David Doran, Walt Stickle and Mark Baird were the representatives of Sullivan County who placed their animals on the State Herd.

Sullivan County 4-H'ers placed 47 steers and approximately 20 heifers of feed for the Bristol Steer and Heifer Show. Extension personnel assisted 4-H'ers and their parents in purchasing calves through feeder sales, farm visits and other personal contacts.

Eight hundred Sullivan County 4-H'ers participated in the Annual Achievement Day activities sponsored by the Bristol Chamber of Commerce. 4-H'ers, 4-H leaders and extension personnel assisted with the program.

Sullivan County Junior Livestock Project Group reorganized for the 1974-1974 year. Over 30 4-H members enrolled in this activity.

Sullivan County 4-H Agents worked with the Bristol Newspapers to write a 4-H Tabloid commemorating National 4-H Week. Articles were written and pictures taken and submitted to the newspaper for publication during National 4-H Club week.

Also during the quarter, Extension Personnel attended various agriculture meetings, including the Annual DHI meeting, the Sullivan County Livestock Association Meeting, the annual Farm Bureau State and County Meeting, Annual Honor Club Initiation, Pioneer Seed Corn meeting, the Annual Leader's Meeting and Banquet, the Young Farmers and Homemakers Organizational meeting.



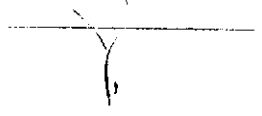

Section 4. For the purpose of providing funds with which to pay the interest accruing on said bonds and the principal thereof at maturity there shall be and there is hereby levied upon all the taxable property in Sullivan County, in addition to all other taxes, a direct annual tax for each of the years while said bonds, or any of them, are outstanding in amounts sufficient for that purpose. Principal or interest coming due at any time when there are insufficient funds on hand to pay the same shall be promptly paid when due from the general fund or other available funds of said county and reimbursement shall be made to such fund or funds in the amount of the sums thus advanced when taxes provided for that purpose shall have been collected.

Section 5. Said bonds shall be sold at public sale by the County Judge of Sullivan County in the manner, time and form required by law and shall be sold to the highest bidder pursuant to advertised notice of sale. None of said bonds shall be sold for less than par and accrued interest to date of delivery, provided that the necessary expense in the issuance and sale of said bonds shall be paid from the proceeds of the sale. The action of the County Judge in consummating such sale and fixing the interest rate or rates on the bonds in accordance with the bid accepted, but not to exceed seven per cent (7%) per annum, shall be binding upon the county and this Quarterly County Court, and no further action shall be necessary in relation thereto. Notice of such sale shall be published at least 14 days prior to the sale date in the manner required by law.

Section 6. The proceeds of said bonds shall be turned over to the County Trustee of Sullivan County and shall be paid out for the purpose and in the manner required by law and this resolution; and

portions of said proceeds shall be paid to the respective Treasurers of the Cities of Bristol and Kingsport in the manner required by Section 49-711 of Tennessee Code Annotated. In the event that the proceeds of any portion of said bonds have been anticipated by the issuance of bond anticipation notes of Sullivan County, the principal proceeds of said bonds in an amount not exceeding the principal amount of said notes then outstanding shall be used to retire the principal amount of such notes.

Section 7. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this resolution shall be held to be invalid or ineffective for any reason, the remainder of this resolution shall remain in full force and effect, it being expressly hereby found and declared that the remainder of this resolution would have been adopted by this Quarterly County Court despite the invalidity of such section, paragraph, clause or provision.

Section 8. All orders or resolutions in conflict herewith be and the same are hereby repealed insofar as such conflict exists and this resolution shall take effect immediately upon its passage, the public welfare requiring it.

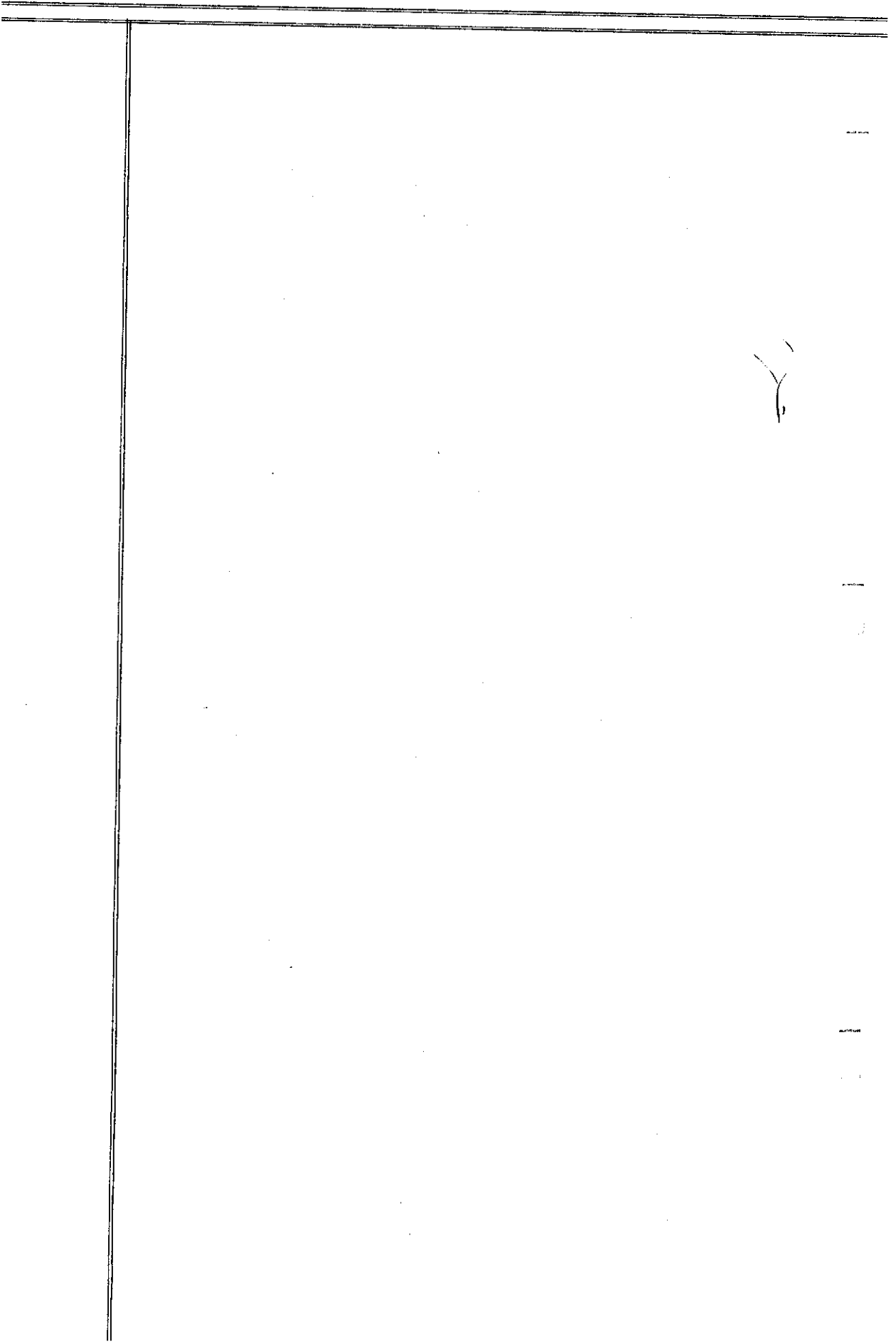
