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QUARTERLY REPORT OF

J. CRAFT AKARD, SUPT. OF SCHOOLS J. Craft Akard, Superintendent of Sullivan County Schools presented is report for the quarter ending December 31, 1970 which was received and adopted by a voice vote of the Court and is in the following words and figures to-wit:

If you will recall County Court approved a resolution November 16, 1970 approving an estimated cost of \$500,000.00 including the cities' share and authorizing the Sullivan County Board of Education to draw plans, takebids, and present the actual cost at the January Court 1971. A resolution will be introduced in County Court Monday, January 18, requesting issuance of scient bonds in the amount of \$432,000.00.

Bristol, Tennessee, has passed on second reading a proposal to annex an area including Avoca, a

enrollment of approximately 1,200. Since citizens of the Avoca Community filed suit Konday, January 11, against Bristol City Officials, we have no idea when the case will be settled.

The proposed annexation would affect several county schools including Valley Pike, Holston Valley, Weavers, East, Avoca and Bluff City. The annexation would take all of Avoca Elementary School with an enrollment of 694 with the exception of 77 students. At present the following number of students from the proposed areas to be annexed are attending sounty schools.

Holston Valley Jr., High - 19
East High - 205
Valley Pike Elementary - 66
Weavers Elementary - 48
Bluff City Jr., High - 184

It has been brought to my attention unofficially in the past few days that Kingsport is considering annexation of certain areas around Kingsport, possibly before the 1971-72 school year.

In light of the proposed Bristol Annexation and possible annexations by Kingsport, we do not believe it would be feasible for us to project by April 1971 school building needs for the next five years as requested in a resolution passed by County Court on November 16, 1970.

Since it is inevitable that the Board of Education will be reapportioned on a one man-one vote rule based on recent Federal Court decisions and since the County Court has authorized the Court Education Committee to submit a reapportionment plan to County Court, the Sullivan County Board of Education in session December 17, 1970 recommended the following reapportionment plan to the Court Education Committee for consideration.

- (1) That the Sullivan County Board of Education consist of nine (9) members and that three (3) members are to be elected from each of the present legislative districts which were established to elect members to the State House of Representatives.
- (2) That such members be elected to serve six-year terms on a staggered basis and that to establish such a staggered basis in the initial election, the person receiving the highest vote shall serve a six-year term, the person receiving the next highest vote shall serve a four-year term and the person receiving the third highest vote shall serve a two-year term.
- (3) That the first Board of Education established under the foregoing provisions shall be elected in the General Election of August, 1972.

However, the Board of Education is openminded to any other plan that may be submitted realizing it will be difficult for the County Court to approve a plan that will satisfy everyone.

The Sullivan County Board of Education would like to submit a proposal to the Tennessee State
Board for Vecational Education during the spring of 1971 seeking approval of and funds for the construction
of an area Vecational Education school in the western portion of the county. Such a school would be built with
the view in mind of serving the vecational needs of boys and girls attending the County high schools in that
section of the county. A school of this namure would be owned by the Sullivan County Board of Education and
operated in cooperation with the State Board for Vecational Education under terms of the State Plan for
Vecational Education.

Through establishment of a vocational school a many faceted program can be initiated for the purpose of meeting specific and proven needs. Among these needs are (1) A reduction of the dropout rate from the County schools. This will be accomplished by offering vocational programs attuned to individual and group needs.

(2) The preparation of youths and adults for gainful occupations. This school would serve not only students currently enrolled in high school but would provide a potential for an avening adult program and for training, re-training, or up-grading the labor force for new or existing area jobs. (3) To serve

various sectors of community life through programs designed to stimulate economic and social growth. In order to provide a vocational education curriculum to meet the needs and attain the objectives indicated above, it will be proposed that vocational programs similar to those listed below be offered. (The specific programs would be selected only after surveys and conferences with all sectors of the economic area to be served relative to the need for such programs.)

Preliminary conferences with regional vocational personnel from the State Department of
Education indicate that, based on the number of students to be served and on an estimate of the number
of programs to be offered, the physical plant would require a building with a floor area of approximately
70,000 square feet. A normal shop class would require a minimal space of at least 3,000 square feet. The
program envisioned would require fifteen or twenty such shop areas. State and federal regulations would require
that such a building be located on a site of not less than twenty-five to thirty acres. They further
specify that vocational funds available for constructing and equipping such facilities pertain to new
construction only and no provision is made for the renovation of existing facilities. The cost of a
building of this size on the necessary acreage with all shops fully equipped and ready for use is estimated
at \$1,500,000.00. Of this amount Sullivan County would be eligible to receive a total of 60 per cent
under Sections 211 and 214 of the Appalachian Act and the remaining 40 per cent would be financed with
local funds. In other words, the project would involve \$600,000.00 in local funds and \$900,000.00 in
federal funds.

Students attending a vocational school of the type proposed would normally spend one-half of each school day in their regular high school and one-half of each day at the vocational school. In their regular school they would take the normal academic subjects and would go to the vocational school only for vocational education courses. These students would receive their regular high school diploma from the high school which they would normally attend and would participate in the various programs and extra -curricular activities on their home school campus.

We think there can be no doubt that our boys and girls need to have the vocation educational opportunities that a program of this type would afford. While there are many details to be considered and much work to be done in preparation, I believe that we should move forward immediately toward a realization of this goal.

We realize at this time we can only estimate costs. We do need at this term of Court a reaction to the proposed vocational school before we proceed with studies and surveys. Based on our discussions with state officials, we could not hope to secure approval of Federal funds until sometime after July 1, 1971. However, taking into consideration the amount of surveys and studies we will need to make before we submit a proposed plan to the proper authorities, we need to start planning immediately. At the time our project would be submitted, we would need to attach a resolution certifying that Sullivan County would pay its proportional share of the cost.

Helen R. Stocking, Home Agent Presented her report for the period ending September 30, 1970, which was received and adopted by a Voice Vote of the Court which was in the following words and figures, to-wit:

JUDGE LON V. BOYD AND MEMBERS OF THE SULLIVAN COUNTY COURT:

Following is a brief report of the County Extension Agent - Home-Economics for the quarter ending December 31,

Materials were prepared for and a class session given on a variety of party foods. This was doen with the Home Service representative of the Kingsport Power Corpany for home demonstration club members to help them with entertainment for the holidays and other such occasions.

A program on cuts of meat was prepared and presented to clubs requesting it. This program will be available to clubs on request.

(A good deal of time was spent preparing for a More Demonstration Club" Holiday Pair? At this event each club set up a booth displaying holiday crafts and band mode gift ideas. It was held in the auditorium of the Kingsport power Co. and was open to the public from 1: P.M. to 8:00 P. M. About 600 attended.

The Home Demonstration Club Handbook was printed and fistributed to each club.

I attended a state Extension Conference in Nashville, also a sewing instruction class in Johnson City and an area nutrition conference in Knoxville.

Four stitchery classes were taught.

Training classes on Laundry methods were held for home management leaders. This included the study of today's laundry equipment, detergents, other cleaning agents, spot removal, handling of various fabrics, etc.

The county nutrition committee met to plan for the year.

I taught a session of the 4-H Leadership - In Depth series and assisted with the final meeting.

I met with women of the Holston Valley Community Hospital Auxiliary to discuss the possiblility of home demonstration club members helping with the Wilcox Mall rehabilitation program,

I presented a program on holiday decorations to the Bristol Altrusa Club.

I attended a district Extension meeting in Morristown. I also planned further with the Extension Training and Studies Department for my current graduate study program.

J. W. McClain, County Agent presented his report for the period ending Becember 31, 1970, which was received and adopted by a Voice Vote of the Court which was in the following words and figures to-wit:

JUDGE LON V. BOYD AND BENEERS OF THE SULLIVAN COUNTY QUARTERLY COURT:

This is a brief report from the County Extension Agent for the quarter ending December 31, 1970. Sur 1970 tobacco crop was good in both yield and cales price. Dry weather and Southern Corn Leaf Elight made for a

very poor corn crop. Hay production was down byt a favorable fall helped conserve the limited supplies.

Southern corn leaf blight has and is attracting a lot of attention and is expected to be a big factor in 1971 corn production. We had Joe Burns, U. T. Agronomy Specialialist, here for corn production meetings on November 23. Information on tolerant corn varieties have been mailed, given on radio and TV programs and in newspapers. Planting a tolerant variety is the only control for this disease and there will probably not be enough tolerant seed of the better hybrid to go around.

We worked closely with consignors to the Mountain Breeders (Hereford) and the Angus Feeder Calf sales at Johnson City. 234 Hereford and 425 Angus calves were consigned from Sullivan County. In each sale, Sullivan County had the highest average grade. We also worked with a number of local producers selling in other graded steer and calf sales.

Freeze branding demonstrations were done in three beef and one dairy herd as a method of individual animal identification.

Ten beef cattle herds are enrolled in the Tennessee Beef Cattle Improvement Program and the calves have been weighed and graded this fall. Sullivan has the second highest number of herds enrolled in this program.

We have encouraged farmers to send in soil samples to the Soil Testing Laboratory, Sullivan had the second highest number of samples tested during the first 9 months.

We secured speakers for the Kingsport Cosmopolitan and Bristol Kiwanis Clubs Farm City Week Programs. A number of farmers were invited to these meetings.

Most of my time was spent with individual telephone and office calls and farm visits. These requests range from the a specific question to entire farm planning.

Judge Ion V. Boyd and Members of the Sullivan County Quarterly Court:

This is a brief report from the County Extension Agent for the quarter ending December 31, 1970.

Assistance was given at the East Tennessee Angus Feeder Calf Sale held in Johnson City where 27 farmers from Sullivan County sold 425 head of calves. The calves were weighed, graded and penned and sold by weight and grade. Mast went to feed-lots.

The fruit, vegetable and crops exhibits were judged at the Abingdon Tobacco Festival at Abingdon.

Considering the dry weather, exhibits were extra good in quality. Some 4-H members from Sullivan County entered livestock in the show.

Programs were given at the following: Fairview Community Club -- Agricultural Careers and U. T. College of Agri.; Oakleigh Home Demonstration Club- illustrated talk on landscaping. Assistance was given at two of 7 Leadership In-Depth training meeting for 4-H leaders.

Two community leaders from the county were accompanied to Washington County for purpose of judging the County Improvement Contest in that county.

Other meetings sponsored andheld by leaders were annual 4-H Achievement Day sponsored by Bristol Chamber of Commerce, Farm Bureau annual 4-H Achievement Day sponsored by Bristol Chamber of Commerce, Farm Bureau annual meeting, Home Demonstration Club annual leadership meeting and 4-H Club Annual Leaders Banquet.

A corn survey was partially made for purpose of making our annual plan of work. Approximately 40 corn growers are to be interviewed to see what practices are being carried out in corn production. j The important points to consider in new years program can be arrived at from the summary when complete.

A few silage samples have been picked up on farms and sent to laboratory for analysis. Joe Burns, Associate Professor of Agrononomy, assisted in 2 mestings on cornproduction and how to avoid the corn blight problem. Mr. Charles Hadden, Plant Pathologist, Knoxville was secured for Farm-City Day speaker at Bristol Kiwanis Club. He spoke on Corn Blight.

A USDA Defense , Board Meeting was attended in Morristown along with other paid Agricultural workers.

A state wide meeting was attended for all extension workers in Nashville. Purpose was to bring all employees up to date on re-organization in Extension.

One day was spent at in-service training on Visual Aid in Knoxville. A meeting by Geigy Chemical Company on Herbicides was attended in Johnson City. One 6, E. C. Committee meeting was attended when preliminary plans were made to assist low income families with gardens.

A conference was held with Mr. Jim Pierce, Supt. of Area Vocational Technical School at which time a discussion was held on plans to include some Horticultural and Landscaping Courses at the school. This probably would be a long time goal of the Area School.

Some time was spent on the 4-H Club Woodland project at Central High School. Material has been secured and small signs made for labeling various species of trees and plants. Mr. Earl Cady, Extension Forester is assisting in this project.

PROPOSAL OF THE DEPARTMENT OF HIGHWAYS OF THE STATE OF TENNESSEE

TO THE COUNTY OF SULLIVAN, TENNESSEE:

The DEPARTMENT OF HICHWAYS of the State of Tennessee, hereinafter called "DEPARTMENT" to construct a project designated as NO: SP-82006-2218-04 ROW- in the COUNTY OF SULLIVAN, provided the COUNTY will cooperate with the IEPARTMENT as set forth in this Proposal so that the general highway program be carried out in accordance with the intent of the General Assembly of the State.

Accordingly, if the COUNTY will agree:

I. That in the event any suits in cross-eminent domain are instituted by reason of the DEPART-MENT, or its contractor, going upon the right-of-way and easements, and constructing said project in accordance with the plans and as necessary to make the completed project functional, it will notify in writing, the EFARTMENT'S Attorney, whose address is 812 State Highway Building, Nashwille, Tennessee 37219, of the institution of each suit, the declaration and all other pleadings, within ten (10) days of the filing of each of the same, under penalty of defending such suits and paying any judgments which result therefrom at its own expense; and

2. To close or otherwise modify any streets or other public ways as may be indicated on said plans and prohibit parking on the entire right-of-way unless, to the extent that parking may be specifically authorized thereby; and

3. To transfer or cause to be transferred to the DEPARTMENT, without cost, all land owned by it or by any of its instrumentalities as may be needed for right-of-way or easement purposes, provided such land is being used for street, alley or other public way purposes; and

4. To cooperate with the DEPARTMENT by effecting the removal, relocation or adjustment of the facilities of any utility, public or private, without cost to the DEPARTMENT, which are located within the right-of-way of any street, alley or other public way, as may be necessary to contruct the project; and
5. That if any frontage roads are constructed by the DEFARIMENT as a result of the construction of this project, it will maintain such roads in the same manner as its streets are maintained, without cost to the DEPARTMENT: and

6. That after said project is completed and accepted, such parts of any present highway as are not removed, but are replaced by said project, will be accepted by it: for future maintenance; and 7. Not to pass any Resolution which would be in conflict with any of the above prescribed provisions: then

The DEPARTMENT, following the acceptance of this proposal, will acquire the rights-of-way and sasements hecessa; ry to construct the project in accordance with the plans and any amendments thereto, thereafter accomplish the construction of the project, and defend any cross-eminent domain suits of which it has received the notices provided for herein.

The plans for the project hereinbefore identified by number are incorporated by reference thereto and shall be consi ered a part hereof, including any revisions or amendments thereto, provided a copy of each is furnished the COUNTY.

The acceptance of this Proposal shall be evidenced by the passage of a proper Resolution which shall incorporate the same verbatim, at the next regularly scheduled meeting of the County Court.
