

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I hope that your holiday season was a joyous one and that 1974 will be a year of health, happiness, and prosperity for each of you.

As you know, I have had some physical problems for the past several months which have severely limited my ability to be as active as I wish I might have been in fulfilling the duties and responsibilities of my office. However, I have been in daily contact with my staff personnel in the central office and with members of the Board of Education concerning decisions to be made and policies to be pursued. I am now undergoing a new series of medical treatments and have every hope that I will be back on the job on a full-time basis in a short time.

Our recent decision to move schedules ahead one hour on daylight saving time was made only after a great amount of thought and discussion by members of the Board of Education, various school personnel, and a great number of parents. We realize that the new hours now being observed present an inconvenience to many parents. On the other hand, the Board of Education had a greater dislike for the thought of five and six year old children waiting in the dark for school buses an hour and a half before daylight during the two coldest months of the year. At the last meeting of the Board of Education on January 10, it was decided to close schools thirty minutes earlier for a temporary period of time. We believe this will offer relief to many people.

We have not been able to secure the services of an architect to prepare specifications, etc., for the re-roofing of East High School. The reason that architectural services are not available appears to be the fact that the Board of Education is now involved in litigation to determine responsibility and recover damages for the inadequacies of the present roof. Of course, it would be no problem to secure roofing specifications without the services of an architect provided that we can secure binding assurances that we would not encounter the same problems with a new roof that we are now having with the present roof. Within the past few days, we have asked the School Planning Division of the State Department of Education for advice concerning a solution of the problem. They have promised to give it their immediate attention and



also to discuss the matter with the State Architect. We expect to hear from them within a day or so.

During the week of January 7-11, the Title I program began a new service to teachers. Special reading materials have been purchased with federal funds, and will be available for teachers to borrow for use in their classrooms. The materials are located in the new Central Resource Center on the second floor of the Superintendent's Office. A delivery van will be used to distribute and pick up materials once a week at all Title I schools. All magistrates are cordially invited to visit the Center at their convenience.

A request for \$2,217,565.00 for a new comprehensive high school in west Sullivan County is part of a \$62,695,000.00 Vocational Education Program that Governor Dunn is presenting to the State Legislature. This request will be submitted to the Eighty-eighth General Assembly and represents the first year portion of a three year program. The funds for this year are to be used for the construction of the Vocational portion of a proposed comprehensive high school in the western part of Sullivan County that would consolidate Katron, Lynn View, and Sullivan. We will present to you broader and more specific details at the April term of Court concerning our future building needs.

AGRICULTURAL WORK AREA

The past three months have been used doing routine extension work while giving individual assistance to farmers and others making special requests. In addition 30 tobacco producers comprising a random sample of the 2932 tobacco growers were surveyed to help determine long range educational programs that could result in higher income from the sale of the 3,171,720 pounds of tobacco allotted to Sullivan County.

During this time, agents continued working with county livestock producers taking part in the area feeder calf sales encouraging marketing of better calves for more money.

This table shows the results for the past three years for feeder calves sold through the Mountain Breeders Hereford and Angus sales held in Johnson City.

Another very important research undertaking being carried out by local beef cattle producers and the University of Tennessee Animal Science Department is the Tennessee Beef Cattle Improvement Program. This is a program to allow the cattle breeder to test his own herd under local conditions and to evaluate animals in his own herd. This fall Extension Agents worked with seven purebred producers grading and weighing 82 bulls, 137 heifers and 77 steers enrolled in this program. Three of the breeders have two bulls each in the U. T. Bull Evaluation Station where their records for the first 84 days of the 140 feed test are impressive. One bull was the top gaining animal with an 84 day gain of 351 pounds. Also three other bulls ranked 6, 11, and 18 in the test station results for all bulls.

In 1973, 784 soil samples were sent to the University of Tennessee Soil Testing Laboratory to determine the availability of major plant nutrients. The samples were run with a copy of the results being forwarded to the Extension Office and one to the producer. Assistance was given to individuals concerning the recommendations of applying needed plant food to their crops.

In October, a sorghum specialist from the University of Tennessee Food Technology Department visited farmers and civic club leaders in the Kingsport Area to determine the failure of sorghum juices to produce desirable molasses. In studying the sorghum plants and juices he discovered a grain producing variety of sorghum had been planted instead of the syrup variety.

In November, an Extension Forester visited 2 days with Sullivan County Farmers concerning the best ways to market trees and forest products. This service is available at no cost to the farmer and could increase his income from the sale

of trees and boundries of timber.

The Fairview Community Club entered the East Tennessee Community Improvement contest held in December at the Institute of Agriculture at the University of Tennessee sponsored by the Central Committee and other Knoxville business groups. Four members of the club attended the banquet and took part in the awards program.

#### HOME ECONOMICS WORK AREA

The October Home Demonstration Club Council Meeting was combined with the training meeting for new club officers. Duties for officers were discussed and various functions of each office outlined. Officers serve two year terms.

In preparation for revising the Home Management Program a survey was made of the practices of thirty Home Demonstration Club members. This will be used to plan the long range program in the Home Management Program area.

The Annual Home Demonstration Club Dress Revue was held, sponsored by the Kingsport Chamber of Commerce. Sixty-five members modeled garments which they had made. A program was presented by a home economist from one of the zipper companies, showing the latest techniques in zipper and trim application.

One Hundred and sixty Home Demonstration Club members attended the annual county-wide fall meeting.

The Bristol Retail Merchants' Association sponsored the Home Demonstration Club Outstanding Leaders Recognition Banquet.

The Home Economic Agents received training from the University of Tennessee Specialists on restoring of old trunks and picture frames, on the new food labeling laws, and safety in food handling. This information will be taught and used in the county as need and time permits.

Much time was spent in planning and executing the annual holiday foods program. This is done in cooperation with the home economist of the Kingsport Power Company, Mrs. Bennett McAlpine. We presented the program for five audiences (one day given to home economics students of the Kingsport area). This year's theme centered around our heritage and was called, "Holidays in Mamma's Kitchen". A Thanksgiving Dinner, Christmas Brunch, and New Year's Open House were highlighted. Food decorations were featured.

At least five hundred people visited our Holiday Fair and Bazaar. This gives the Home Demonstration Club members an opportunity to share their skills and ideas with other women throughout the area, as well as a sales outlet for some of their foods and crafts.

We have been putting great emphasis on the why's of food costs and trying to inform homemakers of ways to keep families well nourished on limited incomes. Radio programs, news columns, club meetings and TV programs have been used to distribute this information.

Radio programs and news columns cover a multitude of subjects: buying, preparation, storage of many foods; smooth-top kitchen ranges; fad diets; safety in handling foods; toy safety; energy conservation; bleaching products.

## 4-H AND OTHER YOUTH WORK AREA

In the last quarter 106 4-H Clubs have been organized and re-organized in the county and city school systems with a total enrollment of 3,095. Extension agents and 4-H Club leaders met with each club to elect officers and to plan programs for their meetings throughout the year. Considerable time was spent assisting 4-H members in selecting, buying, formulating rations, teaching feeding methods and implanting growth stimulants in many of the 47 steers to be entered in the 1974 Bristol Steer Show and Sale. In addition to scheduled 4-H Club meetings, Extension Agents assisted the Sullivan County 4-H Honor Club organization with three regular meetings including the initiation ceremony in December for eight new members. The Honor Club barbecued chicken to feed approximately one thousand people for the Farm Bureau Annual picnic, cut fire wood and planted two thousand pine seedlings as fund raising projects.

The annual 4-H Achievement day was held this fall with over eight hundred members attending with fifty receiving awards for outstanding 4-H work. Officer-Leader day was held at the University of Tennessee November 10 with 144 elected 4-H officers and adult leaders participating.

In December, sixty applications were completed by 4-H members to receive baby chicks in February. This project teaches boys and girls to care for live animals while supplying some of the best egg laying breeds of pullets for family flock replacements. The pullets are grown by 4-H members and sold at public auction in August with the proceeds being used to buy more pullets for 4-H'ers the next year.

Other activities with which agents worked this quarter included:

1. Assisted four 4-H members participating in the 1973 National Guernsey Show in Madison Wisconsin.
2. Held the first bicycle rally day with 19 entries.
3. Judged over 1500 Christmas Craft exhibits by 4-H members in December.
4. Made plans for a ten week 4-H Dog training and obedience course.
5. Assisted the Kingsport Chamber of Commerce in holding a banquet for thirty-five 4-H Club leaders. Eight of the leaders received special recognition for their outstanding years of service.
6. Conducted two work shops in Christmas Crafts and Clothing Construction for Adult and Junior High 4-H Leader.
7. Conducted the annual County 4-H Officer and Leader Training courses.

The Welfare Department will continue to request appropriations from the Sullivan County Court to meet this need.

Detailed court reports on case activity will no longer be made to the quarterly County Court regarding Food Stamp or Public Assistance programs. As you are no doubt aware, the Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind and Aid to Disabled cases were transferred to the Social Security Administration effective January 1, 1974.

The Sullivan County Welfare Department staff wishes to express our appreciation to County Judge Lon V. Boyd and the members of this Honorable Court for your cooperation and support in our endeavor to render services to the people of this county.

January 17, 1974SUMMARY OF THE YEAR 1973 - REPORT OF ASSESSOR'S OFFICE

January 1, 1973, instituted many changes in the Assessor's Office. We classified 57,000 pieces of property which involved 114,000 changes in our records on real estate. We also worked 124 trailer parks containing 2,480 mobile homes and approximately 3,000 mobile homes on individual properties which were changed from individual assessments to the land on which they were located.

We have transferred 5,522 parcels of property also made 681 splits, placed on maps 20 new subdivisions, gaining 1198 new parcels for 1974. We have measured and graded approximately 625 new houses and commercials for 1973-74. Four new industries have been assessed in 1973, and tax resummes have been written for seven prospective industries and four commercials.

The Assessor of Property has visited and inspected properties where people have ask for special inspections, some were justified some were not, but made for good public relations.

Since the month of October, the Assessor of Property Office has helped approximately 1,000 elderly and disabled persons with their tax rebate forms. This requires about 15 minutes per person to fill in the application.

January 1, 1974, requires by law all exempted properties to fill out an exemption form, this includes churches, clubs, fraternal organizations or any non profit organization. By having most of this property exempted over the last period of years, has posed quite a problem in attempting to find addresses to mail the form. The law also states that any one of the institutions or organizations that does not respond on these exemption forms, will automatically be assessed. These forms are returned to the Assessor's Office to be held until the Staff Attorney of the Division of Property Assessments in Nashville can come



to our office for final decision as to how much or all of this exempted property will remain exempted (Public Acts 67-502, Sect. 2, paragraph 2).

To really add to our efforts to maintain correct mailing addresses on all our properties, the Kingsport Post Office has added new routes, as have the Bristol, Blountville and Bluff City Post Offices. This past year we had quite a number of tax notices and other correspondence marked as Elvis Presley sings "Return to Sender, Address Unknown."

Beginning in November, the Welfare Department and Social Security Department have been instructed by the State and Federal Government, for recipients of food stamps and welfare funds, to break out the assessments for land and buildings. If their property is of value exceeding their limits for food stamps or welfare, then our office is the one who is contacted for lower assessments, which leaves our office responsible for the decision. I am getting quite a bit of static along these lines. Our assessment is based on value and if the value is there, we assess it and let the chips fall where they may.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Committees of the County Court who have been involved with the Assessor's Office, also the Judge and County Court for the splendid cooperation you have shown to our office this past year and we are looking forward to a good year and the same cooperation in 1974.

SUBJECT: Activity Report for Period November - December 1973

1. Highlights of my activities during the period were as follows:
  - a. Determined total expenses of CD office during period April - September 1973 and submitted claim for eligible items of reimbursement to the State CD office. Reimbursement has since been received and forwarded to the Director of Budget.
  - b. Attended a regular meeting of the Civil Air Patrol in Kingsport on the evening of November 12, 1973. Procedures for conduct of the annual test exercise were discussed.
  - c. Spent 14<sup>th</sup> and 15<sup>th</sup> of November in Civil Defense Headquarters in Nashville. Met key people I would be dealing with and was briefed by each of the department heads. During this period the ground work was laid for the On-Site-Assistance Project currently scheduled to begin on January 22, 1974.
  - d. On Saturday, November 17, participated in the annual Civil Air Patrol test exercise at the Tri-Cities Airport. Requested Civil Air Patrol to fly two test missions which were accomplished. From a Civil Defense standpoint, the exercise was successful.
  - e. Attended two meetings of Kingsport Amateur Radio Club and discussed projects of mutual interest to include the possibility of the county funding a portion of a radio repeater station. Such an installation would greatly enhance the amateur's capability to communicate with all areas of the county. The project has merit and would be valuable to the county in the event of an emergency. The Safety Committee has the matter under consideration.

- f. Attended an informal coordinating conference with Mrs. Nan O'Dell, Executive Director of the Kingsport Chapter of the American Red Cross; ~~Mr. Joel Stephens, Member of the Board of Directors and Chairman of the Automotive Transport Committee;~~ Mr. Grady Reed, Member of the Board of Directors and Chairman of the Service to Military Families Committee.
- g. On December 7 & 8, 1973, attended the quarterly meeting of the Tennessee Civil Defense Association in Nashville. In conjunction with the meeting, attended a Civil Defense Workshop at the State Civil Defense Headquarters. Also, toured the Surplus Property yard.
- h. Visited the Emergency Operating Centers in Bristol, Virginia and Johnson City and was briefed on their operations.
- i. Developed listing of personnel who desired Civil Defense and Volunteer Firemen automobile license plates for 1974 and mailed to CD Headquarters in Nashville.
- j. Spoke to the Cosmopolitan Kiwanis Club of Kingsport. Theme was generally directed toward the recently added responsibilities of Civil Defense ie., natural disasters.
- k. Completed a five unit home study course administered by the Civil Defense Staff College. Have enrolled in a second course.
- l. The most time consuming project during the period was the preparation for the "On-Site- Assistance" team visit with the attendant detailed coordination required.  
Principal tasks were:
- (1.) Preparation of lists of individuals, with addresses and telephone numbers to attend the "kick-off" meeting and be interviewed. Three "kick-off" meetings are scheduled (Kingsport, Bristol and Blountville).
  - (2.) Development of detailed information on Civil Defense type resources available throughout Sullivan County. List includes both public and privately owned property.
  - (3.) Development of background information and statistics on Sullivan County. Included are data on transportation systems, communications and media, medical facilities, population data, educational systems, shelters, law enforcement, fire fighting, utility systems, etc.
  - (4.) Preparation of letters to the 300 key personnel in the Cities and Sullivan County requesting participation and support for the project. Three separate letters required ie. Kingsport area, Bristol area and Sullivan County - Bluff City area. Letters were coordinated with Mayors and City Managers and signed by Judge Boyd and the Mayor concerned.
  - (5.) Scheduling and conducting a meeting of key personnel of the county as well as City Managers, Fire and Police Chiefs. This meeting was conducted on December 19, 1973 and chaired by Mr. Lloyd Barr.

- (6.) Arranged for administrative space for survey team.
2. Some difficulties have been experienced in obtaining adequate administrative help as the arrangement for the Industrial Development secretary to work for this office also has not proven satisfactory due to the volume of work. Mr. Eddie Williams has been extremely helpful in providing assistance in this area on a temporary basis; for the long term, this situation will not provide the necessary assistance and will inhibit the capability of this office to function efficiently.

## P R O P O S A L

OF THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION OF THE STATE OF TENNESSEE

TO THE COUNTY OF WASHINGTON, TENNESSEE:

The DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION of the State of Tennessee, hereinafter called "DEPARTMENT", proposes to construct a project designated as NO: APD-099-1(16) - (Interchange on SR 137 (Corridor "B") at County Road (Eastern Star Road) at the Washington-Sullivan County Line) - in the COUNTY OF WASHINGTON AND IN THE COUNTY OF SULLIVAN, provided the COUNTIES will cooperate with the DEPARTMENT as set forth in this proposal, so that the general highway program be carried out in accordance with the intent of the General Assembly of the State.

Accordingly, if the COUNTY will agree:

1. That in the event any civil actions in cross- eminent domain or for damages are instituted by reason of the DEPARTMENT, or its contractor, going upon the right-of-way and easements, and constructing said project in accordance with the plans and as necessary to make the completed project functional, it will notify in writing, the DEPARTMENT'S Attorney, whose address is Department of Transportation, State Highway Building, Nashville, Tennessee 37219, of the institution of each civil action, the complaint and all subsequent pleadings, within ten (10) days after the service of each of the same under penalty of defending such actions and paying any judgments which result therefrom at its own expense; and



2. To close or otherwise modify any of its roads, or other public ways as may be indicated on the project plans, as provided by law; and

3. To transfer or cause to be transferred to the DEPARTMENT without cost to it, all land owned by the COUNTY or by any of its instrumentalities as required for right-of-way or easement purposes, provided such land is being used or dedicated for road or other public way purposes; and

4. To effect the removal, relocation, or adjustment of the facilities of any utility, public and private, without cost to the DEPARTMENT, which are located within the right-of-way of any road, or other public way owned by it, as may be necessary to construct the project; and

5. That in regard to any interchange included within said project, it will not change any road or street within the limits of the right-of-way acquired for any interchange, nor will it alter the design or permit the installation or relocation of any utilities without first obtaining the approval of the DEPARTMENT; and

6. Not to pass any Resolutions which would be in conflict with any of the above prescribed provisions; then

Following the acceptance of this proposal, the DEPARTMENT will acquire the rights-of-way and easements as necessary to construct the project in accordance with the plans and any amendments thereto, thereafter accomplish the construction, and defend any cross- eminent

domain or damage civil actions of which it has received the notices provided for herein.

The project plans hereinbefore identified by number and description are incorporated by reference thereto and shall be considered a part of this proposal, including any revisions or amendments thereto, provided a copy of each is furnished the COUNTY.

The acceptance of this proposal shall be evidenced by the passage of a proper Resolution which shall incorporate the same verbatim, or by reference thereto, at the next regularly scheduled meeting of the County Court.

6. File and prosecute all tax delinquency matters.
7. Attend all meetings of the County Court, both Regular and Called Sessions.
8. Attend all committee meetings when requested by the Chairman to do so.
9. Attend the meetings of the School Board when requested to do so by the Chairman.
10. Prosecute all cases involving the personal use of county funds by any county official including use of assets of the county for personal use.
11. Advise the County Judge and members of County Court on legal matters concerning county government upon request.
12. Advise all county officeholders concerning legal matters upon request.
13. Do all other things required by statute and the act creating the office of county attorney.

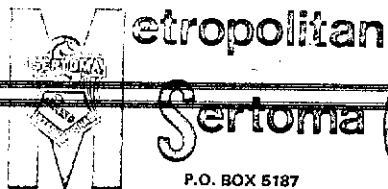

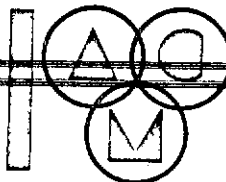
