Ladies and Gentlemen:

I trust that the holiday season has been a joyous occasion for each of you and I would like to wish you the very best in the coming year. I would like to thank you for your support in the past year, and ask for your continuing support as we try to provide better opportunities for the boys and girls in Sullivan County. I feel like it will take hard work and dedication on the part of all of us if we are to maintain and improve pur school system.

plans have been completed for the two new high schools and they have been advertised for bids. Since the site preparation phase of the projects has been completed, the actual construction should begin soon after the awarding of the contracts. Bids have been received for the building of the two new elementary schools and are in the process of being evaluated.

Building inspection of the renovation of Bluff City Elementary and Middle School was held on November 2 by the Sullivan County School Board. These two buildings are the first to be completed in the renovation program.

The new structure at Blountville Elementary and Middle School is nearing completion. The plans for the renovation of the existing buildings should be ready sometime in January.

An open house was held on November 20 with a walk—through tour of the new vocational facilities at East High School. The vocational building contains 39,293 square feet of floor space. Five hundred and seventeen students are served with vocational-technical classes. A similar facility is nearing completion at Central High School.

New bids have been received on the adjusted plans for the Holston Elementary-Middle School. It appears that the new bid will be within the budget.

Renovation of Gunnings School is well under way. Completion of the project will enable a county to meet several requirements of Section 504 of the Rehabilitation of the indicapped Act.

Four new buses have been purchased to transport special education children in Sullivan County this year. These buses are specially equipped to meet federal specifications and standards. The four buses have a total seating capacity of 62 and will transport students now enrolled at Long Island, Holston, Andrew Johnson and Palmer Center. Two of the buses are equipped with lifts for wheel chairs. The buses were purchased with State Special Education Funds.

The State Department of Education has approved a grant of \$57,754.00 for Federal Assistance for Handicapped Children in Sullivan County. These funds will provide tuition for seven children attending Palmer Center and Sequoyah School for the Handicapped. At these two schools the children will receive an individual instructional program as well as occupational and physical therapy. These funds will also provide salaries for four special education teachers at East High School, Sullivan West High School, Blountville Middle School and Holston Middle School. Three classes will be providing for fifty educable mentally retarded students and a fourth class will provide for six emotionally disturbed children. These funds were made available under the provisions of the Education of the Handicapped Act.

Local committees have been formed and approved by the Board of Education for the purpose of selecting textbooks for the 1978-79 school year. Many of our teachers will be involved a process of evaluating textbook samples that have been approved by the State Textbook mmission. The subjects that are up for adoption for the 1978-79 school year are: ading, Fine Arts, Trades and Industrial Education, Business Education, Driver Education and Distributive Education.

The Sullivan County School System is in the process of negotiating with Tennessee State Department of Education, Division of Vocational Education, in utilizing Federal Funds for the placement of two vocational guidance and placement coordinators in the two comprehensing high schools.

A program for the deinstitutionalized handicapped students enrolled in our school system has been submitted to the State Department of Education and final approval for the utilization of the federal funds in this area is expected soon. Our school system is cooperatively planning a school in-service work program to be financed with federal funds under the local CETA program directed by Pr. Eddie Williams.

Court Report

National School Lunch Week, observed during the second week in October throughout the country, was observed in all Sullivan County Schools. Many activities were planned and carried out during the week including special menus, promotional programs and nutrition poster contests.

The Tennessee School Food Service Supervisor's Study Council has been working toward the advancement of nutrition and education in the schools in the state. The Sulliva County Board of Education went on record in support of their proposals. The first one is for the establishment of certification requirements for the position of School Food Service Supervisor and is ready for consideration for the next State Board of Education meeting. The second proposal is to include a nutrition content course for teacher certification. It has become a very recognized fact that school children can have an opportunity to have a nutritious meal, but this does not mean that they will make use of that advantage.

We appreciate your interest and support of the educational system for the students of Sullivan County.

Agricultural Work Area:

During the past quarter the Extension Agents have continued to work with farmers and others requesting agricultural information.

In October a corn variety test plot grown by Eugene Rutherford, Route 2, Blountville, was evaluated. The results are as follows:

During the past three months, a special effort has been made by the Sullivan County Extension Agents and the State of Tannessee Department of Agriculture to help local farmers obtain needed hay or feed supplies and to assist producers that have excess hay through a referral system. We do not have any information as to how effective the program has been, but feel it will be of considerable benefit before the winter is over.

In November and December renewed efforts have been made with the Commissioner of Agriculture Mr. Edward S. Porter and Jimmy R. White, Division of Plant Industries Director, to help get rid of the black bird roost located north of Island Road approximately five miles west of the I 81 and 11W interchange. The different agencies have been studying and evaluating the roost. Plans are almost complete, and the roost should be treated in the near future.

Extension Agents continue to encourage and work with feeder pig producers that are finding the market to be strong. We now have two new feeder pig farrowing facilities under construction using plans recommended by the University of Tennessee Animal Science Swine Department. Sullivan County now has eight feeder pig producers selling pigs in organized feeder pig sales on a regular basis. These producers have been able to improve the grade on their pigs as their feeding and breeding programs improve.

A beef cattle survey to identify the needs of producers in Tennessee and Sullivan County was taken so effective programs could be planned around those needs. Surveys were taken from producers having 15 or more beef cows. The survey showed that the average Sullivan County producer was 54 years old, has 44 cews, using two bulls and weaning 41 calves on 103 acres. The survey also showed that more emphasis should be placed on obtaining heavier weaning weights, pest and disease control and prevention, working facilities, marketing, and the use of performance bulls or their equivalent.

* * * * *

Home Economics Work Area

At the beginning of the quarter the Home Demonstration Club Council met to make plans for six months of activity.

Training was received by Family Life project leaders emphasizing the importance of a varied reading program to the development of well rounded family living. Interior Design project leaders were given training in decorating with, and the care of house plants. These leaders in turn take the information received to their local clubs.

A workshop was held for making knit tops. By constructing these simple tops a very substantial savings can be realized over ready-made ones.

Forty women attended the Handicraft Guild show in Knowville to get ideas for constructing many of their own craft products. We also held our own gift and craft show and bazear to share ideas with others interested in hand made gifts and decorations. This gives the home demonstration club members an opportunity to help others with special projects. Exhibits were also presented for this purpose by several clubs during the quarter.

At the annual Fall Meeting programs were presented on food safety during the holiday season, using apples for food as well as holiday decorations, and economical gift wraps for home prepared foods.

An extensive program on holiday breads was presented to several groups with an exhibit of many different holiday breads.

Home Demonstration Club leaders were entertained at a banquet by the Bristol Retail Merchants Association.

The agent received training from University specialists in clothing construction, several areas of health and nutrition and seating of chairs and stools with splints and seagrass.

A countywide survey was started to determine practices of local homemakers in buying and constructing clothes for the family.

Newsletters, news columns and radio programs were prepared weekly, including such topics as microwave cooking, types of shears and scissors, safe decorating practices for the holidays, glass top ranges, porcelain enamel appliances, etc.

* * * *

4-H and Other Youth

During the past quarter 4-H activities have involved organizing clubs and training leaders. Meetings were held in Blountville and Bristol to train 4-H leaders. In October a Nutrition Workshop was held for 4-H adult and teen leaders. Training meetings for 4-H Club Officers were held in Bristol and Kingsport with 82 members attending.

The 47th Achievement Day parade was held in Bristol on October 21. 4-H Clubs participated in the marching parade and fifty trophies were swarded to outstanding 4-H ers.

4-H programs were presented to two school PTA's and one civic group. A 4-H promotional radio show was aired on WKFT.

A 4-H Electric Workshop was conducted on November 28 with fourteen 4-H'ers assembling pin-up lamps and participating in other related learning activities.

Five 4-H members attended National 4-H Congress in Chicago during the week of November 27 - December 1.

The County 4-H Awards Night was held on December 13 with the presentation of county 4-H project medals to deserving 4-H Club members. The 4-H Image Poster Contest was held at the same time with ninety-one winners from local contests participating.

During December local Christmas Crafts workshops were held at 20 schools. Eighty-eight 4-H Clubs held Christmas Crafts contests. These clubs were met and the crafts judged.

Regular monthly meetings were held for the 4-H Dog Club, the Livestock Club, the Home Economics Club, and the 4-H Honor Club.

The District All-Star Winter Conference was held in Knoxville on December 22. Five 4-H'ers and 4-H Extension Agent attended the conference and presented a report of All-Star achievements for the past year.

In November the livestock members interested in swine obtained their twelve pigs that will be shown in the District V Hog Show in February.

The livestock club sponsored the show-steer weigh-in for the May steer show. This was held in the Piney Flats Community on December 5.





During this reporting period a total of 149 non-recappable tire carcasses, approximately 600 lbs. of old inner tubes, liners and 12 broken tire rims were loaded and hauled to the Kingsport Landfill Transfer Station to be destroyed. During December, 1977, the Mampower Soil Conservation crew used 37 non-recappable tire carcasses to aid in the burning of brush in the Horse Creek section of the county. Sincere appreciation is expressed to both units for providing transportation in order that these old tires could be removed from the tire lot and disposed of in the proper manner.

On December 12, 1977, a total of 393 used tires of various sizes were sold to the highest bidder, (Doyle's Tire Service, Johnson City, Tennessee) for \$1,334.00. Sales of this type are advertised and held by the Sullivan County Purchasing Department at frequent intervals to rid the storage lot of tire carcasses.

SULLIVAN COUNTY - RESOLUTION OF GOVERNING BOARD

RE: USE OF FEDERAL SURPLUS PROPERTY UTILIZATION DIV.

WHEREAS, the Department of General Services, Federal Property Utilization Division, by authority of the Federal Property and Administrative Services Act of 1949, as amended, makes available Federal surplus personal property to public agencies for public purposes and to nonprofit tax-exempt health and educational institutions, and

WHEREAS, (Applicant Organization)

1s desirous of utilizing the services and resources of the Department of General Services, Federal Property Utilization Division, hereafter referred to as the State Agency, and

WHEREAS, the Applicant certifies that it is a public agency or a nonprofit educational or health institution exempt from taxation under Section 501 of the U.S. Internal revenue Code of 1954, and

WHEREAS, the Applicant further certifies that the property is needed and will be used for carrying out or promoting for the residents of a given political area one or more public purposes and for no other purpose, or be used for public health or educational purposes including research and for no other purpose, and

WHEREAS, the Applicant agrees that all items of property shall be placed in use for the purposes for which acquired within one year of receipt and shall be continued in use for such purposes for one year from the date the property was placed in use, and in the event the property is not so placed in use, or continued in use, the donee shall immediately notify the State Agency, and return said property to the State Agency, as directed, and

WHEREAS, the Applicant further agrees to adhere to any additional periods of restrictions placed on the property by the State Agency which shall include a total period of use restrictions for at least 18 months on all passenger motor vehicles and other items of property with a unit acquisition cost of \$3000 or more; and additional special terms, conditions, reservations and restrictions on aircraft, vessels, special limited or restricted use items, and other items as specified in a Conditional Transfer Document or written on the face of the distribution document, and

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

WHEREAS, this year, nineteen hundred and seventy-nine, commemorates the 200th year of the existence of Sullivan County; and

WHEREAS, Sullivan County's founding, heritage, and traditions, are in such close proximity to the birth of our country as an independent nation; and

WHEREAS, of celebrated note in the military campaigns of General Sullivan are the attack on Fort William and Mary on December 13, 1774 when in broad daylight under his command, John Sullivan and his men, being subjected to heavy musket fire, tore down the royal flag and carried off a hundred barrels of powder and many guns; and when after many military exploits, in 1779, the year Sullivan County was formed, General Sullivan was sent against the Iroquois Indians to avenge the "cruel massacre of the Valley of Wyoming"; and

WHEREAS, some of the earliest settlers in the state settled in the beautiful valley of the Holston; and

WHEREAS, no part of the state has more historical right to boast of the spirit of those early pioneers scaling the rugged peaks of the towering Applachians to bring order and civilization to the wild, unsettled territory; and

WHEREAS, Sullivan County, being the second oldest county in Tennessee, has since 1760 played an important role in the history of Tennessee and America; and

WHEREAS, the settling of this "western" American wilderness was not without its share of bloody Indian battles and raids with extreme hardship and exposure on the trails and rugged mountain terrain as homesteads and roads were carved out of the virgin land; and

WHEREAS, as a result of the determination and stamina of the pioneering spirit, by 1775 four main roads replaced ancient trails: more specifically, these westward wending roads were the Island Road, completed in 1761; Reedy Creek Road Duilt by 1773; the Watauga Road by 1773; and Boone's Wilderness Road cut through to Kentucky in 1775; and

WHEREAS, Sullivan County, being located in the Holston Valley with the Holston River flowing through a matural divide between the lofty Blue Ridge and Cumberland mountains of the Applachian range, thus had already become the pathway to America's first great western expansion; and

WHEREAS, through this divide many thousands of settlers moved westward; and

WEHREAS, Forts necessarily sprang up throughout the ever expanding territory to protect the settlers from their avenging Indian attackers with Colonel Evan Shelby's Fort (Bristol) standing at the entrance into the Holston region, and the imposing Fort

Patrick Henry (Kingsport) remaining garrisoned at the Long Island of the Holston; and

WHEREAS, the eventual consequence of war necessarily results in a settled peace, so it was with the Indian warring nations of the Tennessee, with the ever increasing number of white settlers in the region; and

WHEREAS, the Cherokee War of 1776 ended with a division of the great Cherokee Nation when Chief Dragging Canoe separated his marauding bands from the Cherokees to form the Chickamaugons; and

WHEREAS, following the Cherokee War, the Cherokees signed the Long Island Peace Treaty at the Long Island of the Holston on July 20, 1777, ceding additional land to their conquerors; and

WHEREAS, the land ceded by this treaty extended to the mouth of Clouds Creek, thence to the highest point of the Clinch Mountains with the southern boundary extending to the Nolechucky River, but excluding the Cherokees' "beloved island" being their sacred Long. Island of the Holston; and

WHEREAS, two separate treaties were signed by the Cherokees, one with the Virginia Commissioners and one with the North Carolina Commissioners; and

WHEREAS, by ceding this much land on both sides of the Holston River, it became necessary to solve the boundary problem between North Carolina and Virginia; and

WHEREAS, additionally, the Long Island Treaty, by opening additional Indian land for settlement, brought increasing numbers of settlers and land sales necessitating a more precise determination of the boundary; and

WHEREAS, in 1778, the legislatures of both Virginia and North Carolina appointed commissioners to extend and establish their mutual boundaries; and

WHEREAS, the venerable frontiersmen and experienced surveyors, Dr. Thomas Walker and Major Daniel Smith were commissioned by

Virginia, with North Carolina commissioning John Williams, Willaim Bailey Smith, and Colonel Richard Henderson, the famous purchaser of the Transylvania lands in Middle Tennessee and Kentucky; and

WHEREAS, establishing the new boundariæs proved to be no easy task, as the diary of the young Daniel Smith graphically recorded hardships of cold, hunger, Indian attacks, repeated loss of horses, and the natural difficulties of the rough mountain virgin forests; and

WHEREAS, after great dissention between the two groups of surveyors, eventually the Walker-Smith line in the Virginia-Tennessee sector was accepted, the same boundary line being the line which determined the territorial limits of Virginia, North Carolina, Tennessee, and Kentucky; and

WHEREAS, through this survey it was discovered that the section of land north of the Holston River, formerly believed to be a part of Virginia, was actually part of North Carolina, thus laying the foundation for the formation of Sullivan County; and

WHEREAS, the Assembly of North Carolina, in their October 1779 session created the county of Sullivam, reciting that all the lands westward of Steep Rock, lying in the north and northwest sides of the Holston River, have, by mistake of the settlers, been held and deemed to be in the State of Virginia, owing to which mistake they have not entered the said lands in the proper offices. Sullivan County is made to being on Steep Rock, thence along the dividing ridge that separates the waters of the Great Kanawka and Tennessee, to the head of Indian Creek, thence along the ridge that divides the waters of the Holston and Watauga, thence a direct line to the highest part of Chimney Top Mountain, at the Indian boundary with the western limits following the Indian boundary from Chimney Top Mountain westward and northward to the mouth of Clouds Creek and thence to the highest point of the Clinch Hountains; and

WHEREAS, in November of 1779, North Carolina's Governor Richard Caswell commissioned Colonel Isaac Shelby, commandant of the Sullivan County militia and named Henry Clark, Lieutenant-Colonel, David Looney, First Major, and John Shelby, Second Major; and

WHEREAS, during the period 1761 and 1779, this western American wilderness had thus felt the impact of white settlers, Indian battles and raids, peace treaties, and participation in the American Revolution; and

WHEREAS, of major import to this region was the famous battle of the Revolutionary War the same being the Battle of Kings Mountain, with the loyal and brave American colonial patriots assembling at Sycamore Shoals to gather strength and plan their strategy for the eventual total and irrevocable defeat of Colonel Patrick Ferguson and the British troops at this memorable battle; and

WHEREAS, throughout this entire period of Indian campaigns and the War of Independence the number of settlers and settlements in Sullivan County were rapidly and constantly increasing; and

WHEREAS, among the renowned families who established their plantations within the limits of Sullivan County before 1779, were Evan Shelby, John Sevier, Anthony Bledsoe, Gilbert Christian, Moses and David Looney, John Anderson, Joseph Martin, the family of Joseph Rhea, William Cocke, Henry and Nathaniel Clark, Jacob Womack, James Robertson, Joseph Kincaid, Edmund Choate, to name just a few among so many; and

WHEREAS, many of these prominent families continued to be influential in bringing peace to their land and in settling these lands and the lands to the west of them; and

WHEREAS, while the Cherokees became allies of the American patriots, the struggle with the Chickamaugans continued, and on January 8, 1779, a campaign was ordered by Governor Henry of Virginia and Governor Caswell of North Carolina to destroy the Chickamaugan

towns in order to safeguard the Holston-Temnessee river region, such that even the Cherokee Chief, The Ravem, conceded that the militiamen were justified in "warring against the rogues at Chuckemogo"; and

WHEREAS, between 600 and 1000 troops for this expedition, under the command of Colonel Evan Shelby who organized the ingenious amphibious plan, had assembled at James Robertson's Big Creek plantation and at the Long Island of the Holston where they built the canoes in which they would swiftly and silently descend the Holston-Tennessee Rivers in a surprise attack on the Chickamaugan villages; and

WHEREAS, in 1778 James Robertson rendezvoused with his allmale group on the Long Island of the Holston to travel to the Big
Salt Lick, leading the way for others to settle in the Cumberland
County; and

WHEREAS, early in 1779, Colonel John Donelson arrived at the Long Island of the Holston near Fort Patrick Henry with a large number of men, women, children, slaves, and family among whom was the young daughter Rachel, who later became wife of President Andrew Jackson; and

WHEREAS, during the spring and summer of 1779 Colonel Donelson's group busied themselves constructing the flotilla which would carry some three hundred people on their famous thousand mile voyage into Middle Tennessee; and

WHEREAS, the Cumberland settlement thus began as Robertson's overland group, and with Donelson's flotilla group settling Middle Tennessee, the Long Island of the Holston was the jumping-off point for the westward settlements; and Sullivar County by path, road and water was thus truly the first passageway to the west; and

WHEREAS, the first Sullivan County Court met on February 7, 1780, at the log home of Moses Looney on Island Road, which is still standing

and is currently the residence of Charles H. Pope; and

WHEREAS, at this first meeting following the announcement of the military appointments the first county court justices were introduced, the same being Colonel Isaac Shelby, Major David Looney, Major Gilbert Christian, Colonel Anthony Bledsoe, Captain George Maxwell, Captain John Anderson, and Major Joseph Martin with John Rhea appointed court clerk and Nathan Clark high sheriff, this outstanding group of patriots thus began building the first government of Sullivan County; and

WHEREAS, the Sullivan County Historical Commission is actively concerned in the preservation of such a time-honored heritage and tradition, and continues to procure funds to restore historic structures throughout the county; and

WHEREAS, to celebrate the bicentennial birthday of Sullivan County, commemorative automobile license plates are being issued and historical markers describing the county's formation are being procured so that historical events of note can be preserved for all time; and

WHEREAS, we would be remiss were we to overlook such an historical event as this the bicentennial celebration of the existence of Sullivan County; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-FIRST GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF TENNESSEE, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING,
That this assembly shares in this historic celebration by recognizing the tremendously important impact Sullivan County and its distinguished citizens had on the settlement and formation of the westward territories and with all ceremony and heraldry duly accorded, joins in wishing a happy and successful 200th birthday to historic and beautiful Sullivan County.
