J. C. Akard, Superintendent of Sullivan County Schools presented his report for the quarter ending June 30th 1970 which was received and adopted by a voice vote of the Court and is in the following words and figures to-wit:

Starting June 15 and running for six weeks, we are operating a summer school for make-up work for elementary students, grades three through eight. Approximately 1,100 students are enrolled in centers located at Blountville, Bluff City, Cedar Grove, Lynn Garden, Sullivan and Valley Pike Elementary Schools. Also, we have a summer school for make-up work for high school students at Central High School with approximately 500 in attendance. Students from all five County High Schools attend this summer school. The elementary summer schools are financed with federal funds and the high school summer school is financed with student tuition funds.

Our maintenance department will have a busy summer. Crews are now inspecting and cleaning boilers and sewer plants and making major and minor building repairs. Our school painting schedule is on a rotating basis with all schools painted inside and outside every six years. Schools to be painted this summer are Akard, Cold Springs, Kingsley, Mary Hughes, Sullivan High and Valley Pike. Caretakers and teachers constitute the painting crew.

Although the Court Budget Committee cut the proposed 1970-71 School Budget approved by the Board of Education and the Court Education Committee \$114,000.00, as we are well pleased with the results and the entire court is to be congratulated for its acceptance of the Court Budget Committee's recommendation. The total budget approved in the General Purpose School Fund was \$7,921,344.00 as compared with the amended 1969-70 School Budget of \$7,673,058.00, an increase of \$248,286.00.

When the Budget Committee requested that the Board of Education reduce its proposed budget \$114,000.00, we eliminated and request for secretaries in all of our elementary schools. We now find that the proposed school tax rate would provide sufficient funds to add secretaries in the five largest elementary schools-- Avoca, Kingsley, Lynn Garden, Miller Perry, Sullivan-- but not in the remaining elementary schools. We feel if we could make a start with the five larger schools, others could be added at a later date. We are one of the few school systems in this area without elementary school secretaries, who are most helpful to the principal and to the teachers. If possible, we would like for you to consider increasing the item in the school budget for secretaries by \$11,250.00 which would not alter the tax rate already set.

It has been a pleasure working with the County Court during the past school year and I compliment you for the efficient manner in which your committees have accepted their responsibilities and worked so closely with the various county departments. I want to particularly compliment the Court Education Committee for its interest and its willingness to face up the financial demands for the improvement of our school system.

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QUARTERLY REPORT OF J. W. McClain County Agent for Sullivan County, Tennessee presented his report
 COUNTY AGENT ending June 30th 1970 which report was received and adopted by a voice vote of the
 J.W. MC CLAIN Court and is in the following words and figures, to-wit:

JUNDE LON V. BOYD AND MEMEBERS OF THE SULLIVAN COUNTY QUARTERLY COURT:

This is a brief report from the County Agricultural Agent for the Quarter ending June 30, 1970. Agricultural production is being seriously hampered by the dry weather. Tobacco, corn, hay, vegetable crops and pastures must have rain soon or we will have very little or no yields this summer and fall.

The use of DDT and TDE on tobacco was banned by the USDA this spring. We have worked with tobacco growers informing them of other insecticides that may be used. There have been no serious problems.

Black Shank has been found in two tobacco patches recently. This is the most serious tobacco disease, but we have had very little of it in Sullivan County. Rotation and the use of a resistant variety are the only controls available.

Freeze branding demonstrations of Holstein heifers were held on two farms this quarter and one on a beef herd.

We assisted with the Bristol Junior Heifer Show on April 7, the Steer Show and Sale on April 8, and the Carcass Show on April 13.

Quite a bit of work was done with strawberry growers on chemical weed control and other cultural practices.

Most of the corn growers are using chemicals to control weeds and grass after planting by the conventional method or when the "no tillage" or "sod planting" method is used. Several fields have recently been inspected to see what weeds and grasses are not being controlled and programs outlined that may be followed in the future. More problems are showing up due to the drought conditions.

We have had assistance from the U. T. Animal Husbandry and Agricultural Engineering Departments for a hog producer that is building a controlled environment farrowing house.

Four Holstein breeders had their cows classified June 3 and 4 and one Angus breeder's head was classified May 21.

We have 9 beef herds enrolled in the Beef Cattle Improvement Program. This is a system of getting weights and grades on calves and determining rates of gain.

754 soil samples have been mailed by this office to the state soil testing laboratory..
We have had more than the usual number of calls from home owners concerning lawn, shrubbery and tree problems. Japanese Beetles are doing a lot of damage in Holston Valley and have shown up in other places in the County this year.

As usual, most of my time has been spent on individual phone calls, office calls, and farm and home visits. These range from entire farm planning to specific disease or insect problems.

Jon M. Baker, Assistant County Agent and Patricia Bowling, Assistant Home Agent presented their report for the Quarter ending June 30, 1970 which was received and adopted by a Voice Vote of the Court and is in the following words and figures, to-wit:

TO THE HONORABLE JUDGE LON V. BOYD AND MEMBERS OF THE SULLIVAN COUNTY QUARTERLY COURT:

This is a brief report from the Assistant County Agent and the Assistant Home Agent for the quarter ending June 30, 1970.

We assisted with the Bristol Junior Heifer Show April 7, the Steer Show and Sale on April 8, and the Carcass Show on April 13.

Five r-H members and one leader from Sullivan County attended State 4-H Club Congress in Nashville April 13-15.

The assistant home agent was out of the county for five days of in-service training; one day in clothing, two in food and nutrition, one for home management and one day for camp planning.

Sullivan County's annual Share-the-Fun Festival was held April 23. This is a talent show for 4-H Club members.

The assistant county agent took an agriculture judging team to Knoxville April 18.

The assistant home agent attended the Tennessee Home Economics Association Convention in Gatlinburg May 1 and 2.

May was filled with record book workshops in the schools and climaxing the 4-H Club school year.

The Electric Workshop for the Bristol area 4-H'ers was held May 16. Thirty-two boys and girls learned to assemble a study lamp.

County Demonstration Day was held May 23 with fifty boys and girls participating.

The assistant home agent attended the reading program tea and Spring luncheon for home demonstration club members. She also attended a luncheon for the Farm Bureau Women.

The 4-H Honor Club and the agents began making extensive plans for the Exchange Program in June.

The assistant home agent assisted judging recipes at the Dairy Council for June Dairy Month.

The first Dairy Foods Tasting Party in Sullivan County was held June 13. The best recipe from each 4-H Club was selected and the product judged and later sampled by the seventy people attending the event.

We attended State Extension Conference June 15-18.

Thirty-five 4-H'ers and their chaperones from Delaware County, Iowa visited with us June 21-27. This was the last half of a two way exchange program. This is one of the most outstanding activities for Senior Club members.

July 20, 1970

We attended District All-Star Conference June 27. Eleven 4-H members from Sullivan County were accepted into the honor organization.

We judged record books for senior and junior demonstration day in Knoxville, July 29 .

We had five district winners at Senior Demonstration Day in Greeneville. There will be four alternate winners attending State Round -Up in August along with the winners.

We added two radio programs to our schedule-one in Kingsport and one in Bristol.

A good deal of our time was spent writing news articles, answering phone calls and office calls. We also attended Young Farmer and Homemaker meetings, 4-H Honor Club meetings, and Farm Bureau meetings.

The following is a brief report of the Home Demonstration Agent for the quarter ending June 30, 1970.

Agent in-service training was held by the clothing specialist on tailoring techniques.

Considerable time was spent in preparing for the training.

More than 50 home demonstration club members traveled to Knoxville to tour the College of Home Economics, get landscaping ideas from the Horticulture department and attend the Dogwood Festival.

I also attended a foods and nutrition training meeting at the University.

Much time was spent in advance preparation of window treatment examples to be used in a television series, also in refinishing furniture for teaching and workshops.

Helped in the planning of 4-H Camp for Sullivan County girls.

Planned and held training session for home demonstration club officers.

Prepared and gave program for food stamp recipients.

Held training meeting for reading chairman.

Prepared and presented a T. V. program.

Annual home demonstration luncheon was held, with interesting program on history of Kingsport area.

Met with the women of the Farm Bureau.

Had council meeting and planned for next twelve months.

I attended the Extension Conference in Knoxville.

I am now attending the summer session at the University of Tennessee which started June 17th, taking a course in working with the disadvantaged and in the preparation of educational medic.

In addition, I attended home demonstration clubs, wrote news articles, prepared radio programs, and handled the usual letters etc. necessary to the on-going program.

The following items represent the major efforts of the Sullivan County Civil Defense Office for the second quarter of calendar year, 1970.

Active participation with the Scott County, Virginia authorities during their Emergency Operation Simulation Training revealed our mutual interdependence in the event of a national emergency. The Exercise was conducted by the extension staff of the University of Virginia.

Civil Defense and related films were provided by this office to several senior classes at Central High School.

Plans were made from training classes in Radiological Monitoring and Shelter Management.

A meeting was held with the Tennessee Department of Education Civil Defense representative and a county school supervisor to outline an emergency plan for the county's school children.

A yearly civil defense research conference was attended in Oak Ridge which reported on such topics as Rural Civil Defense, Shelter Building, Food Vulnerability, and other related subjects.

A meeting was held with the federal Civil Defense Regional Field Officer for Tennessee in which the discussion centered around emergency facilities and the long range civil defense needs of the county. The use of Military Officer Reserve Units in the local civil defense program was accepted if these units become available.

A United States Department of Agriculture Defense Board meeting resulted in the completion of a questionnaire designating emergency facilities for that group.
