QUARTERLY REPORT OF I Pat H. Spivey, Superintendent submitted his report for PAT H. SPIVEY, SUPERINTENDENT I the period ending September 30, 1972, which report was received and adopted by a voice vote of the court

and is in the following words and figures - to-wit:

HONORABLE JUDGE AND MEMBERS OF THE SULLIVAN COUNTY COURT IN SESSION OCTOBER 16, 1972 BLOUNTVILLE, TENNESSEE

Gentlemen:

We had a very successful summer school program for both high school and elementary students. Six elementary schools with an enrollment of 1,000 served as centers for students needing make-up-work and for remedial instruction. Transportation was provided from surrounding areas. Each center was staffedwith ten teachers and a principal. The maximum class size was twenty-five with an average of sixteen. The elementary program was presented with federal funds. Approximately 300 students attended the summer program at Central High School. This program was self-supporting.

During the summer months we also painted the six schools that were scheduled as well as painting certain sections of several other schools not originally planned.

Sullivan County Schools opened the 1972-73 shoool year with an enrollment of 18,655 students and a staff of 1,256 full-time employees. The total number of students included

4,473 high school students, 2,566 junior high students, 11,058 elementary students, 145 special education students, and 413 kindergarten students in the seventeen kindergarten classes. Our enrollment in grades one through twelve showed a slight decrease but the additional kindergarten classes kept the total enrollment approximately the same. Central High School had the largest increase with Kingsley Elementary showing the largest decrease.

It appears at this time that our federal source of revenue for maintenance funds will possibly be reduced which will necessitate replacement with local funds. The federal revenue comes from Public Law 874 which deals with impacted areas. Along with this possible decrease in funds, we are faced with higher prices. We are making a determined effort to hold the loss to a minimum by completely reorganizing the maintenance department for increased efficiency. Even with our efforts an amendment to our budget will probably be necessary sometime during the year.

Our Title I Program under P. L. 89-10 which provides federal funds to assist economically and educationally handicapped children in those schools having a high percentage of children from low income families has again been approved for the 1972-73 school year. This project was approved with no real problems. The project this year is being directed primarily toward remedial instruction in reading and for psychological services. Federal funds are being used to purchase special instructional materials in the area of reading and to provide psychological services, such as testing, to those students who qualify. Funds have again been allocated for a dental health program for these children.

In my report to you last year, I advised that we were paying htirty-three (33) teachers under the Title I program. In order to more nearly conform to the Federal Guidelines for this year's program, we have reduced this number of teachers to twenty (20), and it is possible that we may not be able to employ any regular classroom teachers with Title I funds. Therefore, it is possible that these teachers, who are above the minimum foundation program, will have to be paid for by local funds or the number of teaching positions be reduced. Please keep in mind that the twenty regular teachers on the Title I program will have to be included in the regular budget next year. This is required by the Federal Guidelines. In lieu of the thirteen (13) teachers no longer being paid with Title I funds, we have been able to hire a system-wide psychologist, two learning diagnosticians, a reading specialist, a media specialist, a social worker, and thirty-six instructional aides in twenty-four schools in order to provide the best psychological services for the children under the Title I program, and to abide by the Federal Guidelines for the program.

TO: Judge Lon V. Boyd and Members of the Sullivan County Court

The following is a brief report of the Extension Agent - Home Economics for the quarter ending September 30, 1972.

During July and August I had a senior HOme Economics student from the University of Tennessee in the county for observation and training in Extension Methods.

Because there was no 4-H Home Economics agent I helped with 4-H activities including a week of 4-H camp.

We held pressure canner clinics and tested the guages on canners for about 75 peop 14.

I attended a week of training on how to construct a casual coat, taught by a specialist from the University.

The Home Demonstration 72-73 handbook was prepared for the printers and distributed to all clubs.

Home Demonstration Club Committees met and planned several activities for the coming months, such as our Holiday Fair, fall membership meeting, leaders recognition banquet, etc.

The Home Demonstration Club - 4-H dress revue was held, sponsored by the Kingsport Chamber of Commerce. In addition to the fashion show a program was presented on sweing men's wear.

An all day meeting for H. D. C. members was held at the district training center. Women were shown new foods on the market, sewing techniques, electrical applicanes, and interesting crafts.

A progtam report was prepared on accomplishments toward long term goals.

Plans were begun for the "Festive Foods" program to be given with the Home Economist for the Kingsport Power Company. We have decided on themes, foods, decorations, etc., and began testing receipes.

Two newsletters, one on the drying of flowers, another on food costs, have been prepared and sent to about 900 area homemakers.

I received training from a university specialist on safe wiring for homes and care of small electrical applicances.

Aclass in clothing construction is under way at the Neighborhood Service Center in Kingsport.

Training meetings were held for craft and home management leaders. The topics were had made Christmas cards, weaving on cork, efficiency, and shopping skills. In addition, office duties, T. V. programs, radio programs, news columns, and club meetings were all a part of the quarters activities.

The following is a brief report of the Assistant Extension Agent - Home Economist for the quarter ending September 30, 1972.

Martha Childress, Home Economist working with 4-H Clubs in Sullivan County, began working on August 7, following a week of Inservice Training at the University of Tennessee at Knoxville, August 1-4.

I made six home visits assisting Junior High r-H'ers with demonstration, which were given August 18, at Jefferson City.

Junior High HOme Economist Judging teams competed at the Gray Fair on August 25, and I worked in training the twelve girls who participated on Clothing, Foods and Nutriction, and Home Improvement Teams. The clothing team won first place and Home Improvement and Crafts placed fifth.

The Junior 4-H Dress Revue was held in Kingsport nn August 24, at the Dobyns Bennett Little Theatre. Twenty eight 4-H girls participated at this event. The 4-H Agent narrated for the Home Deomonstration Club Dress Revue, and Pam Reeves, a Senior 4-H'er narrated the 4-H Dress Revue.

Following the County Dress Revue, home visits were made to those girls who were winners in their division. Four 4-H girls competed at District Const at the T. V. A. and I. Fair on September 15, . Lynn Fleenor was 3rd alternate winner in the Sew it with Cotton and Kathy Anderson placed 2nd in the school dress division. Regene Edwards and Angela Jones received blue awards.

Both 4-H agents met with 4-H Clubs at Bluff City Junior High and Centeral High for practice for the Public Meeting Constest held at the T. V. A. and I. Fair on September 15. The clubs received blue and red awards respectively.

Agents met with 4-H adult leaders in Blountville on September 19, Thirty adult leaders attended this meeting for purpose of discussing 4-H events and workshops to be held, such as Achievements Day, Leadership In Depth.

At the District 4-H Dress Revue on September 15, I assisted with judging of garments made by twenty girls who entered in the school dress division.

September 12, an adult leader and myself accompanied Senior Home-Production 4-H judging teams to U. T. for the district contest. The Foods and Nutition Team placed 4th and the Clothing Team 6th.

During September, personal contacts were made to principals by phone or school visit for the purpose of scheduling 4-H meetings, which began in October.

The following is a brief report of the Extension Agent for the quarter ending September 30, 1972.

Many calls came in regarding disease on tobacco this summer. Numerous visits were made to farms in checking these complaints. Most cases were caused by weather conditions and later the tobacco recovered and yields seemed to be normal.

Nine corn demonstrations were planted this year using a recommended variety and fertilizer according to Soil Test. Results look like an extra high yield and this will be checked later.

Assistance was given with teh 4-H Club Chick Chain Show and Sale in Kingsport, aponsored by the local Feed and Seed stores. The chicks graded higher than normal and sold for a good price.

The 4-H Soil Judging Contest was held in preparation for the district event to be held in October. Assistance was given at Junior High and Senior High District Demonstration Day where 4-H members could enter one of 40 different project areas.

Two days was spent assisting with a pressure cooker workshop at which time about 80 pressure guages were checked.

The Sullivan County Fair was held again this year. The quality and number of entries in flowers, fruit, and Horticulture was extra good. Livestock number and quality was about same as in the past.

Some assistance was given at Appalachian District Fair in judging of Horticulture products and with other 4-H events. Assistance was given in judging Horticulture entries at Greene County Fair and with Livestock and Dairy Shows at TVA & I Fair in Knoxville. The Rock Springs Fair and Horse Show was held at which time our office assisted in judging all Horticultural entries.

The directors of both Mountain Breeders and East Tennessee Feeder Calf Association met and made plans for fall sales to be held in October. Herds in Sullivan County were visited.

Lawn and shrub and home gardens takes much of our time at this season. Many visits were made to homeowners.

In connection with this a 3 day meeting of Tennessee Flower Growers Association as attended in Knoxville.

This is a brief report from the County Extension Agent for the quarter ending September 30, 1972.

We had more than usual calls to check tobacco patches this year. The main problems were Black Root Rot, Manganese Toxicity, caused by said soil conditions, and Weather Flack. The wet and cool weather favored Black Root Rot development and caused the condition called "Weather Fleck". We did find three fields that had Black Shank, which is the most destructive tobacco disease. It and also Black Root Rot can be controlled by proper rotation and the use of resistant varieties. The tobacco crop, county wide, is better than last year.

There was adequate seed corn available this year that has resistance to the Southern Corn Leaf Blight, so there was no trouble from this disease. The corn crop is good.

We have worked closely with the Hereford and Angus Feeder Calf Sale Association directors and consigners. 45 Sullivan County calf producers cold calves in these sales held October 2 and 9. A number of the producers have or will sell in the special steerand calf sales at area markets.

Calves have been weighed and graded in 7 herds that are participating in the Beef Cattle Improvement Program. Three breeders have entered 6 bulls in the State Bull Testing Station at the Middle Tennessee Experiement Station. One breeder has his bulls on feed test at his farm.

We assisted with the Sullivan County Fair, August 7-12. There were 115 entries in the dairy show and 65 in the beef show. Quality of the animals was real good. Garden and crop entries were outstanding in both quanity and quality. We feel the Sullivan County Fair is making progress and commend the Fair Association officers and directors.

A number of Sullivan County 4-H members and adults participated inthe Appalachian District

Fair at Gray, August 21-28. We helped with a number of the shows and other events, particularly those involving 4-H members. We helped with the judging at the Rock Springs Community Fair on September 9.

Soil testing has again been stressed this year. 1,033 soil samples were listed the first six months, and Sullivan County is fourth in the State. We hope to get a good number of Samples sent in this Fall.

I attended the Field Day at the Greenville Tobacco Experiement Station on July 27, along with a good group of armers from Sulliv an County.

We continue to get more calls from home owners concerning lawn, shrubbery, garden, and tree problems. It seem this has been a good year for insects and diseases. Japanese Beetles continue to gradually spread into new areas of the County. The heaviest infestations are in the eastern portion of the county.

I have met with two Home Demonstration Clubs this quarter to discuss lawns and garden porblems.

I have done a radio program weekly on a Bristol and a Kingsport station and a TV program every other week.

As usual, most of my time has been spent on farm and home visits, office and telephone calls, ranging from entire farm planning to specific questions on a wider variety of subjects and problems.

Governor Dunn has recinded the action to close these cases or decrease the grants that were due to the recent Social Security increase alone, in order to preserve the Medicaid benefits of the elderly, disabled and blind persons who are receiving assistance and Social Security benefits. This action will also enable other recipients to realize a cost of living adjustment in their welfare grants.

There is no clearance between the travel portion of the highway as it crosses said bridge, and the concrete railings on either side, which constitutes an additional traffic hazard. By reason of its / antiquated structure, its narrow width, and the proximity of the concrete railings to the traffic lanes, this bridge has been the scene of numerous accidents over the years, resulting in loss of life, limb, and property. Failure to remedy this situation immediately can only result in additional loss of life and property, and the Tennessee Department of Transportation must bear that responsibility if the situation is not corrected.

The following represents the major accomplishments of the Civil Defense Office during the third quarter of calendar year 1972.

Twenty-four persons were trained in Kingsport as radiological monitors. Included in the class were representatives of the Kingsport Fire Department, Holston Valley Community Hospital, the American Red Cross, the Kingsport Amateur Radio Club and the Kingsport Composit Squadron Civil Air Patrol.

A review was made of the county Welfare Emergency Plan.

Efforts continued, including a trip to Fort Knox, Kentucky, toward procuring government excess property vehicles and a helicopter.

Assistance in surveying and coordinating recovery after the Millye Street flood was made through the Office of Emergency Preparedness, State Office of Civil Defense, City of Kingsport, Department of Public Welfare, and state senators and representatives who expressed interest in assisting flood victims.

The emergency generator located at the Civic Auditorium was checked and cleaned after being underwater during the August 2 flood and steps have been taken by the City of Kingsport to install a sump pump in the basement area where the unit is stored. No Additional water damage occurred in the Emergency Operations Center area of the Auditorium, a problem in past years.

Approximately 25 secondary social studies teachers were given instructions in teaching a course in Personal and Family Survival by this office and a representative of the State Commissioner of Education during In-Service training at Central High School.

The Virginia State Civil Defense Association meeting in Bristol was attended.

A proposal to include Sullivan County as a recipient of On-Site Assistance; a federally sponsored Civil Defense training program, was approved by the county judge and the mayors of Bristol and Kingsport. This program develops emergency plans at the local level with panel interviews as opposed to emergency preparedness programs initiated from upper levels of government which have been too generalized.

A meeting was held with Squire Roe Jaynes concerning a pending emergency preparedness resolution for County Court.

This bridge was constructed some 50 years ago and is totally inadequate for today's traffic. It is extremely narrow, and, as a matter of fact, is narrower than the highway on either side of said bridge, thus consituting an extremely dangerous traffic hazard. There is no clearance between the travel portion of the highway as it crosses said bridge, and the concrete railings on either side, which constitutes an additional traffic hazard. By reason of its / antiquated structure, its narrow width, and the proximity of the concrete railings to the traffic lanes, this bridge has been the scene of numerous accidents over the years, resulting in loss of life, limb, and property. Failure to remedy this situation immediately can only result in additional loss of life and property, and the Tennessee Department of Transportation must bear that responsibility if the situation is not corrected.

The maximum obligation of the United States as set forth in Paragraph 1(Page 2) is revised to read, "\$163,900 from funds appropriated under the Airport and Airway Development Act and \$98,340 from funds appropriated under Section 214, Appalachian Regional Development Act and \$98,340 from funds appropriated under Section 214, Appalachian Regional Development Act of 1965, as amended."

It is understood and agreed that all of the other terms and conditions of the Grant Agreement remain in full force and effect and are not changed except as hereinabove provided.
