

Honorable Judge and Members of the Sullivan County Court

Ladies and Gentlemen:

Sullivan County Schools opened the 1976-77 school year with an enrollment of 19,293. This is an increase over last year. Sullivan County is one of the largest school systems in the state, and the largest in the area. The Sullivan County Board of Education has employed 1,568 personnel this year. This includes 974 professional personnel and 594 paraprofessionals.

All teachers attended a preschool workshop at Central High School on August 23 and 24. The first session of the workshop was also attended by the Bristol teachers. All new teachers attended an orientation session at Central High on August 20.

The 1976-77 school year marks the beginning of a new organizational structure for schools in Sullivan County. In the new organizational structure the elementary school includes grades K-5, middle school grades 6-8, and high school grades 9-12. The completion of the vocational wing at East High School made it possible to start this type of organization for the Eastern portion of the county this year. This type of organizational plan should prevail throughout the county on the completion of the new high schools.

The three schools becoming middle schools this year are Holston Valley, Mary Hughes, and Bluff City. The middle school concept will better serve the needs of students in this age group. The State of Tennessee requires the teaching of the basics: language arts, social studies, science, mathematics, physical education, and other subjects. In addition to teaching the basics in the middle schools, a concentrated effort is being made to offer as many additional exploratory courses as possible. Some of these courses are: shop, home living, Spanish, and first aid. These exploratory courses are offered generally on a nine-week basis and are multipurpose. The purpose is to expose the middle school student to as many learning experiences in school as possible to enable him to better decide his choices in the comprehensive high school program.

The vocational-technical wing at Sullivan East High School opened for instruction September 14, 1976. The construction of the vocational-technical addition at Central High School is now under way and should be completed for use by the 1977-78 school year.

Approximately three hundred fifty students are now receiving instruction in thirteen programs: air conditioning and refrigeration, auto industries, small engine repair, cosmetology, electronics, radio and television, general building trades, general metal trades, distributive education, health occupations, occupational home economics, ornamental horticulture, and vocational office education. Vocational-technical education is providing a broader-based instructional program at Sullivan East and is being well received by the students.

The renovation project is well under way at both Bluff City Elementary School and Bluff City Middle School. The new construction which is needed in the Blountville renovation project has been approved by the Board of Education and will soon be ready for bids. The schematic drawings for the two new high schools were presented to the Board of Education at their September meeting.

This year for the first time all schools have a certified librarian to develop library service.

Our Title I project under Public Law 93-380 allocates funds to assist educationally deprived children. At the present time, the following services are provided under this program: sixty-three teacher aides, dental care for children from indigent families, consumable materials for the math and reading programs, the operation of a central resource center, two social workers, five reading resource teachers, and summer school for grades one through eight.

Six schools served as the centers for a very successful elementary summer school with an enrollment of 1200 students. Remedial instruction in reading, mathematics, social studies, and science was provided for students in grades one through eight.

A different concept in the school food service program for high schools has taken place through new federal regulations; the concept is referred to as "offer but not serve." Sullivan County high schools have been providing a la carte selection for several years so the main problem in the provision was to properly account for meals. The "offer but not serve" concept simply stated is to provide a selection of the five food items of meat, vegetables/fruits, bread, butter and milk, without restricting the choice to the student. This program will result in greater commodity distribution and reimbursement to the county.

Another activity of the food service department is participation in the promotion of the National School Food Service Week. A carnival program for both the Johnson City and Kingsport Malls was planned to inform the general public of the services of the National School Lunch Program.


Two major factors were considered before the recommendation to change the meal price to students and teachers. Student assistance can no longer be used in the lunch programs of many of the schools so several part-time positions have been added resulting in an increase in labor cost above the nine percent annual increase in salaries. Also, the projected eleven percent increase in food costs was also considered before the meal cost was increased. At this time the participation figures for September have not been completed.

Our summer painting program included the painting of the following schools: East High, Miller Perry, Holston, Valley Pike, Indian Springs, Chinquapin, East Cherokee, and Mary Hughes. Many other projects were completed during the summer months such as guttering, boiler repair, marking of parking lots, etc.

There are 109 buses transporting students this year. This is an increase of 5 buses from last year. These buses transport over 12,000 students per day and travel in excess of 5,000 miles. We have added two vans for special education students. The new routes helped to relieve the crowded conditions in many areas. There is still a need for several new routes to comply with Highway Safety Program Standard No. 17. One additional route will be bid in the very near future.

We appreciate your interest and support of the educational system for the students of Sullivan County.

AGRICULTURAL WORK AREA

This quarter has been one with a wide variety of extension educational activities and opportunities.

In July, a large number of tobacco producers became concerned when their plants started to turn yellow and the leaves started to grow in distorted shapes. Plant samples were taken and analyzed by The University of Tennessee Plant Pathology Department to determine the cause of the problem. On examination, the disease was found to be caused by two or three different viruses spread by aphids and flea beetles. Also, Gilbert Rhodes, Tobacco Specialist from the Plant and Soil Science Department at the Institute of Agriculture, spent one day in Sullivan County visiting different farms to get a better understanding of the situation and what recommendations to follow if the conditions start showing up next year.

On July 30, the first pesticide applicators training session was held at Knoxville to allow Extension and Research personnel to be certified to teach and certify private applicators in accordance to state laws for restricted pesticide uses.

In July a pasture renovation demonstration was planned and carried out at the Scott Stickley farm in cooperation with the Sullivan County Soil Conservation District to show how legumes, grasses, and small grain crops can be over seeded in pastures and hay fields. Seventy-five individuals watched the mechanical seeders in operation and viewed the plots seeded earlier to show how effective the seeders are in fields without preparing a seed bed.

In August, three individuals requested assistance in planning and laying out swine farrowing facilities for 100 sow herds when in full operation. One farmer received assistance in selecting the site and planning a finishing floor for 300 market hogs with provisions to build farrowing facilities to produce his own feeder pigs as soon as practical.

Calves from two beef cattle herds enrolled in the Tennessee Beef Cattle Improvement program were weighed and graded in August to get the necessary information to complete records for evaluating bulls and cows within the herd. The computer records serve as a valuable tool to the producer in selecting herd replacements.

In addition to routine extension work during the past quarter, considerable time was spent by agents working with 4-H members and adults in fair activities, livestock shows and sales, training judging teams, and selecting project animals.

HOME ECONOMICS WORK AREA

The home demonstration club members have made historic quilt squares and other hand made articles to exhibit throughout the county as a part of the bicentennial celebration. Thus far they've been exhibited in store windows, libraries, and other exhibit areas.

Several programs on food preservation were given to women's groups throughout the freezing and canning season. We also tested pressure canner gauges.

Requests for programs on ways to save money and still have nutritious meals were filled.

More . . .

September begins a busy club year, bringing on the necessity of training meetings and preparation for club programs. We've had a trouser making workshop, held training meetings for the reading project leaders, and have begun an intensive campaign to get club members to make household inventories and make a written record of the storage place of important family papers. We also had a 3 day workshop on the restoration of old trunks. There are many old trunks in area basements and attics and people are interested in putting them in useable condition.

Programs are being offered in using the metric system, and there is some interest as well as concern here.

Plans are underway for a number of pre-holiday programs.

In addition the usual meetings, telephone requests, radio programs and news columns were taken care of.

4-H AND OTHER YOUTH WORK AREA

4-H activities conducted during the quarter between July and October include the 4-H Dress Revue which was presented at the Ft. Henry Mall with 30 girls participating. The three winners in Junior High division and Sr. sew with cotton competed at the TVA & I Fair on September 17. A 4-H sewing workshop was conducted prior to the dress revue. District Jr. and Sr. Demonstration Contests were held at Greeneville in July. Sullivan County had 35 participants and of this number twenty-four were first place winners in project competition. The eleven senior winners competed at State 4-H Club Round-Up held August 2 - 6 at U.T. Knoxville.

Forty-six girls attended 4-H camp in July. The Sullivan County 4-H Honor Club hosted a 4-H Exchange with Traill County North Dakota, July 19-23. Thirty-one 4-H'ers and two adults visited in the homes of 4-H families and participated on tours of Tennessee Eastman Corporation, Bay's Mountain, farms and special outings.

Thirty Junior High 4-H'ers competed in Agricultural and Home Economics judging events at the Appalachian Fair in August.

The Poultry team took first place honors, and the Home Improvement and crops teams placed fifth in competition.

Two senior 4-H'ers and 4-H Extension Agent attended the National 4-H Citizenship Shortcourse in Washington, August 7 - 14. The Bristol Chamber of Commerce sponsored \$100.00 scholarships to the 4-H'ers attending.

The Kingsport Chamber of Commerce sponsored the annual 4-H Poultry Show and Sale in which approximately fifteen 4-H'ers participated. Two junior high 4-H'ers entered the 4-H Chicken Barbecue contest at the Appalachian Fair.

Plans were completed for the 46th Annual 4-H Achievement Day to be held on October 15 in Bristol. A 4-H leader organizational meeting was held on September 7. The 4-H meeting schedule, and calendar of events was proposed with a discussion and explanation of 4-H participation objectives.

A 4-H exhibit was presented at the Ft. Henry Mall in conjunction with the Volunteer Kingsport Fair. 4-H radio spot announcements were taped at three local radio stations for 4-H promotion during National 4-H Club Week, October 3 - 9.

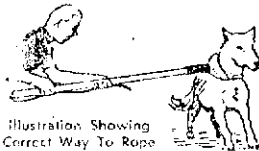


Illustration Showing

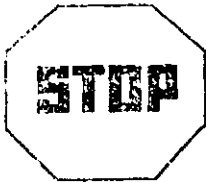

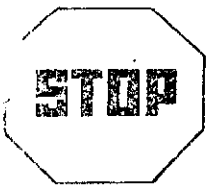

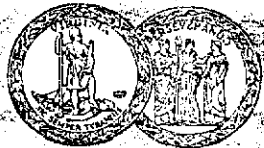

FROM: The United States of America (acting through the Federal Aviation Administration, herein referred to as the "FAA")

WHEREAS, the Sponsor has submitted to the FAA a Project Application dated September 7, 1976, for a grant of Federal funds for a project for development of the Airport (herein called the "Airport"), together with plans and specifications for such project, which Project Application, as approved by the FAA is hereby incorporated herein and made a part hereof; and

WHEREAS, the FAA has approved a project for development of the Airport (herein called the "Project") consisting of the following-described airport development:

Acquire land (property interest satisfactory to the Administrator in Tracts 36, 37A, 42, 43, 44A, 45A, 45B, 45C, 45D, 46 and 48A, as shown on Exhibit "A") for clear zone and airport development; relocate security fence (380+ l.f.) and one electronic gate, and install one electronic gate; six (6) proximity suits and CFR auxiliary equipment; install electrical grounding for perimeter fence; expand aircraft parking apron (16,000+ s.y.).

all as more particularly described in the property map and plans and specifications incorporated in the said Project Application;

*Where the term "Sponsor" appears, same shall mean "Co-Sponsors."

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to and for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the Airport and Airway Development Act of 1970, as amended (44 U.S.C. 1701), and in consideration of (a) the Sponsor's adoption and ratification of the representations and warranties contained in said Project Application, and its acceptance of this Offer as hereinafter provided, and (b) the benefits to accrue to the United States and the public from the accomplishment of the Project and the operation and maintenance of the Airport as herein provided, THE FEDERAL AVIATION ADMINISTRATION, FOR AND ON BEHALF OF THE UNITED STATES HEREBY OFFERS AND AGREES to pay, as the United States share of the allowable costs incurred in accomplishing the Project, ninety (90%) percent from funds appropriated under the Airport and Airway Development Act, as amended.

This Offer is made on and subject to the following terms and conditions:

1. The maximum obligation of the United States payable under this Offer shall be \$ 777,210
2. The Sponsor shall:
 - (a) begin accomplishment of the Project within ninety (90) days after acceptance of this Offer or such longer time as may be prescribed by the FAA, with failure to do so constituting just cause for termination of the obligations of the United States hereunder by the FAA.
 - (b) carry out and complete the Project without undue delay and in accordance with the terms hereof, the Airport and Airway Development Act of 1970, and Sections 152.51-152.63 of the Regulations of the Federal Aviation Administration (14 CFR 152) in effect as of the date of acceptance of this Offer; which Regulations are hereinafter referred to as the "Regulations";
 - (c) carry out and complete the Project in accordance with the plans and specifications and property map, incorporated herein, as they may be revised or modified with the approval of the FAA.
3. The allowable costs of the project shall not include any costs determined by the FAA to be ineligible for consideration as to allowability under Section 152.47 (b) of the Regulations.
4. Payment of the United States share of the allowable project costs will be made pursuant to and in accordance with the provisions of Sections 152.65 - 152.71 of the Regulations. Final determination as to the allowability of the costs of the project will be made at the time of the final grant payment pursuant to Section 152.71 of the Regulations; Provided, that, in the event a semi-final grant payment is made pursuant to Section 152.71 of the Regulations, final determination as to the allowability of those costs to which such semi-final payment relates will be made at the time of such semi-final payment.

5. The sponsor shall operate and maintain the Airport as Provided in the Project Application incorporated herein and specifically covenants and agrees, in accordance with its Assurance 20 in Part V of said Application For Federal Assistance (For Construction Programs), that in its operation and the operation of all facilities thereof, neither it nor any person or organization occupying space or facilities thereon will discriminate against any person or class of persons by reason of race, color, creed or national origin in the use of any of the facilities provided for the public on the airport.
6. The FAA reserves the right to amend or withdraw this Offer at any time prior to its acceptance by the Sponsor.
7. This Offer shall expire and the United States shall not be obligated to pay any part of the costs of the Project unless this Offer has been accepted by the Sponsor on or before September 30, 1976, or such subsequent date as may be prescribed in writing by the FAA.
8. The Sponsor hereby agrees that it will incorporate or cause to be incorporated into any contract for construction work, or modification thereof, as defined in the regulations of the Secretary of Labor at 41 CFR Chapter 60, which is paid for in whole or in part with funds obtained from the Federal Government or borrowed on the credit of the Federal Government pursuant to a grant, contract, loan, insurance, or guarantee, or undertaken pursuant to any federal program involving such grant, contract, loan, insurance, or guarantee, the following Equal Opportunity clause.

During the performance of this contract, the contractor agrees as follows:

- (1) The Contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex or national origin. The contractor will take affirmative action to ensure that applicants are employed, and that employees are treated during employment without regard to their race, color, sex or national origin. Such action shall include, but not be limited to the following: Employment, upgrading, demotion, or transfer; recruitment or recruitment advertising; layoff or termination, rates of pay or other forms of compensation; and selection for training, including apprenticeship. The contractor agrees to post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices to be provided setting forth the provisions of this non-discrimination clause.
- (2) The contractor will, in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the contractor, state that all qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, color, religion, sex or national origin.
- (3) The contractor will send to each labor union or representative of workers with which he has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding, a notice to be provided advising the said labor union or workers' representatives of the contractor's commitments under this section, and shall post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment.

- (4) The contractor will comply with all provisions of Executive Order 11246 of 24 September 1965 and the rules, regulations, and relevant orders of the Secretary of Labor.
- (5) The contractor will furnish all information and reports required by Executive Order 11246 of 24 September 1965, and its rules, regulations, and orders of the Secretary of Labor, or pursuant thereto, and will permit access to his books, records, and accounts by the administering agency and the Secretary of Labor for purposes of investigation to ascertain compliance with such rules, regulations, and orders.
- (6) In the event of the contractor's noncompliance with the non-discrimination clauses of this contract or with any of the said rules, regulations or orders, this contract may be cancelled, terminated or suspended in whole or in part and the contractor may be declared ineligible for further government contracts or federally assisted construction contracts in accordance with procedures authorized in Executive Order 11246 of 24 September 1965, and such other sanctions may be imposed and remedies invoked as provided in Executive Order 11246 of 24 September 1965, or by rule, regulation or order of the Secretary of Labor, or as otherwise provided by law.
- (7) The contractor will include the portion of the sentence immediately preceding paragraph (1) and the provisions of paragraphs (1) through (7) in every subcontract or purchase order unless exempted by rules, regulations or orders of the Secretary of Labor issued pursuant to Section 204 of Executive Order 11246 of 24 September 1965, so that such provisions will be binding upon each subcontractor or vendor. The contractor will take such action with respect to any subcontract or purchase order as the administering agency may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions, including sanctions for noncompliance: Provided, however, that in the event a contractor becomes involved in, or is threatened with litigation with a subcontractor or vendor as a result of such direction by the administering agency, the contractor may request the United States to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the United States.

The Sponsor further agrees that it will be bound by the above equal opportunity clause with respect to its own employment practices when it participates in federally assisted construction work: Provided, that if the applicant so participating is a State or local government, the above equal opportunity clause is not applicable to any agency, instrumentality or subdivision of such government which does not participate in work on or under the contract.

The Sponsor agrees that it will assist and cooperate actively with the administering agency and the Secretary of Labor in obtaining the compliance of contractors and subcontractors with the equal opportunity clause and the rules, regulations, and relevant orders of the Secretary of Labor that it will furnish the administering agency with the Secretary of Labor such information as they may require

for the implementation of such compliance, and that it will otherwise assist the administering agency in the discharge of the agency's primary responsibility for compliance with the law.

The Sponsor further agrees that it will refrain from entering into any contract or modification subject to Executive Order 11246 of 1964 entered into with a contractor debarred from, or who has not completed debarment contracts pursuant to the Executive Order and will cooperate with any sanctions and penalties for violation of the equal opportunity clause as may be imposed upon contractors and subcontractors by the administering agency or the Secretary of Labor pursuant to Part III, Subpart F of the Executive Order. In addition, the Sponsor agrees that if it fails or refuses to comply with these undertakings, the administering agency may take any or all of the following actions: cancel, terminate or suspend in whole or in part this grant (contract, loan, insurance, guarantee); refrain from extending any further assistance to the Sponsor under the program with respect to which the failure or refund occurred until satisfactory assurance of future compliance has been received from the Sponsor; or refer the case to the Department of Justice for appropriate legal proceedings.

9. The Sponsor's financial records of the project, established, maintained, and made available to personnel of the FAA in conformity to Section 152.63 of the Regulations of the Federal Aviation Administration (14 CFR 152) will also be available to representatives of the Comptroller General of the United States.
10. It is understood and agreed that the term "Project Application" wherever it appears in this agreement or other documents constituting a part of this agreement shall be deemed to mean "Application For Federal Assistance (For Construction Programs)."
11. The Sponsor will send a copy of all Invitations for Bids, advertised or negotiated, for concessions or other businesses at the airport to the appropriate Office of Minority Business Enterprise (OMBE) representative as identified by the FAA Regional Civil Rights Office. The Sponsor will disclose and make information about the contracts, contracting procedures and requirements available to the designated OMBE representative and minority firms on the same basis that such information is disclosed and made available to other organizations or firms. Responses by minority firms to Invitations for Bids shall be treated in the same manner as all other responses to the Invitations for Bids.

Compliance with the preceding paragraph will be deemed to constitute compliance by the Sponsor with requirements of 49 CFR 21 Appendix C(a)(1)(x), Regulations of the Office of the Secretary of Transportation.

12. It is understood and agreed that no part of the federal share of an airport development project for which a grant is made under the Airport and Airway Development Act of 1970, as amended (49 U.S.C. 1701 et seq.), or under the Federal Airport Act, as amended (49 U.S.C. 1101 et seq.), shall be included in the rate base in establishing fees, rates, and charges for users of the airport.
13. This project and all work performed thereunder is subject to the Clean Air Act and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act. Accordingly,
 - (1) The Sponsor hereby stipulates that any facility to be utilized in performance under the grant or to benefit from the grant is not listed on the EPA List of Violating Facilities.
 - (2) The Sponsor agrees to comply with all the requirements of Section 114 of the Clean Air Act and Section 308 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act and all regulations issued thereunder.
 - (3) The Sponsor shall notify the FAA of the receipt of any communication from the EPA indicating that a facility to be utilized for performance of or benefit from the grant is under consideration to be listed on the EPA List of Violating Facilities.
 - (4) The Sponsor agrees that it will include, or cause to be included, in any contract or subcontract under the grant which exceeds \$100,000 the criteria and requirements in these subparagraphs.
14. Assurance Number 18 of Part V of the Project Application incorporated herein is amended by including at the end of the second sentence the following language:

"including the requirement that each air carrier, authorized to engage directly in air transportation pursuant to Section 401 or 402 of the Federal Aviation Act of 1958, using the Airport shall be subject to nondiscriminatory and substantially comparable rates, fees, rentals, and other charges and nondiscriminatory conditions as are applicable to all such air carriers which make similar use of the Airport and which utilize similar facilities, subject to reasonable classifications such as tenants or nontenants, and combined passenger and cargo flights or all cargo flights, and such classification or status as tenant shall not be unreasonably withheld by any sponsor provided an air carrier assumes obligations substantially similar to those already imposed on tenant air carriers. This provision shall not require the reformation of any lease or other contract entered into by the Sponsor before July 12, 1976."
15. It is mutually understood and agreed that the "Relocation and Real Property Acquisition Assurances implementing the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970" dated the 3rd day of February, 1975, is incorporated herein by reference and made a part hereof as if set out in full.

16. It is understood and agreed that the Sponsor will not permit the erection or creation of any structures on land acquired in this project other than those required to accommodate aids to air navigation and/or those specifically approved by the FAA.

The Sponsor's acceptance of this Offer and ratification and adoption of the Project Application incorporated herein shall be evidenced by execution of this instrument by the Sponsor, as hereinafter provided, and said Offer and Acceptance shall comprise a Grant Agreement, as provided in the Airport and Airway Development Act of 1970, constituting the obligations and rights of the United States and the Sponsor with respect to the accomplishment of the Project and the operation and maintenance of the Airport. Such Grant Agreement shall become effective upon the Sponsor's acceptance of this Offer and shall remain in full force and effect throughout the useful life of the facilities developed under the Project but in any event not to exceed twenty years from the date of said acceptance.
