Ladies and Gentlemen:

Sullivan County Schools opened the 1977-78 school year with an enrollment of 19,633 students. This represents an increase of 340 students. Sullivan County is one of the few systems that school enrollment is on the increase. Sullivan County is one of the largest systems in the state and the largest in the area. Since money from the state is based on average daily attendance, our staff makes every effort to encourage students to attend school each day they are able. The average daily attendance for the first month was 19,031. This represented an increase of 365 days over last year's first month. The Board of Education employs 1,683 personnel which includes 1002 professional personnel and 681 paraprofessional.

All teachers attended a pre-school workshop at Central High School on August 22, 1977. Marilyn Van Derbur was the inspirational speaker. Her topic was "Turning On The Turned Off--How to Motivate Students and Teachers." This session was also attended by the Bristol teachers.

The renovation projects at both Bluff City Elementary School and Bluff City Middle School are practically completed. The final inspection will be scheduled within the next few weeks. The students and teachers are really enjoying these new facilities and I think it is something all of us can be proud of. The new construction part of Blountville Elem. and Blountville Junior High is nearing completion. This includes two kindergarten classrooms, a cafeteria and a multi-purpose facility.

Bids were opened for Holston Elementary-Middle School on September 29 with bids being in excess of budgeted funds for this project. The Sullivan County Board of Education, in session October 6, 1977, agreed to request 2.5 million from County Court which would enable construction of this building to proceed as planned.

Plans are nearing completion for the two new high schools and for Colonial Heights-Rock Springs and Central Heights-Indian Springs Elementary Schools. These should be advertised in the very near future.

The vocational wing at Central High School should be completed sometime in November. There are 1,872 students enrolled in 36 comprehensive vocational technical programs in Sullivan County School System this year. This includes 789 at East, 591 at Central and 492 at Lynn View, Ketrion, Sullivan West and Blountville Junior High. The student response to these programs has been good. Plans are well under way for vocational programs for Sullivan North and Sullivan South.

The last phase of centralization of food service activities in Sullivan County Schools has taken place this school year. Purchasing of foods and supplies through a bid procedure began in September; this is a step that was recommended by the State Department of Education as well as the United States Department of Agriculture. It is too early to evaluate the results of the purchasing program in terms of dollars savings, but there should be a noticeable savings. A purchasing committee set by the Board of Education has reviewed specifications and bids and has firmly approved the selection of foods and goods.

The food service for the sites serving the Central Heights School is being provided from the Akard Elementary cafeteria. There has been no break in the service and the same meal is served there that is served in the other elementary cafeterias. A van and special equipment was purchased during the summer to safely transport the food.

The first month's average student participation in the full meal service for the county is over thirteen thousand. High schools with a full selection of entrees, vegetables, salads and desserts, are serving almost the entire student body. The cost of the meal to the students and the faculty was not increased over the preceeding year so there was little difference in participation from last year. As continued efforts to plan menus that fill the taste expectations as well as nutrition needs of youngsters are made, perhaps more students will take advantage of the food service in schools.

Our Title I project under Public Law 93-380 allocates funds to assist educationally deprived children. During this school year, the following services will be provided in this project: teacher aides have increased from sixty-three to sixty-eight, dental care for children from indigent families, consumable materials for the math and reading programs, the operation of a central resource center, two social workers, five reading resource teachers, and summer school for grades one through eight. Six schools served as centers for an excellent elementary summer school program with an enrollment of 900 students. Remedial instruction in reading, mathematics, social studies and science was provided for students in grades one through eight.

During this school year under a cooperative program administered by Mr. Eddie Williams, a CETA project was funded to provide twenty-nine clerical aides for the elementary schools. Two teacher-aide positions to assist in the special class for the visually impaired at Long Island School were also funded by the CETA Program.

There are 117 buses transporting students in Sullivan County this year. This is an increase of 6 buses over last year. These buses transport over 12,000 students per day and travel in excess of 5,000 miles. We have on order four new vans for special education students. There is still a need for several new routes to comply with Highway Safety Program Standard No. 17. One additional route will be bid October 24.

We appreciate your interest and support of the educational system for the students of Sullivan County.

AGRICULTURAL WORK AREA

During the past quarter a special effort has been made to visit corn growers to better understand the problems they are having with insects, diseases, and weeds in trying to produce corn for silage and/or for grain. The late planted corn (June 15 and after) was heavily damaged in most parts of the county by corn borers, fall army worms and corn ear worms. Insecticides used for control on these pests were relatively ineffective since the moths lay eggs inside the whorl on the corn plants making it difficult to get the insecticide in contact with the insects.

In September, two corn weed control demonstrations were evaluated where Eradicane was used on land heavily infested with Johnsongrass which was planted to corn in the spring. Both plots showed from 80 to 90 per cent of the Johnsongrass being controlled with good corn yields.

During the past three months, three dairy farmers have requested and received assistance from the Extension Engineering Specialist in Knoxville in locating and drawing plans for new free stall housing and feeding facilities.

Sullivan County Livestock Association members, beef and dairy cattle producers and 4-H Livestock Project members held Sullivan County's first Field Day in conjunction with a pasture tour. Over 100 persons attended the event which highlighted the demonstration work done on pasture renovation and the judging contest which covered beef cattle, forage, meats, and hogs. In addition, emphasis was placed on implanting, worming, vaccination and grub control.

Sullivan County livestock producers participated in the University of Tennessee Special Feeder Calf Sale (for club calves). The Tennessee Department of Agriculture and the University of Tennessee Department of Animal Science selected 15 quality club calves from Sullivan County. The calves averaged \$51.00/cwt.

Feeder pig production continues to grow in Sullivan County. More producers than ever are selling feeder pigs in the organized feeder pig sale. Feeder pigs from Sullivan County are selling in Cookeville and Sevierville, Tenn., and at the Virginia Department of Agriculture Feeder Pig Sale in Glade Spring, Virginia.

Special emphasis was placed on Sullivan County Beef Producers during the quarter. A random survey was conducted from all county producers to determine the needs of beef cattle producers and forage production practices.

Considerable time has been used this quarter visiting individuals requesting information on how to identify and control sod web worms on their lawns as well as the Japanese Beetle grubs that have been doing heavy damage to lawns this fall.

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4-H AND OTHER YOUTH WORK AREA

During the quarter of July, August and September, time was spent in training thirteen 4-H judging teams to compete in district competition at the Gray and Knoxville TVA&I Fair. Sullivan County had two district Jr. High and Senior winning teams and the Senior team will compete in State competition October 1.

A 4-H clothing workshop was held one week in July and it was followed by the County 4-H dress revue in August. Forty-three girls entered the county dress revue and both county winners were district winners in their division at TVA&I Fair in Knoxville. Sponsorship was secured from Parks Belk Company and First Federal of Erwin in Blountville.

The 4-H Honor Club held regular meetings during the quarter, and planned a 4-H exhibit for the Gray Station Fair in which they won the second place award.

Ten 4-H Senior members competed in state project competition at state 4-H Round-Up in Knoxville, August 1 - 5. Five of these 4-H club members were named state winners in their projects and have received expense-paid trips to attend National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, November 27 - December 1.

During September, time was devoted to rescheduling 4-H clubs within the county and city schools. Principals and leaders were contacted or visited. New 4-H clubs will be organized at Gateway Christian School, Lynn Garden, Lynn View, Andrew Jackson and Andrew Johnson Schools. A county-wide 4-H leaders meeting was held on September 20.

Special news stories about 4-H were written for a 4-H Tabloid which will be published in the Bristol Herald Courier October 2 in observance of National 4-H Club Week.

During July a three-day Arts and Crafts Workshop was held in both Bristol and Kingsport. Other special project workshops held throughout the quarter were: Health, Home Improvement, Wildlife, Woodworking, and Photography.

Five 4-H'ers showed lambs at the District Lamb Show in Clinton and the State Junior Livestock Exposition in Nashville.

In the Swine Project there were eleven market hogs shown in the County and the Knoxville Market Hog Show. There were seven 4-H members showing these hogs in these shows.

The poultry project had seven members showing 60 pullets in the County Show and Sale at Allandale Farm. This represents 300 chickens in the total project that were raised by the 4-H members. They were all blue ribbon group chickens, which shows their good quality.

In the horse project we had two 4-H members show two horses in the TVA&I Fair's 4-H Horse Show. All in all, the 4-H members in animal science projects were winners and this was recognized in the newspapers, magazines, and radio programs.

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4-H AND YOUTH WORK AREA, CONT.

The 4-H members in agricultural projects were very active in the last quarter.

In the dairy project we had participants in shows in July, August and September as follows: the black and white shows at Gray Station and Nashville, the Appalachian Fair and TVA&I Fair in Knoxville. There were thirteen 4-H members showing 41 different animals representing the Jersey, Guernsey, and Holstein Breeds of dairy cattle.

In the beef project we had participation in the following shows: the District Junior Beef Heifer Show in Newport, the State Livestock Exposition in Nashville, the Appalachian Fair, the Tennessee and North Carolina Fair in Newport, and the TVA&I Fair in Knoxville. There were eleven 4-H members showing beef heifers in these shows. The breeds of cattle shown were Angus, Hereford, and Polled Hereford.

Six lambs were shown by members in the Sheep Project in July.

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HOME ECONOMICS WORK AREA

The Home Demonstration Club Handbook for the coming year was prepared and distributed to each member.

Most of the work in July and August revolved around canning and freezing of fruits and vegetables. We were in the Malls to check pressure canning equipment and answer questions.

A district seminar was held at which those attending had the opportunity to learn more about energy conservation, heart disease, nutrition, plant care, and blood pressure.

We also had an exhibit in the Bristol Mall in cooperation with TVA to show homeowners how to insulate for efficient use of energy, and other ideas for conserving energy around the home.

HDC officers and Reading Chairmen received training for carrying out their duties during the club year.

The usual routine of club meetings, programs, newspaper columns, radio programs, etc. was carried out in addition to three weeks annual leave.

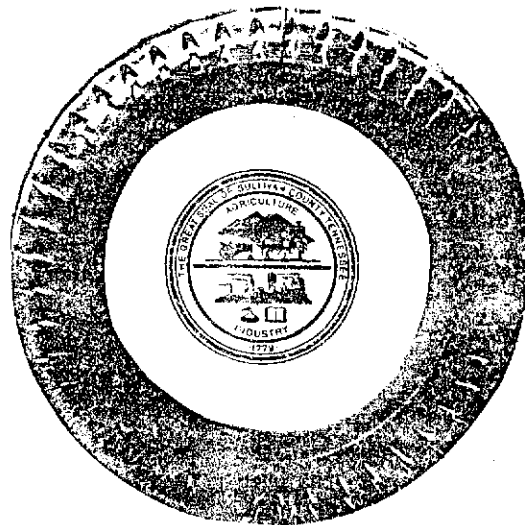

## TIRE REPAIR CENTER

All county tires are currently being repaired at our Tire Repair Center, with the exception of the mowing machine tractor tires which require fluid inside. All new tires are being mounted on rims at the Tire Repair Center for each department, with the exception of the large Ambulance Service vehicles and a few emergency repairs for the Sheriff's Department that occur during a holiday or on a weekend.

On August 5, 1977, a total of 176 non-recappable tire carcasses and approximately 800 lbs. of old inner tubes and liners plus 15 broken tire rims were loaded and hauled to the Kingsport Landfill to be destroyed. We express sincere appreciation to the Sullivan County Landfill for providing transportation in order that the old tires and rubber could be removed from the tire lot and disposed of in the proper manner.



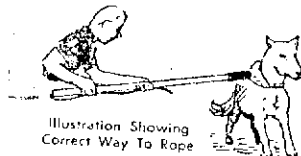

### REVIEW OF OPERATIONS

I have the privilege of reporting on the 30th year of operation of the Sullivan County Public Library and to thank the Library Board of Trustees, county officials and taxpayers for their support during the fiscal year, 1976 - 1977.

In contrast to the constant transition of the past five years of operation, this has been a quietly progressive year. Growth through those years was punctuated with relocations and establishment of branch libraries. Headquarters of the library at Blountville was moved in 1972, Bluff City Library relocated from Avoca in 1973, 1974-1975 saw the Sullivan Gardens branch established and the Colonial Heights Library received new quarters in 1976.

These changes required tremendous energy and cooperation of staff members, regional employees, and county workers to assure minimum interruption of library services. The moves were accomplished with minimal budgeted funding, relying on the dedication of community, sponsoring groups, library staff and volunteers.

### REGISTRATIONS

Since satisfied patrons are our most important product and our best publicity, we are happy to report that registrations have nearly doubled since 1973.

A project to update all registrations at the Blountville library was completed this year. As a result, 1,500 out of date cards were eliminated and all remaining registrations validated. The same procedure was followed at Colonial Heights Library in 1974, Bluff City and Moody Memorial Libraries have relatively new files since their establishment. Bloomingdale registrations will be checked during the coming year. A total of 15,725 county residents now use the five libraries.

### BOOKSTOCK

With the addition of 2,662 books, processed this year, our total bookstock now stands at 38,129. Regional volumes at the five libraries number 23,867. Paperbacks, uncataloged, have grown to 8,625. Combined total of all books available to patrons is 70,621.

Through an inter-county request system, the library receives maximum use of its relatively small collection. Books are constantly being moved between the five libraries at the request of librarians or patrons. Location files are carefully maintained to facilitate finding and filling subject and title requests. 4,140 requests were filled by the Extension Librarian during 1976-1977.

### PROGRAMS

Over 2,800 children attended reading, film and story programs during this year. A new program for pre-school children was begun during the past winter. Because of weather, the series was only moderately successful; however plans are underway to repeat this program beginning October, 1977. The summer reading program was a tremendous success averaging 354 children each week. Children of all ages attended a special National Library Week program in April.

Many nursery school, elementary and kindergarten classes have visited Sullivan County Libraries during the year, some on a repeat or regular basis, others for special programs on research or library use and film showings.



Library related programs were planned and presented to Home Demonstration Clubs and Reading Institutes.

#### SPECIAL SERVICES

Large print books are now available for readers with visual handicaps. In addition to the titles in stock, a list is provided for requesting special titles of large print volumes.

A microfilm reader is available at the Blountville Library along with microfilm of early records of the county. Films include deeds, marriages, inventories, and minutes of record during 1700 and 1800.

Films and filmstrips may be reserved for showing from title listings of the Watauga Regional Library and the Fine Arts department of Lawson McGhee Library in Knoxville. There is no charge for the films or for postal delivery.

Audio-Visual machines are available for checkout. These include filmstrip projectors, 16 mm projector, cassette players, record players and slide projector.

Reference questions increase yearly as a service to all patrons. Over 1,500 questions were answered by library staff during 1976-1977.

State funded, the Area Resource Center in Knoxville, provides toll free telephone service for our county library to facilitate ordering films, books, and answering reference questions of patrons. Over 600 special requests were filled through the Area Resource Center this year.

After only six months of service, the copying machine was removed from the library at Blountville for lack of budgeted funding. The discontinuance of service has affected many patrons who had welcomed this addition to the library, especially genealogical researchers and others using restricted materials. The copying machine was also used extensively in filling requests throughout the county library system from materials housed only at the Blountville Library. Hopefully funds will be provided in the future for this vital service.

#### PERSONNEL

We were sorry to lose, through retirement, two members of our staff who pioneered Sullivan County Library service in their respective communities. Mrs. Bruce Huffine, who helped to establish the Avoca Branch Library and more recently served as librarian for the Bluff City Library, retired in September of 1976. Mrs. Jess Bridwell had served the Blountville library since 1948. Her retirement was effective February, 1977.

We are looking forward to a long association with Mrs. Mary Nell Stewart, assistant to Mrs. Huffine, who became librarian at Bluff City and Mrs. Kathryn Nichols, who took over circulation duties at Blountville.

#### LIBRARY BOARD

At the end of this fiscal year, Mr. Robert Clark and Mrs. Edna Barnes, two valuable members of the Board ended long years of service to the library. Mr. Clark had served as chairman of the Library Board since 1975. Mrs. Clara Hasbrouck, who helped establish the Colonial Heights Library and Board member since 1964, ended her service in 1976. Our recognition of their faithful service and dedication is shared, I'm sure, by all library users of the county.
